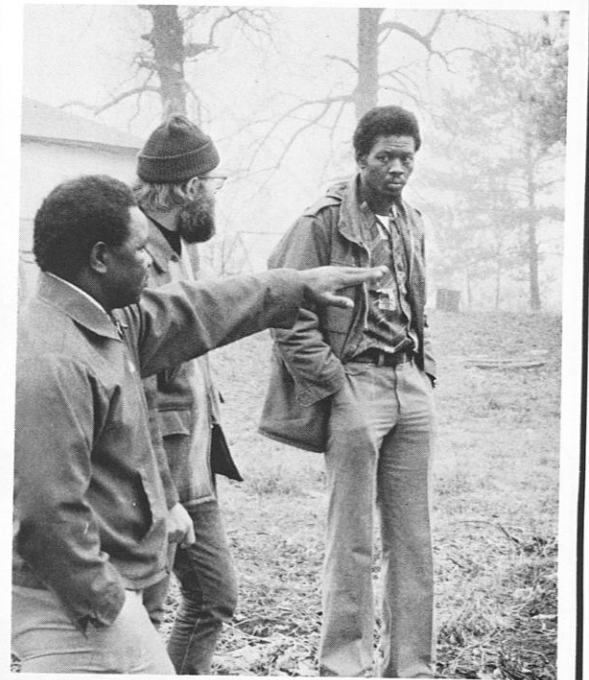
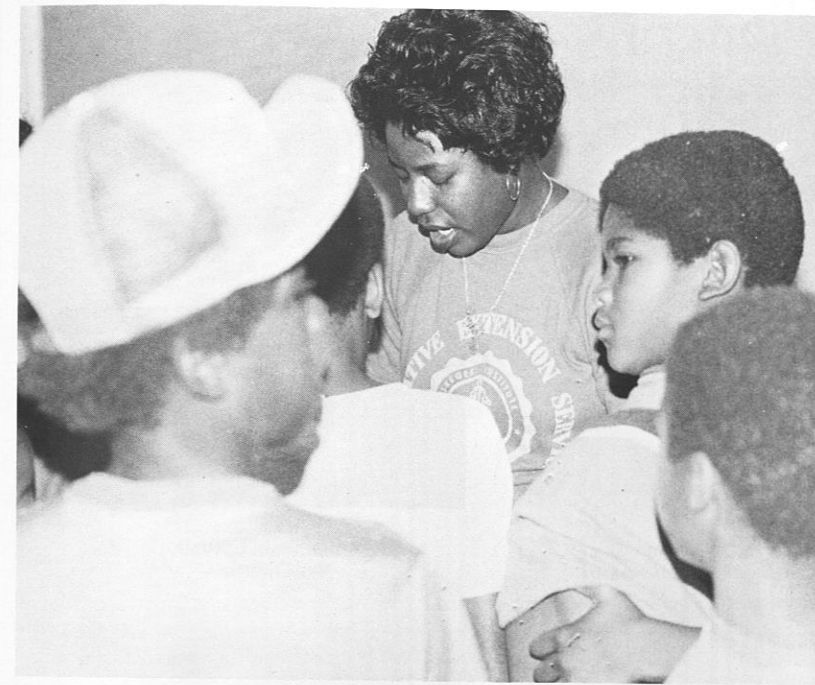


COOPERATIVE EXTENSION PROGRAM

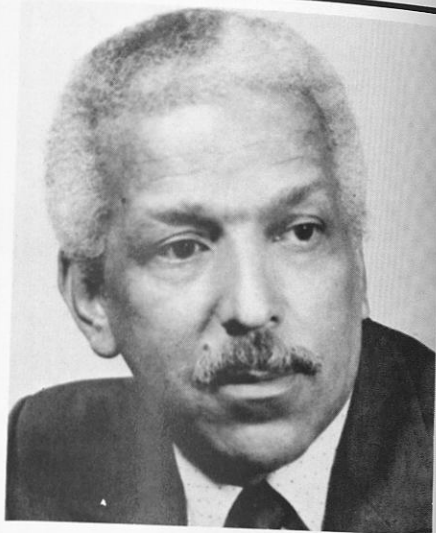
Today, the United States Department of Agriculture operates Cooperative Extension Services in all 50 states as well as its possessions. The services have reached millions of people since its formal organization. Services touch nearly every aspect of daily living for most of the population.

The significant factor about Extension Service programs is the omission from history books the fact that the "roots" of Extension started at Tuskegee Institute. Dr. Booker T. Washington set many of the standards by which Extension patterned its role. As early as 1892, farmers' institutes were held on Tuskegee's campus.

This rich heritage is being kept alive through the current Cooperative Extension Program at Tuskegee Institute. The program operates over the Black Belt Counties and Barbour County, and seeks to enrich the lives of its clientele by providing programs in Agriculture and Natural Resources, Home Economics, 4-H and Community Development.

The Division accepts as its general mission to provide continuity to Tuskegee Institute's early involvement in objectively assessing issues and problems facing disadvantaged groups, particularly in the southeastern region of the county; to provide personnel and technical facilities for consultative services for other units within the university; to provide research training opportunities for Tuskegee Institute students; to stimulate research activities among faculty members; and to coordinate research between Tuskegee Institute and other institutions.

The Division continues to focus attention on the alleviation of social problems, through research, in an effort to reverse the status of disadvantaged: in race, in religion, and in occupations and means of livelihood.

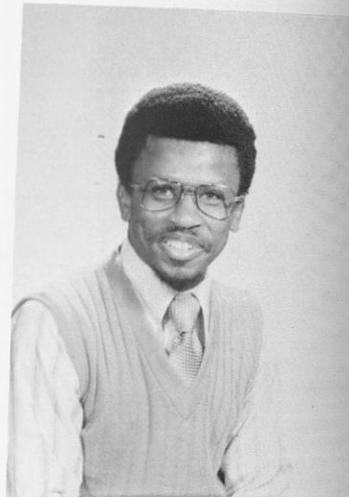

They are designed to assist students to enter college, to remain in college, or to discover other forms of postsecondary education by helping them to overcome educational, financial or other obstacles to attaining these goals.

Special Services provides personal, academic and career counseling; tutors; textbook loan service; emergency loans an out-of-town cultural activity for Tuskegee Institute students who are enrolled in the program.

Talent Search provides comprehensive counseling and extensive assistance with college admissions and financial aid applications for qualified high school or dropouts in Bullock and Macon Counties. Upward Bound provides comprehensive counseling; Saturday reinforcement classes; personal development classes; cultural activities and a campus summer residential program for inadequately prepared high school students in Lee, Macon and Russell Counties.

AIR FORCE ROTC

The AFROTC program at Tuskegee Institute enrolls both male and female students in two and four year programs leading to a commission as a Second Lieutenant in the United State Air Force. More than 570 Tuskegee graduates have received commissions through AFROTC since it's inception here in 1951. During 1979-1980 Academic Year, AFROTC enrollment increased to 328 cadets, our largest enrollment since AFROTC became voluntary in 1972. We currently have enrolled 167 Freshman, 94 Sophomore, 43 Junior and 21 Senior students and we are the fourth largest detachment nationwide.

There are 19 cadets currently receiving AFROTC Scholarships. These scholarships provide full tuition and fees plus a stipend of \$100.00 per month. All cadets are eligible to apply for AFROTC Scholarships.

Excellence is a tradition for AFROTC cadets, and our students are campus leaders. AFROTC auxillary units, the Arnold Air Society and Angel Flight both enjoy wide campus support.

The AFROTC staff consists of four commissioned officers and three non-commissioned officers.

May the blessings of the Almighty be the sunlight on your rainy days.

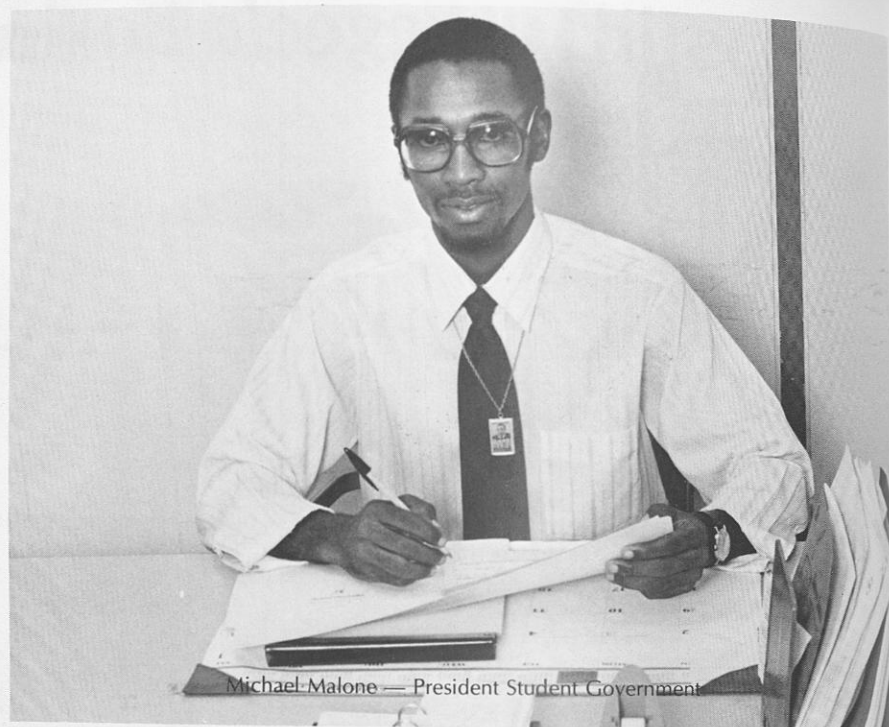

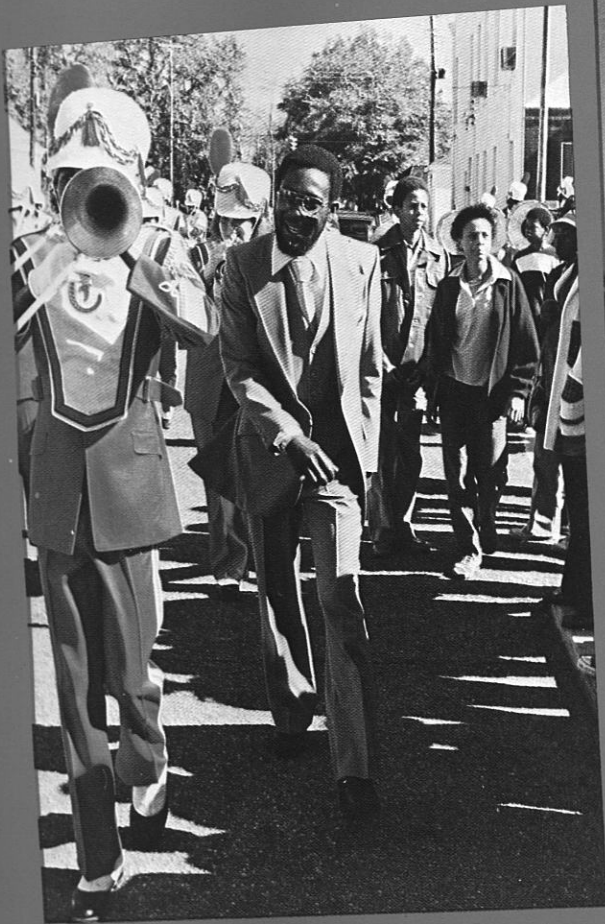


Homecoming Beauties

Victory the Tigers have won six of their last seven Homecoming games.





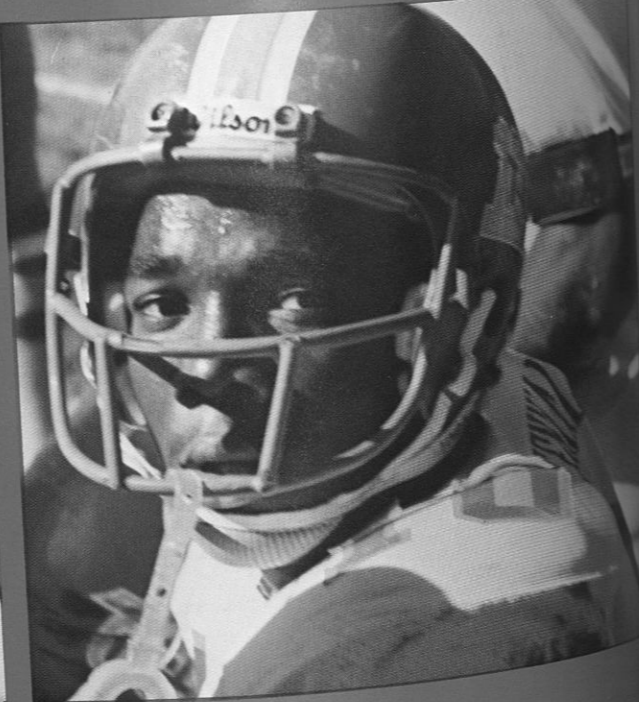

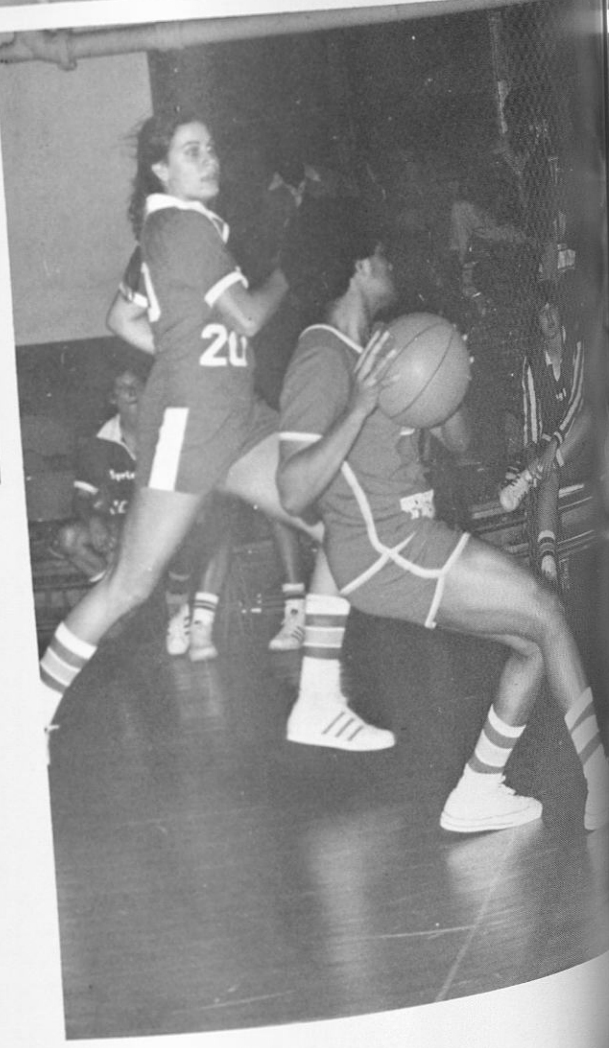






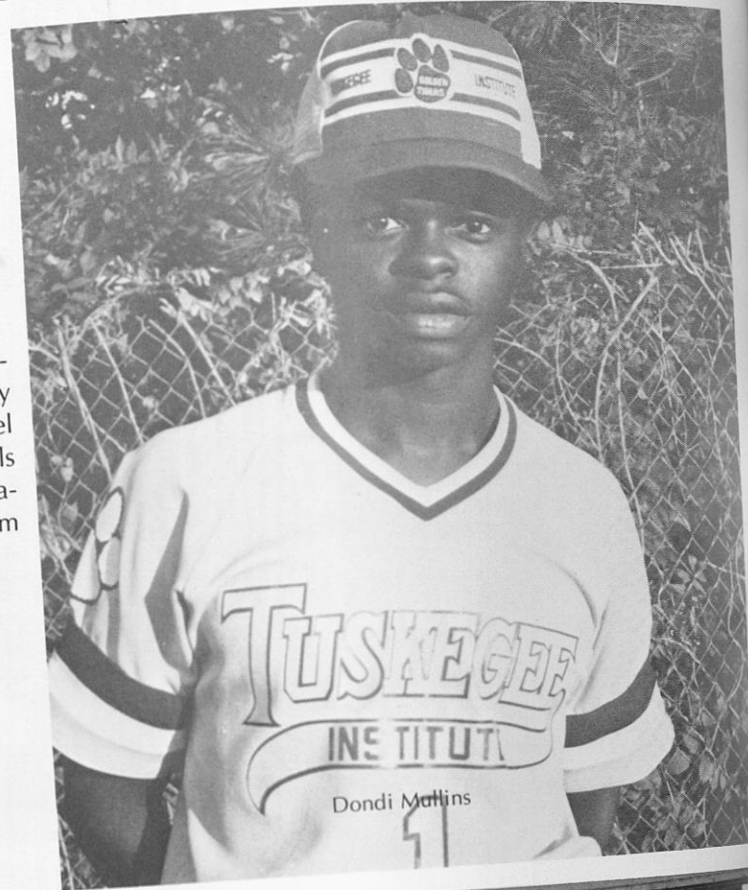
Girl Roundballer's Cap off another great season
