Department of Agricultural Science

The Department of Agricultural Sciences is composed of three separate, yet closely interrelated programs. These programs and Poultry Sciences, (2) Plant and Soil Sciences and (3) Environmental Sciences.

Curricula in Agricultural Sciences are designed to prepare individuals as trained professional and technical agriculturalists, who possess an insight into the scientific disciplines and who are proficient in modern agricultural practices. These curricula provide for (1) Fundamental training in the basic sciences; (2) experiences designed to broaden the student in general education; (3) systematic culture and (4) inting a contact with scientific, professional and technical agricultural workers.



The Department of Home Economic and Food Administration —

The Department of Home Economics and Food Administration consists of five areas: (1) Clothing and Related Arts, (2) Food Administration, (3) Food Science, (4) Nutritional Science, and (5) Hospital Dietetics. Except for Hospital Dietetics, which is a postbaccalaureate program, each of the listed areas leads to a Bachelor of Science Degree. These undergraduate curricula provide a broad general education plus professional competency for positions in educational and social agencies, health service agencies, community services, certain branches of business and industry related to human needs, research laboratories concerned with foods, nutrition or textiles, and public and institutional food services.

The Division of Behavioral Science Research

Over the years, Tuskegee Institute has had a distinguished history of involvement in organized social research and data compilation through the Rural Life Council, the Department of Records and Research, and the Office of the Director of Research. In September, 1967, the research activities of the Carver Research Foundation were expanded to include the Division of Behavioral Science Research. The inclusion of the Behavioral Science Research in the Carver Research Foundation made it possible for faculty and students in academic units other than the natural sciences to engage in research activities on the same basis as those in the natural sciences.

The focus of research in the Division includes race relations; student attitudes and aspirations, problems related to rural development, poverty and its alleviation, migration, adoption and divorce. Much of the research in the Division is supported by grants and contracts from government agencies and private foundations.

Center for Rural Development Research



Department of Agricultural Research

In September 1971, Congress appropriated funds specifically for agricultural research by the Land Grant Colleges of 1890 and Tuskegee Institute. This appropriation research in a marked expansion of agricultural research activities. To assist in the administration of the expanded program in agricultural research and in assearch in the applied and natural sciences, a new administrative division was established within the Carver Research Foundation: The Division of Agricultural, Applied and Natural Science Research.

The initial activities of the Division are directed toward planning the USDA supported agricultural research program to complement teaching, outreach, and other research activities. The following are selected examples of the research:

Under Dr. Booker T. Whatley: Sweet potato breeding to develop a variety of sweet potatoes that can be used as a substitute for corn in livestock feed.

Under Dr. P. K. Biswas: Studies to develop a method to make maximum use of weather in control of weeds in field and vegetable crops.

Under Dr. Ronald A. Chung and Dr. Bernadine Tolbert: A study of the relationship between nutrition and disease in the population served by Tuskegee Institute's outreach programs.

Under Dr. E. M. Jenkins: Survey to determine the major nutritional and infectious disease problems of swine raised in Southeast Alabama.

The position of USDA Liaison Officer was established by mutual consent between USDA and Tuskegee Institute to be filled by a USDA employee. This position was established to strengthen relationships and facilitate cooperation between USDA agencies and Tuskegee Institute in areas of mutual interest in extension, research, teaching, and employment. It was through the Liaison Officer that a number of students obtained summer employment in 1972 with USDA agencies.

This year the enrollment in AFROTC is a total of 148, with 52 of these cadets enrolled in the Professional Officer Course which leads to a commission as a Second Lieutenant. Last School year, 21 cadets were commissioned and put on active

The AFROTC program at Tuskegee Institute enrolls students in the two-year and four-year programs. The programs are available for women and men students to enter and pursue a commission.

AFROTC offers scholarships to students in the two-year and four-year programs who meet the application requirements. These scholarships cover full tuition, fees, and \$100.00 per month. Presently, there are 20 cadets on AFROTC scholarships.

It is therefore appropriate to say that with the cooperation of business clients a reciprocal benefit if yeilded.
