DR. IRVING A. DERBIGNY

Student life at Tuskegee Institute is influenced immeasurably by faculty members and Administrative officers who take great interest in campus activities. Dr. I. A. Derbigny, who had much concern about student affairs, died on December 10, 1957. Because he knew and loved students he was especially valuable to the Institute.

In 1936, Dr. Derbigny came as Administrative Dean of Tuskegee Institute, a position which he held with distinction until he was elected Vice President in 1949. He was serving in this capacity at the time of his death.

He was a member of the National Education Association; American Teachers Association; Alpha Kappa Mu Honor Society, of which he was co-founder and first president; Sigma Xi; Phi Lambda Upsilon; and Alpha Phi Alpha.

Dr. Derbigny was an accomplished administrator


and a recognized scholar. In addition to the many articles which he wrote for the leading professional journals, he was author of *General Education in the Negro College*, published in 1947 by the Stanford University Press. This book is widely regarded as an important contribution to the field of general education.

IN MEMORIAM

His administrative duties included directing the Tuskegee Institute Summer School and planning and operating the annual All Institute Conference. These he conducted with characteristic vigor and effectiveness

conducted with characteristic vigor and effectiveness. In all of his efforts in behalf of the functioning and development of Tuskegee Institute, Dr. Derbigny exercised the gifts of outstanding ability, devotion and leadership.


Students will continue to benefit from the influence of this man who was such a vital part of Tuskegee Institute.


TRIBUTE


