



The "axis tyrants" and the "rising sun"



The life I gave, may there be none











BOOKER TALIAFERRO WASHINGTON

Booker T. Washington, Founder of Tuskegee Institute, was a pioneer in the field of industrial education. With indomitable courage, fortitude, and inspiration, he founded a great institution in the midst of a wilderness of poverty, ignorance, and prejudice. He emphasized the educational doctrine of practical training: "We shall prosper in proportion as we learn to glorify and dignify labor, and put brains and skill into the common occupations of life." Educator, orator, diplomat, benefactor, Dr. Washington set Tuskegee Institute on the path of service to man, race and nation.



DR. ROBERT RUSSA MOTON

As a successor to a Man of the Ages, Robert Russa Moton, Second President of Tuskegee Institute, was confronted with the herculean task of maintaining Tuskegee's prestige in the educational world and assuming a role of leadership in the social and political welfare of his people. With dauntless courage and intrepidity, Dr. Moton faced his difficulties and conquered them. At the end of his regime, Tuskegee Institute was stronger financially and in reputation than ever before. A noted administrator, a Christian gentleman, a consecrated educator, Robert Russa Moton devoted his life to the service of others.



FREDERICK DOUGLAS PATTERSON

Young, energetic, consecrated Frederick Douglas Patterson, Third President of Tuskegee Institute, began a new era in the institution's history. On the foundation laid by his predecessors, Dr. Patterson developed and reorganized Tuskegee Institute in accordance with the modern needs and precepts of education, maintaining the integral aims and traditions of the school. Educator, race leader, humanitarian, and leadership that since the beginning of time, has contributed to the cause of the common good and the betterment of man.
