Dr. George Washington Carver was inducted into the Hall of Fame for Great Americans on April 24, 1977. While at Tuskegee, Dr. Carver was noted for his more than 100 discoveries involving the peanut. He also made numerous discoveries concerning the sweet potato. The George Washington Carver Museum and the Carver Research Foundation were erected on Tuskegee Institute's campus in Dr. Carver's honor. Dr. Carver was the second Black American to be inducted into the Hall of Fame. The first Black American to be given this honor was Booker T. Washington, Tuskegee Institute's Founder.

GEORGE WASHINGTON CARVER: A LEGACY OF GREATNESS George Washington Carver was born on the farm of Moses and Sarah

Carver at Diamond Grove, Missouri. In the early days of the Civil War he and his mother were abducted by slave raiders. George was later recovered in exchange for a three hundred dollar race horse, but his mother was never found.

After the slaves were freed, he and his brother Jim were raised by the Carvers. Being too frail and sickly to do heavy farm work, George learned to cook, sew and launder, and spend much of his free time out in the woods collecting wild flowers, stones and insects.


Young George learned to read at an early age. Eager for a formal education, he left the farm with the Carver's blessing to attend a school established by the Freedman's Bureau in Neosho, Missouri. Upon graduating from high school he applied to the Presbyterian College at Highland, Kansas, and was accepted by mail. When he arrived at Highland, however, he was denied admission because of his race.

In 1890 he applied to Simpson College in Indianola and was admitted. After paying his fees he was left with only ten cents, whereupon he opened a laundry that supported him through college. In 1891 he transferred to Iowa State College of Agriculture and Mechanical Arts at Ames. Active in student affairs, he became the college football team trainer. He graduated in 1894, and was the first Black to graduate from the college and also the first Black faculty member and the first person to receive an advanced degree from Iowa State.

In 1896 Booker T. Washington asked Carver to direct Tuskegee Institute's agricultural department and experiment station. Carver accepted the proposition, and the rest is known history.

AIR FORCE The AFROTC program at Tuskegee Institute enrolls both male and female students in a four-year program leading to a commission as a Second Lieutenant in the United States Air Force. More than 500 Tuskegee graduates have received commissions through AFROTC since its inception here in 1951.

> During 1977-78 Academic year, AFROTC enrollment increased to 206 cadets, our largest enrollment since AFROTC became voluntary in 1972. We currently have enrolled 128 Freshman, 31 Sophomore, and 20 Junior and 27 Senior students and are the ninth (9th) largest detachment nationwide.

> There are 15 cadets currently receiving AFROTC scholarships. These scholarships provide fall tuition and fees plus a stipend of \$100.00 per month. All cadets are eligible to apply for an AFROTC Scholarship.

Excellence is a tradition for AFROTC Cadets, and our students are campus leaders. AFROTC auxillary units, the Arnold Air Society and Angel Flight both enjoy wide campus support.

There are six curricula leading to the degree of Bachelor of Science in the Division of Social Sciences. These curricula are black studies, economics, history, political science, sociology, and social work.






FEDERAL RELATIONS

READING CLINIC

The primary service function consists of a semester long, one-credit course designed for students having difficulties in reading and learning skills necessary for a successful college level performance. These skills are related to communication listening, comprehension, study, note-taking, test-taking, vocabulary development, spelling, and the like.

Every freshman student who does not make the option level in the Placement Test is required to enroll in reading improvement course 101/102 during the first semester of his admission to Tuskegee Institute. Those placed in the option category and upper class students will profit from a semester study at the Clinic to the extent that they understand improved methods of reading and learning.

All students receive a thorough diagnosis of their reading and learning problems, and individual aid is provided through intensive counseling and instruction. An extensive selection of films, filmstrips, and programmed learning materials are maintained. A complete learning center including a 48-position reading laboratory is used during the instructional stage.

The Reading Clinic serves as a training ground for graduate students in Reading and offers them laboratory facilities and opportunities for supervised practicum experience in psychological analysis and treatment of reading deficiences.


With hope high once again, the team traveled to Orlando, Florida, and in a confrontation with Bethune-Cookman, turned out the loser.


And so went the season as they lost to FAMU and 'Bama State. They did, however, defeat Miles for homecoming, and Alabama A&M in Huntsville.

We hope your yesterdays were happy and productive and we wish you all the greatest success in all your future endeavors—Peace be unto you.






DELTA SIGMA THETA INC.


Delta Sigma Theta was founded at Howard University in Washington D.C., on January 13, 1913 by a group of 22 undergradute women. The stated purpose of the Founders was to establish a society to promote high cultural, intellectual and moral standards among its members, for its own benefit and for that of the larger society in which it existed. Today, there are over 95 thousand members, and 500 chapters across the nation, and in the republics of Haiti and Liberia as well as in the Virgin Islands.

Gamma Tau accomplished much through service projects and fund raising activities during the school year. Among these were visiting and entertaining the residents at local nursing homes and the Veterans Administration Hospital, participation in the United Negro College Fund Drive, Red Cross Drive, NAACP fund raising activities, tutorial sessions and a Halloween and Christmas party for local children, collection of canned goods for Thanksgiving baskets for needy families, raffles, a Red and White Disco, and a Fashion-Talent Extravaganza.

This year, the Grand Chapter of Delta Sigma Theta Inc., awarded Tuskegee Institute the Distinguished Professor Chair. In this program, the Distinguished Professor Chair is granted to one UNCF institution on an annual basis. Each time a college is chosen, Delta will pay the salary for such a professor in the amount of \$25,000-30,000 per year.
