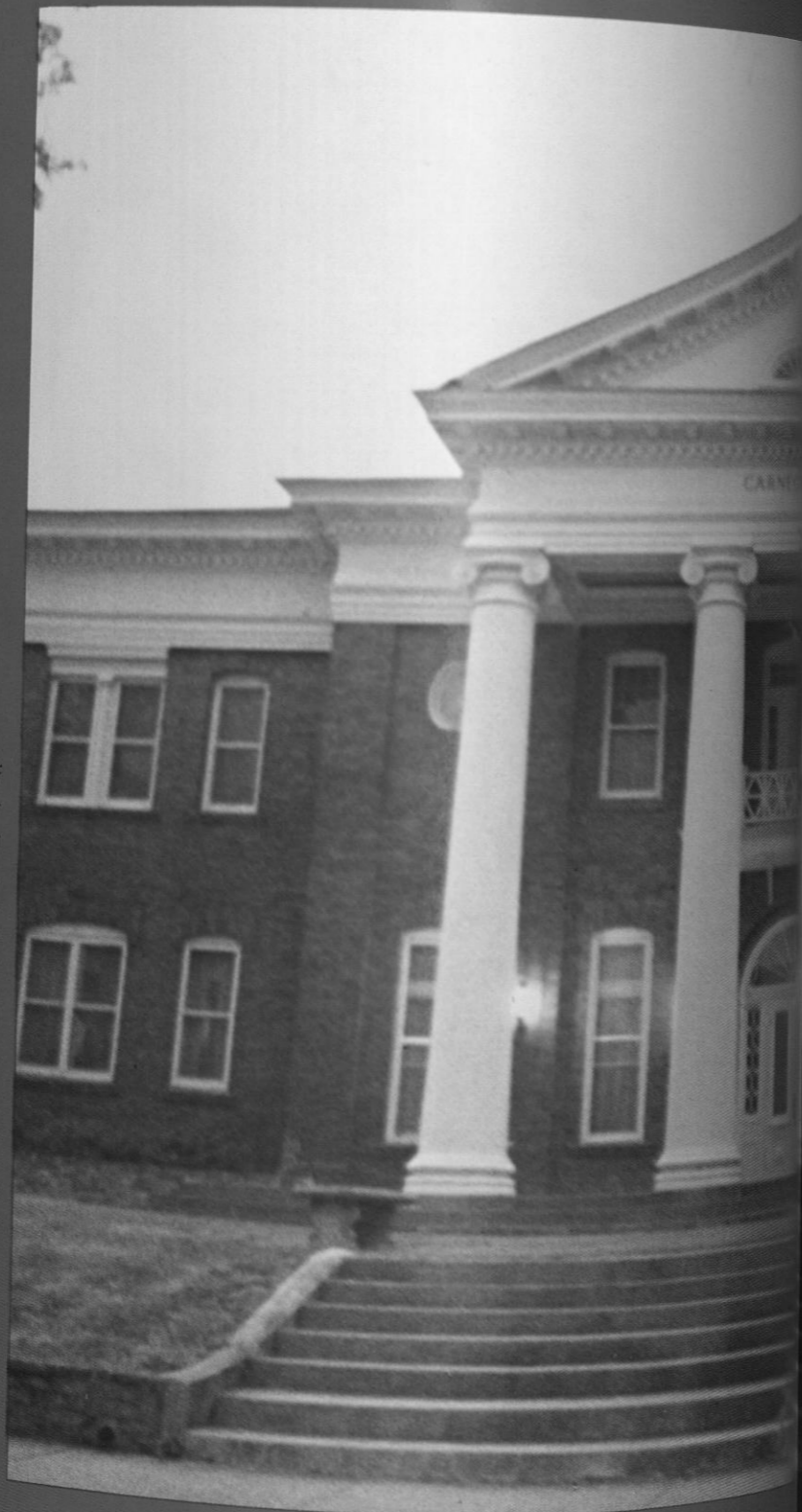

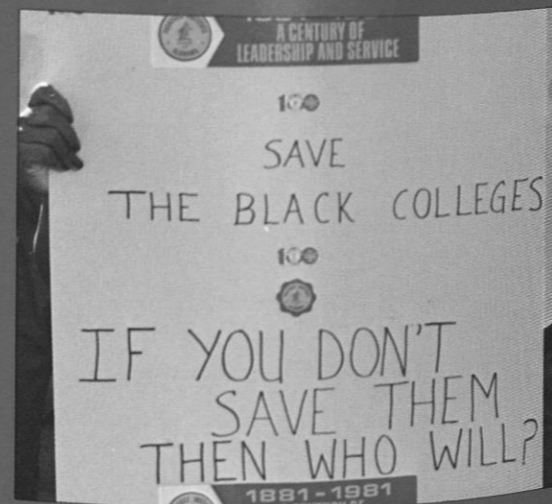
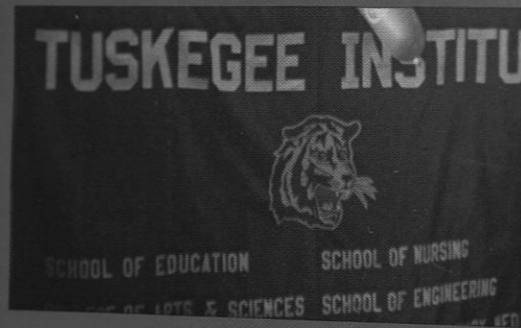


# BLACK COLLEGE DAY: JUST A BEGINNING

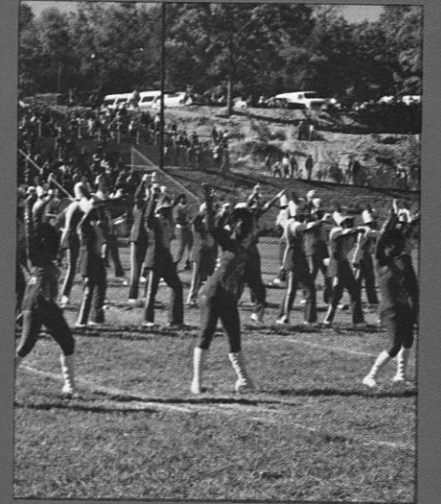

# GEORGE WASHINGTON CARVER



Driven by a strongly felt need to formulate programs of scientific agriculture that would raise the living standard for black farmers in the South, George Washington Carver may well have been the country's leading mycologist. Some of the best work in that field was done by Carver as he worked toward his Master's degree at Iowa State College; and his early papers on plant fungi clearly established him as a leader in that important field.

Tuskegee was still a fledgling school — only fourteen years old — when Carver accepted Booker T. Washington's invitation to direct the institutions department of agriculture. For almost a half-century Carver utilized the facilities at Tuskegee in an effort to fulfill Washington's promise that if Southern blacks would cast down their buckets where they were, in agriculture, mechanics, in commerce — they would prosper in numerous ways.

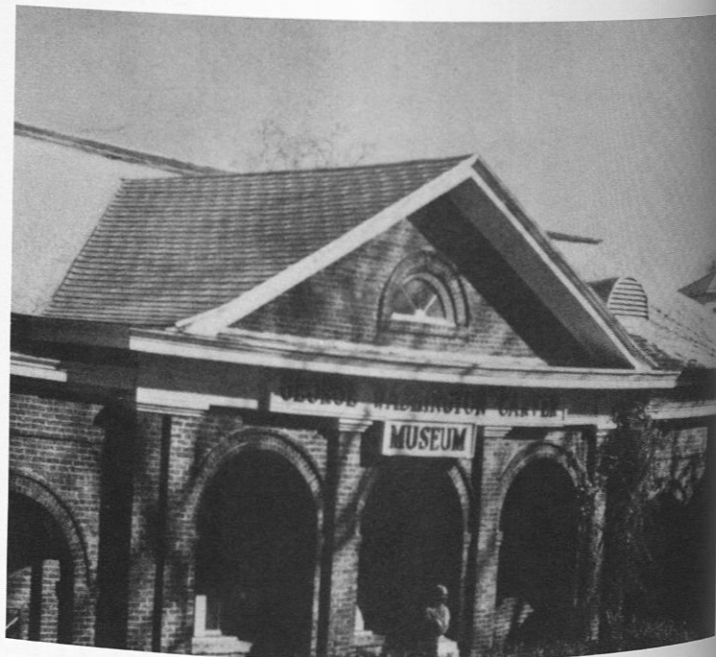
## EQUIPMENT

# PAUL LAURENCE DUNBAR



Paul Laurence Dunbar (1872-1906), famous poet, was born in Dayton, Ohio, and attended Central High School there. He often wrote poetry while he worked as an elevator operator, and soon became known as "Poet of the People." He is best known for his poems in the Negro dialect, such as "When Melinda Sings." He is the writer of the Tuskegee Song and a poem dedicating Dorothy Hall.

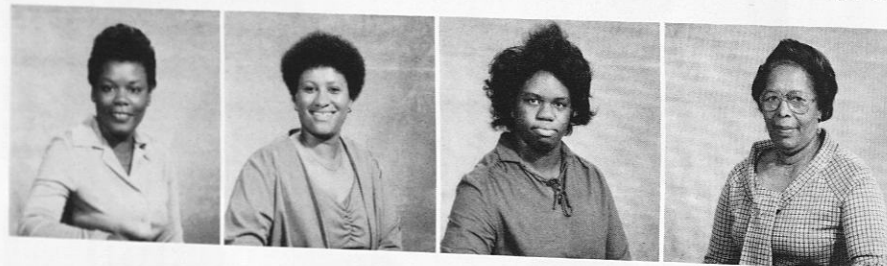


# SPECIAL PROGRAMS



**MOTTO: "SPECIAL FOLKS DOING SPECIAL THINGS FOR SPECIAL PEOPLE!"**  
 Special Programs is a combination of three federally-funded programs — Special Services, Talent Search and Upward Bound. Their common purpose is to provide programs designed to identify students with academic potential from low-income families; to motivate personal and academic competence and to provide special support services that will enable students to succeed in higher education. Each program has federal eligibility criteria which must be met in order to participate, and each offers academic, career and personal counseling.

**SPECIAL SERVICES** — Special Services offers services to any student who meets the criteria or is physically disabled and is enrolled, or accepted for enrollment, at Tuskegee Institute. Former Talent Search and Upward Bound students are encouraged to participate. Each student is assigned to a specific counselor and daily tutoring is available in biology, chemistry, english, history, and math. Evening sessions are also conducted. Special Services maintains an Emergency Loan Fund and a Textbook Loan Service. Career Exploration Seminars, and Testing and Financial Aid Workshops are conducted.

**TALENT SEARCH and UPWARD BOUND** — The Talent Search and Upward Bound programs focus on high school students who attend eight high schools in a four county area. These students receive counseling at their schools or in their homes. They are assisted with the completion of college and financial aid applications, and ACT and SAT fee waivers are provided, as well as educational/cultural field trips. There is a special component on health careers. In addition, Upward Bound students receive stipends when they attend reinforcement classes on Saturdays and during the summer in a 6 week residential period on campus.

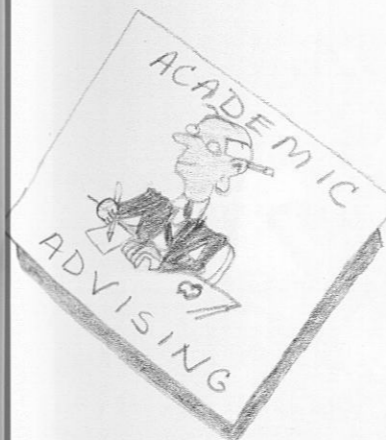
# THE TUSKEGEE GAME

# THE DREAM IS STILL ALIVE

A TRIBUTE TO DR. MARTIN LUTHER KING, JR.  
JANUARY 15, 1981

**"LET MY PEOPLE GO"**  
A Litany of Commemoration of  
**THE REVEREND MARTIN LUTHER KING, JR.**  
January 15, 1929-April 4, 1968

**LEADER:** In the grand order of the universe, our Lord God wisely has chosen men and women to serve Him in each era. Such a servant of our Lord God was Martin Luther King, Jr., whose birth we now commemorate. We are thankful for the life of this 20th Century prophet of freedom, who joined the prophets of history in the cry:

**CONGREGATION:** In the name of freedom, let my people go.

**LEADER:** Martin Luther King, Jr. envisioned the ultimate freedom: the freedom achieved in struggle; the freedom reached in brotherhood; the freedom fired by the dream of a man; the freedom inspired by the lot of a people; the freedom free of hate; the freedom full of love.

**CONGREGATION:** In the name of this freedom of love, let my people go.

**LEADER:** He came into our lives when the yearning of people to be free had turned their attention to justice. For justice, and only justice, we shall follow, that we may live and inherit the land which the Lord our God gives us.

**CONGREGATION:** In the name of justice, let my people go.

**LEADER:** He reminded us that the spirit of man soars from depths of despair with the strength and belief in the promise of the Creator of the universe. We know and we testify: The Lord loves justice; He will not forsake his saints.

**CONGREGATION:** In the name of the Lord, let my people go.

**LEADER:** And so he set off with us on a journey for justice. It was a journey proclaiming the words of the ancient prophet, Amos: "Let justice roll down like waters, and righteousness like a mighty stream." It was a journey calling forth the modern Christian ministry—to feed the hungry, to clothe the naked, to set at liberty those who are oppressed.

**CONGREGATION:** In the name of the prophet, Amos, and in the name of suffering people, let my people go.

**LEADER:** The journey went to Montgomery, to affirm human dignity and courage; to Birmingham, to defeat the sickness of separating human life; to Selma, to ensure the equality of people in human affairs; to a hundred nameless communities, to remove painful shackles of oppression and light joyous torches of liberty.

**CONGREGATION:** In the name of this journey toward freedom, let my people go.

**LEADER:** When war was encountered, the leader of this journey sang with the people: "Ain't gonna study war no more." When violence was met, he spurned it and said: "Hate is too great a burden to bear."

**CONGREGATION:** In the name of peace and love, let my people go.

**LEADER:** And even when death was confronted, as the journey reached Memphis, he could say in final triumph, that in life he had found something worth dying for, something worth life itself—the Promised Land, a land of freedom with justice.

**CONGREGATION:** In the name of the Promised Land, let my people go.

**LEADER:** So we are thankful that the Spirit of the Lord anointed a man who preached good news to the poor, who rejected segregation and embraced liberation, who prophesied the greatness of his people in struggle for the deliverance of all people.

**CONGREGATION:** In the name of the Spirit of the Lord, let my people go.

**LEADER:** We praise the Lord God for sending us a man of peace who resisted tyranny, a man of nonviolence who fought for liberty, a man of God who worked for people. Thank you, Lord, for Martin Luther King, Jr., who inspired us with his dream, who walked into our lives and our hearts with his marches for justice, who demanded freedom with great courage in the face of grave danger, and who has now passed on into your Promised Land. Thank you for his noble legacy to continue the journey to that land here on earth, in life for all people. Thank you, God; You have sent us one who now causes us to say:

**ALL:** In the name of Martin Luther King, Jr., let my people go.

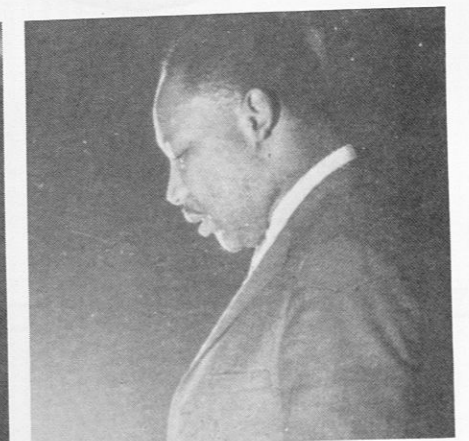

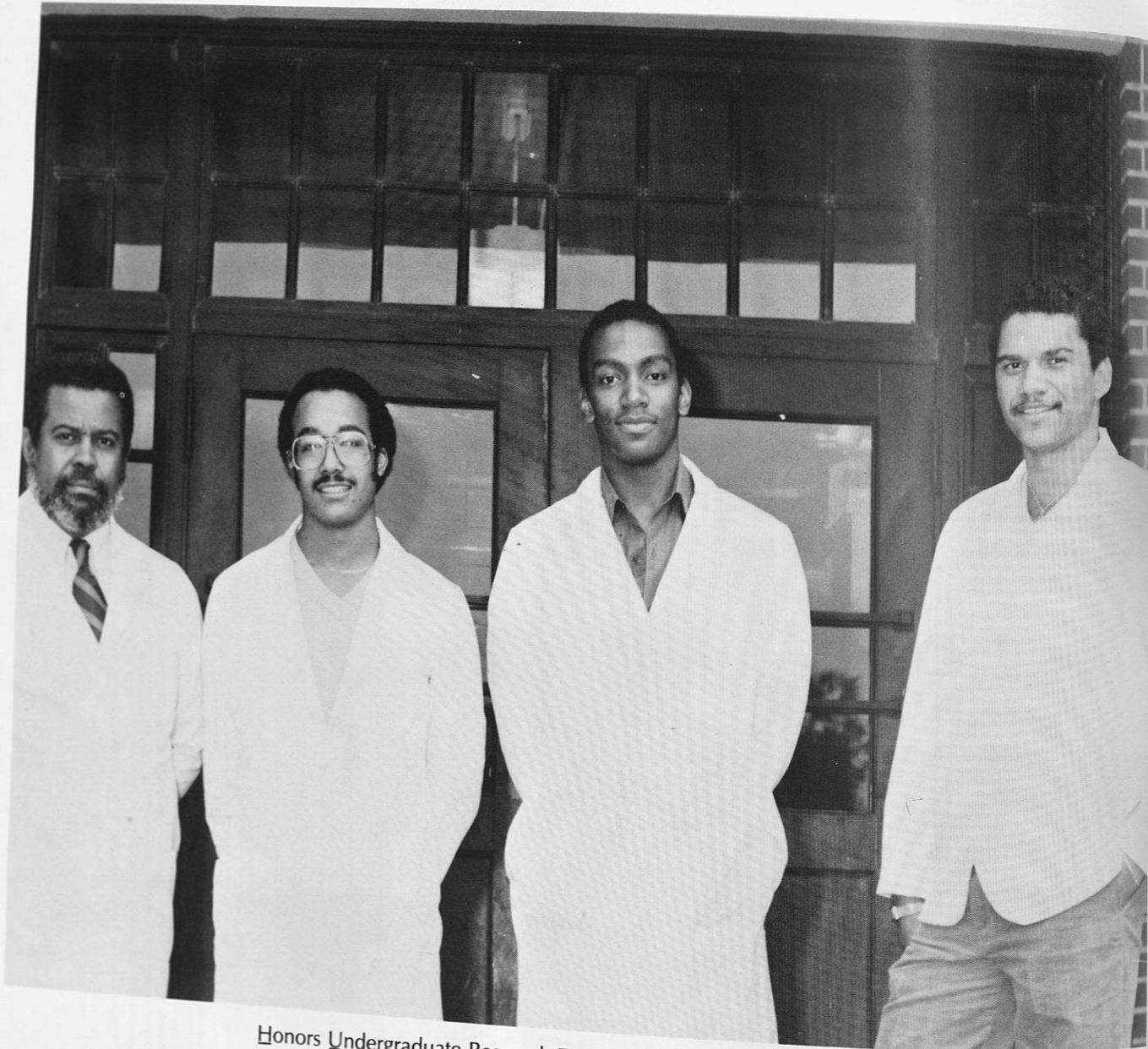

Alpha Phi Alpha Fraternity celebrates its Diamond Anniversary in 1981. Founded in 1906, Alpha Phi Alpha was designed to bring black men, on predominantly white college campuses together, and enhance their education through activities from black cultures. From this beginning the fraternity has grown into an organization which endeavors to help blacks prosper. During its 75 years of existence, Alpha Phi Alpha has sponsored projects such as the Go-To-High School, Go-To-College campaign (1930), Education for Citizenship Campaign (1937), and the present Million Dollar Fund. There are over 500 Alumni and undergraduate chapters of Alpha Phi Alpha.

The first organization founded on Tuskegee Institute's campus in 1948, Gamma Phi Chapter of Alpha Phi Alpha Fraternity has produced campus leaders in each of its 33 years of existence. Brothers in the chapter hold offices in the Student Government Association, Pan-Hellenic Council, and many other campus organizations. Gamma Phi Chapter participates in many activities during the year. The major project of the year is the Mr. Magic Presentation, which is designed to raise funds for the Million Dollar Fund, C.A.R.E. (Cooperative For American Relief Everywhere, Inc.) and the National Sickle Cell Fund. Other projects in which the brothers are involved include various food drives and assisting students at Lewis Adams School. The Brothers of Gamma Phi Chapter of Alpha Phi Alpha Fraternity Incorporated join the Commemoration of the Tuskegee Institute Centennial.

# A CELEBRATION OF 100 YEARS



## *Act of Legislature Founding the School, 1881*

### AN ACT

To establish a Normal School for colored teachers at Tuskegee.

Section 1. Be it enacted by the General Assembly of Alabama, There shall be established, at Tuskegee, in this State, a normal school for the education of colored teachers. Pupils shall be admitted free of charge for tuition in the school, on giving an obligation in writing to teach in the free schools in this State for two years after they become qualified. The school shall not be begun or continued with a less number than twenty-five pupils, nor shall the school be taught for a less period than nine months in each year.

Section 2. Be it further enacted, There is appropriated out of the general school revenue, set apart to the colored children, the sum of two thousand dollars, annually, for the maintenance and support of the school; and the apportionment of the general fund for the colored race shall be made to the different counties of this state, after the deduction of the sum of two thousand dollars herein appropriated for the school at Tuskegee.

Section 3. Be it further enacted, The school shall be under the direction, control and supervision of a board of three commissioners, who shall consist of the following persons, to-wit: Thos. B. Dryer, M. B. Swanson, and Lewis Adams, who may fill any vacancy that may occur in the board of commissioners. The commissioners shall elect one of their number chairman, and they shall report quarterly to the Superintendent of Education, how many pupils have been in attendance, what branches have been taught, and other facts of interest and importance appertaining to the school.

Section 4. Be it further enacted, The chairman of the board of commissioners shall give bond in double the amount of the appropriation of the school, for the legal and faithful application of the sum appropriated, the bond to be approved by the judge of probate, of Macon County, and a certified copy thereof sent to the Superintendent of Education to be filed in his office.

Section 5. Be it further enacted, The chairman of the board of commissioners, after having given bond as hereinbefore provided, and the bond shall have been approved as herein provided, and a certified copy thereof filed in the office of Superintendent of Education, shall present to the Superintendent of Education a requisition for the amount herein appropriated; and the Superintendent of Education shall thereupon certify the amount of two thousand dollars to the State Auditor, who shall draw his warrant for the sum on the State Treasurer, payable to the chairman of the board of commissioners, for the maintenance and support of the normal school.

Approved February 10, 1881.

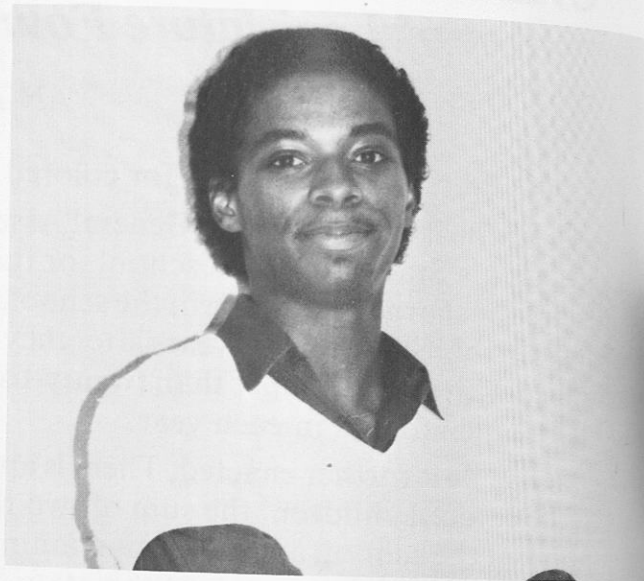

Two men — Lewis Adams, a former slave, and George W. Campbell, a former slave owner — saw the need for the education of Negro Youth in this rural Alabama locale and thereby achieved the passage of the State legislative act which appropriated \$2,000 for teachers' salaries of such a school. Their call for a leader went to Hampton Institute where the principal, General Samuel Chapman Armstrong, answered by sending Booker T. Washington, a highly capable young man of 25 years.

On July 4, 1881, thirty men and women gathered that first day in a one-room shanty to attend Alabama's first normal school for the training of Negro teachers. The beginning was humble, but Washington lived to see others throughout the nation and world share his vision. His "learning by doing" concept was a major contribution to the general field of education. He died at Tuskegee, November 14, 1915, and is buried on the campus.

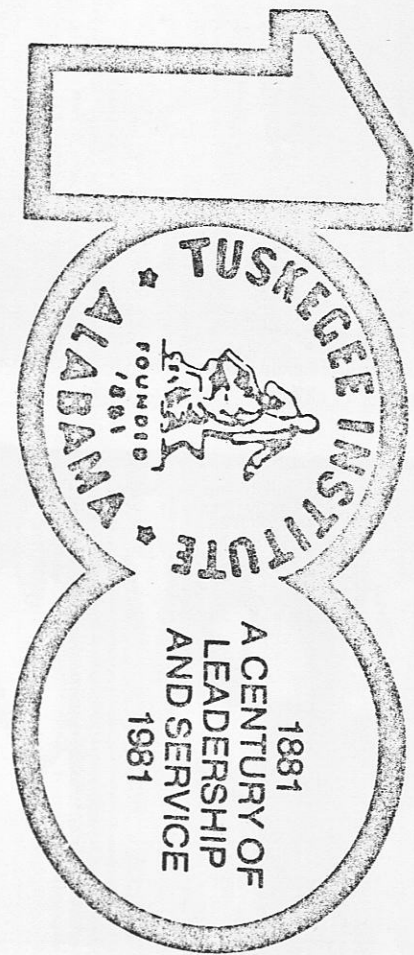

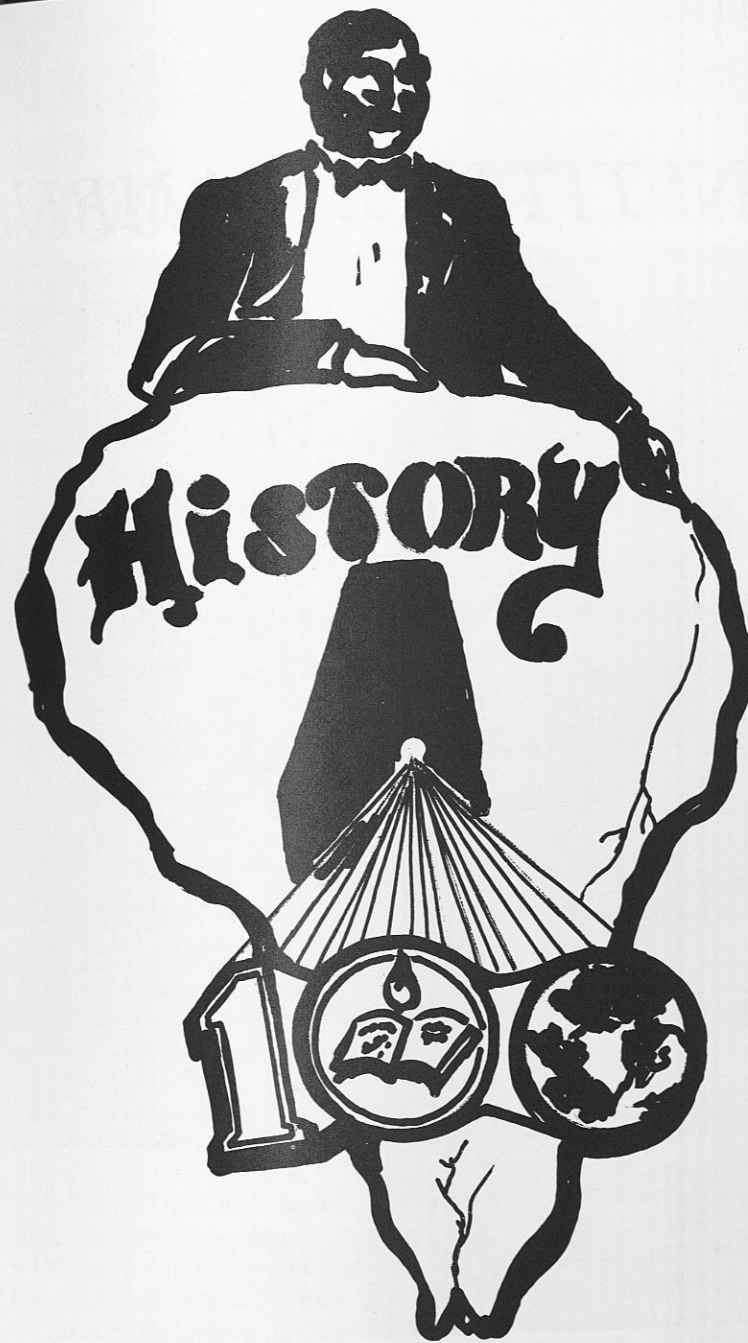

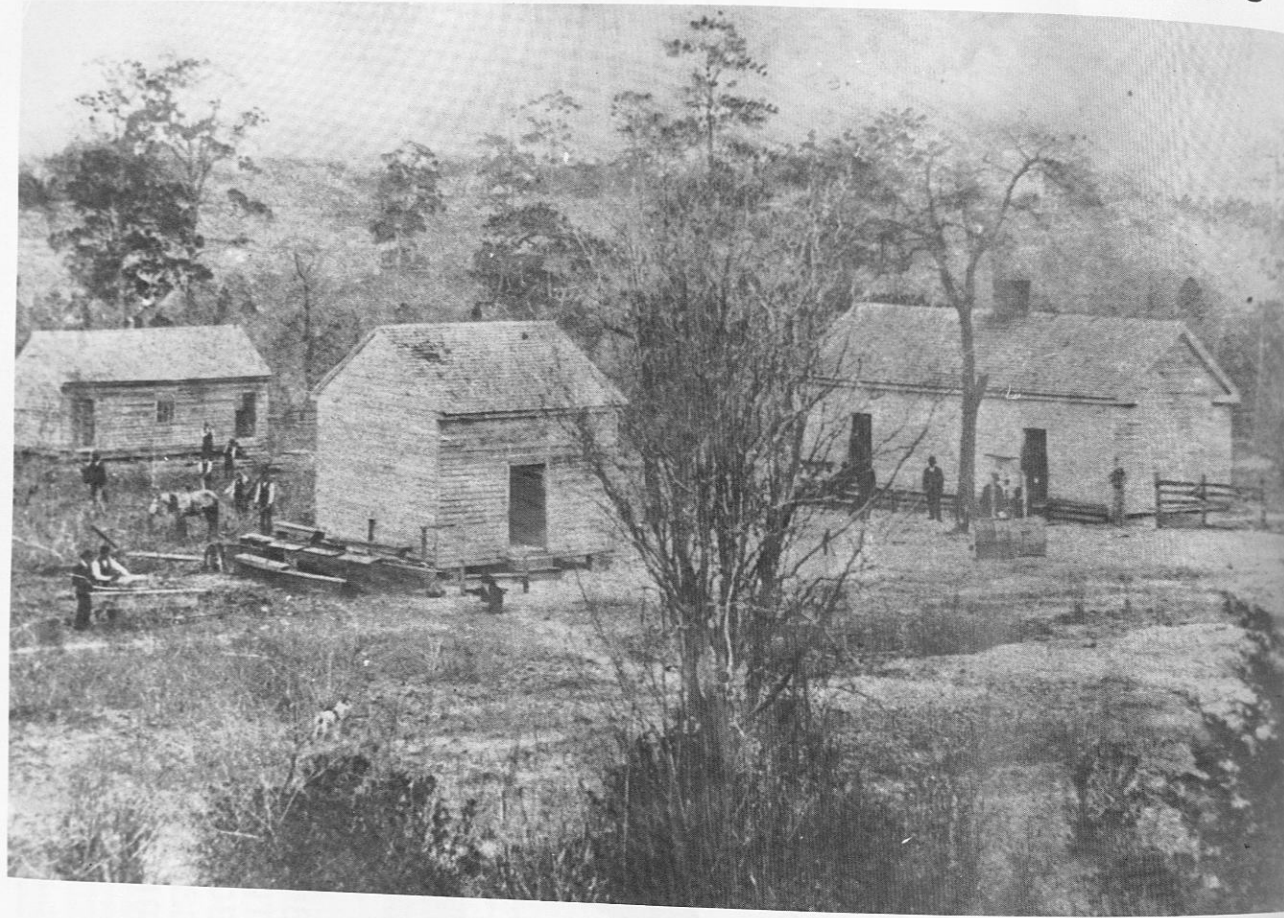

# TUSKEGEE INSTITUTE CAMPUS



Tuskegee Institute was established by an act of the General Assembly of Alabama on February 12, 1881, and Booker T. Washington opened the school on July 4, of that year to become its' founder and first principal. Lewis Adams, a former slave, and George W. Campbell, a former slave master, had envisioned the need for the education of Negro youth in Macon County, Alabama. Their call for a leader went to Hampton Institute, and was answered by Hamptons' Principal, General Samuel Champman Armstrong, who sent Booker T. Washington.

The course of development reflects in every way how typically American Tuskegee is. It was founded in the purest "log cabin" tradition, for Booker T. Washington held his first class in a one-room shanty. Stressing the practical but at no time ignoring the need to educate the whole man, Dr. Washington's school was soon acclaimed first by Alabama and then by the nation — for the soundness and vigor have continued through subsequent administrations.

# A TRIBUTE TO ANDREW P. TORRENCE



Andrew P. Torrence was born in Little Rock, Arkansas, on November 20, 1920 — the son of the late Boston L. and Nancy Torrence. His was a useful life, filled with an urgency that the education of both young and old and the uplift of disadvantaged people were of paramount importance in a democratic society. He died on June 11, 1980, at the John A. Andrew Community Hospital, Tuskegee Institute.

A.P. Torrence was Provost and Executive Vice President of Tuskegee Institute from 1974 until his death. Previously he served as President of Tennessee State University in Nashville from 1968 to 1974. From 1954 to 1968, A.P. Torrence was associated with Tuskegee Institute as Professor, Vice President for Academic Affairs, Dean of Academic Affairs, and as Head of the Department of Agricultural Education. He was Visiting Professor of Rural and Adult Education at the University of Wisconsin during the summer of 1962.

A.P. Torrence received the bachelor's degree from Tennessee State University and the Master's and Ph.D. from The University of Wisconsin.

A.P. Torrence published widely in professional journals and was co-author of three books. He held membership in a number of professional and scientific societies and was a member of Alpha Phi Alpha Fraternity.

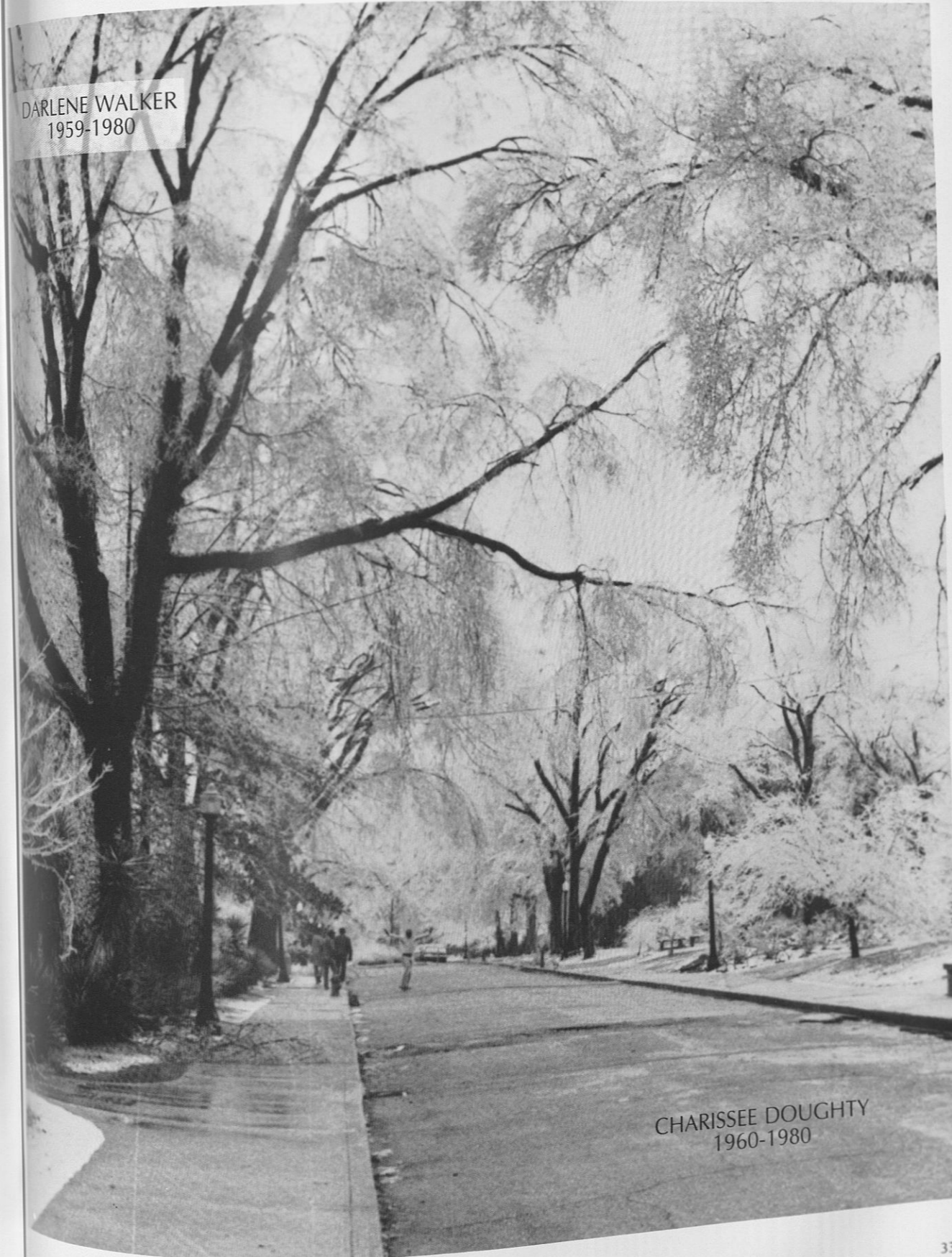
