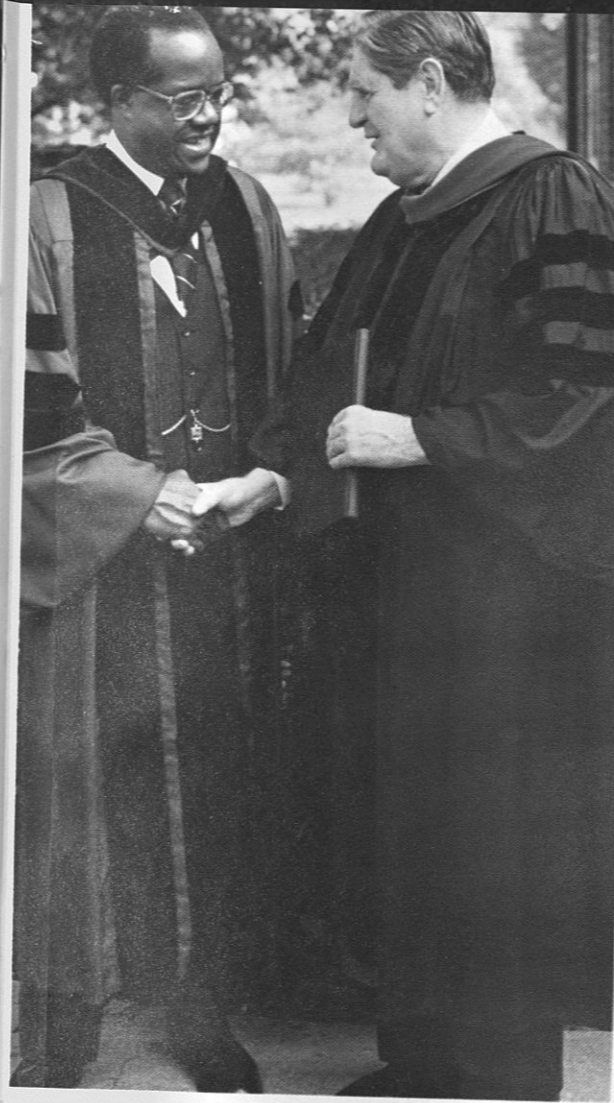
—Lewis Adams, one of our founding fathers, expressed the need for family unity by putting his energies and talents into the birth of Tuskegee.

He has been employed by Tuskegee Institute for the past ten years as a counselor for Special Programs and has worked on a number of student organizations.

SEVENTY-FIVE YEARS OF TEAMWORK

On July 4, 1881, Booker T. Washington, a young man of twenty-five years, opened the new Tuskegee State Normal School in Macon County, Alabama. He had thirty pupils, some community good will, a \$2,000 State appropriation that could be used only for salary; he had no land, no buildings, no equipment, no faculty but himself. Nine months later, on March 30, 1882, he with his four teachers, one hundred and twelve pupils, and several hundred friends, white and black, from the town and community, led by the Tuskegee Normal School brass band, marched from Zion Hill to the Normal School's 100 debt-free acres to lay the cornerstone of their first building, Porter Hall. That was the high point of the School's first Commencement.

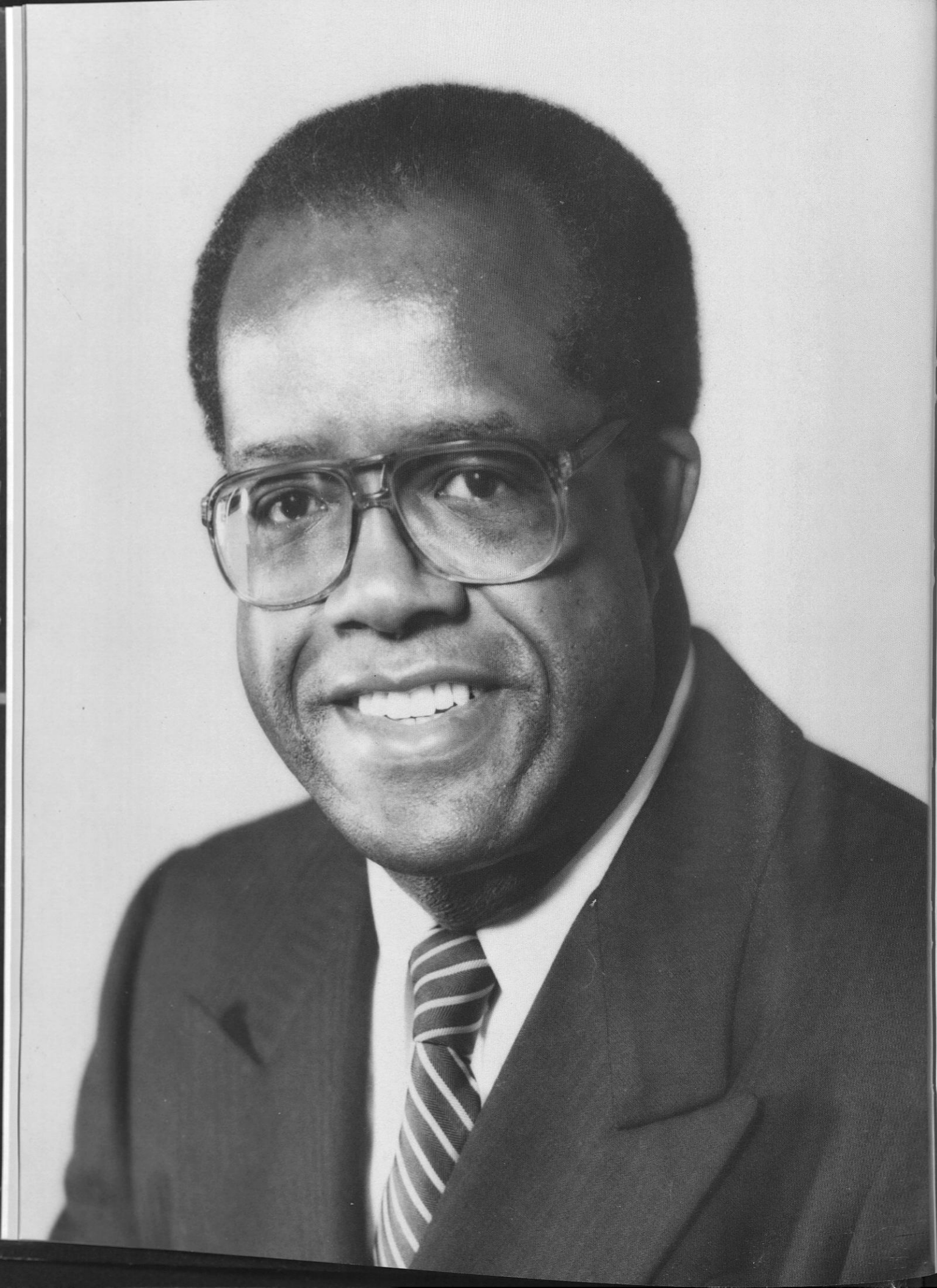
The man, (Lewis B. Adams), who started that procession in 1881 was born (c) 1856. On this, his 100th anniversary, may Tuskegeans everywhere re-dedicate themselves to the continuation of the spirit and wisdom spoken by the founder in his last message:

"Tuskegee has been built up, and been sustained largely...through the cooperation of a number of individuals who...have pinned their faith to it...there are few institutions in the history of the country that can present a more perfect example in the form of teamwork than is true of this institution. But it is most important that this teamwork continue, if we are to continue to hold our own, if we are to continue to continue to grow--so far as the future is concerned."

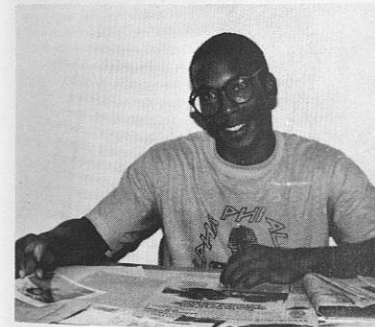
Dear Students:

HISTORY

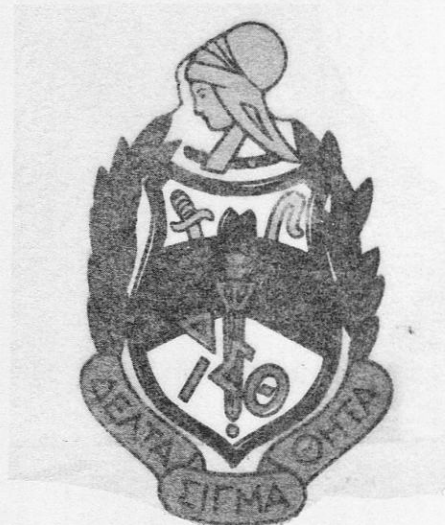
Zeta Phi Beta Sorority was organized at Howard University, Washington, D.C., on January 16, 1920, as a result of encouragement given the five founders by Charles Robert Taylor and Langston Taylor, members of Phi Beta Sigma Fraternity, who felt that the campus would profit by the development of an organization as sisters to the Fraternity. Thus Zeta Phi Beta Sorority and Phi Beta Sigma Fraternity became the first official Greek-letter sister and brother organization.



Delta Sigma Theta Sorority, Inc.

Delta Sigma Theta was founded at Howard University in Washington, D. C., on January 13, 1913, by a group of 22 undergraduate women. The stated purpose of the Founders was to establish a society to promote high cultural, intellectual and moral standards among its members, for its own benefit and for that of the larger society in which it existed.

On December 2, 1982, the Sorors of Gamma Tau Chapter were presented with a "Distinguished Service Award" by Mayor Johnny Ford. This is an award for outstanding meritorious service in the Tuskegee community. As a service project, the Sorors of Gamma Tau contributed \$1,000.00 to the Macon County Council on Retardation and Rehabilitation.

Here's the situation: It was a goal line stance; fourth and three with only six yards from a touchdown for Alabama A&M. For them, the play out of the huddle was a reverse. The Burning of Pinehurst Apartments



Pinehurst Apartments, located within the Tuskegee Institute National Historic District, was a two-story frame building which was built in 1900 and consisted of twenty-nine rooms. It served as a hospital until 1912 when it was renovated into apartments. In 1951, Pinehurst Apartments was in need of extensive repair, but was declared beyond saving. In 1978, the National Park Service, who assumed administration of the Tuskegee Institute National Historic Site in 1976, stated Pinehurst Apartments for possible sale. But after two years of Tuskegee Institute searching for resources to give the apartments any institute function, it was recommended to demolish the structure. March, 1982, Pinehurst Apartments was set aflame. With it went



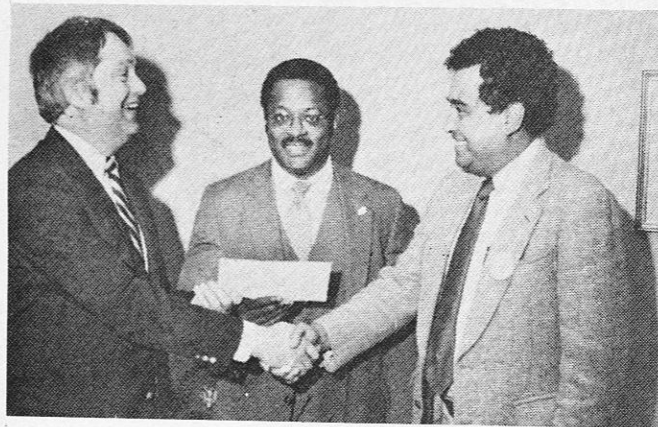

Project participants include presidents, vice presidents, rectors, and senior officials of colleges and universities or government officials who hold decision-making positions relative to higher education planning and administration.

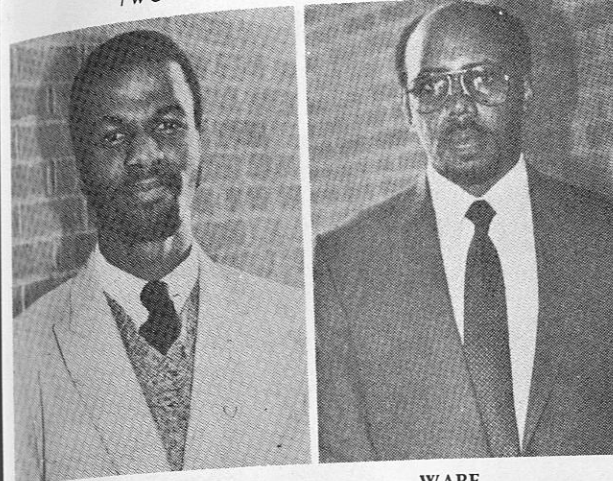

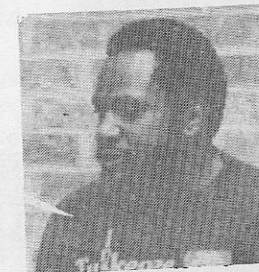

TIGERETTES WIN SIAC CHAMPIONSHIP

Although the 1982-83 basketball season treated the Tigerettes like a hoard of pre-ball Cinderellas, Laster's harsh reality, as marked by the 20-10 record, may yet bloom into a fairy tale.

Tuskegee Institute's Tigerettes won their second Southern Intercollegiate Athletic Conference (SIAC) Tournament Championship in Fort Valley, Ga.

"The Tigerettes had to go through the state of Georgia in order to win the tournament," said Laster. The team took on Atlanta's Morris Brown College, who had only recently defeated Clark College and was hot and ready for a Tigerette Waterloo. Despite the slow pace of the game, the Tigerettes were able to overcome MBC by a score of 68-58.

In the MBC victory, Brelinda Copeland scored 17 points and mastered 16 rebounds. She was followed by Andrea Thomas with 13 points; Tracy Johnson with 10 points; and Teresa Short Brown with 10 points.

The Tigerettes led Fort Valley State College, 34-24 during the half and soon stretched the lead by a whopping 16 points. FVSC closed the chasm to a three-point deficit, losing to the Tigerettes by a heartbreaking 70-73.

Thomas led the scoring category with 18 points, adding 12 rebounds. Annie Edwards scored 11 points; Joan Bloom, 10 points; and Copeland mastered 13 rebounds. Celeste King was the high scorer for the Fort Valley team.

During the Albany State College contest, the Tigerettes were able to pull ahead at the half, 36-31, and built a 13-point lead to win 75-62.

Though the team's 20-10 record falls short of Laster's prediction, notice should be given to the fact that the Tigerette squad is young. The team is made up of seven freshmen, four sophomores, three juniors, and two seniors.

"Seniors Joan Bloom and Annie Edwards did go out in style," said Laster, "by winning the conference tournament and providing excellent leadership for the Tigerettes."

Four Tigerettes were listed on the All-Tournament Team: freshmen Carolyn Thomas and Rosalyn Alexander, and juniors Teresa Brown and Andrea Thomas. Thomas was also selected Most Valuable Player. This was a welcomed honor for Thomas, who had been in Laster's doghouse for not playing up to her dynamic potential. The Hustler award was earned by Teresa Brown. The Tigerettes were also the Regular Season Champions of the SIAC.

The team's next move will be to Valdosta State College in Georgia, where, chances are, they will compete against the University of Central Florida on March 11. The SIAC has an automatic berth to the NCAA-II National Tournament, and the Tigerettes are likely to compete in the first round of the South Regionals.

News Around Tuskegee

BURGESS, PREYERS, "PARENTS OF THE YEAR"

Parents have always been deeply involved in the works of Tuskegee Institute since its founding, said Tuskegee Institute president, Dr. Benjamin F. Payton, at the school's 20th Annual Parents' Day held Saturday.

"We are in a new day," said Payton, "but the problems are very old. We (blacks) are still very much disadvantaged and behind the times." He added that the end of slavery did not symbolize the end of struggle.

Payton said a key issue of concern is "how to finance the education of talented young people."

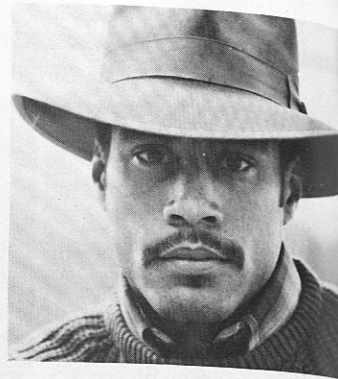

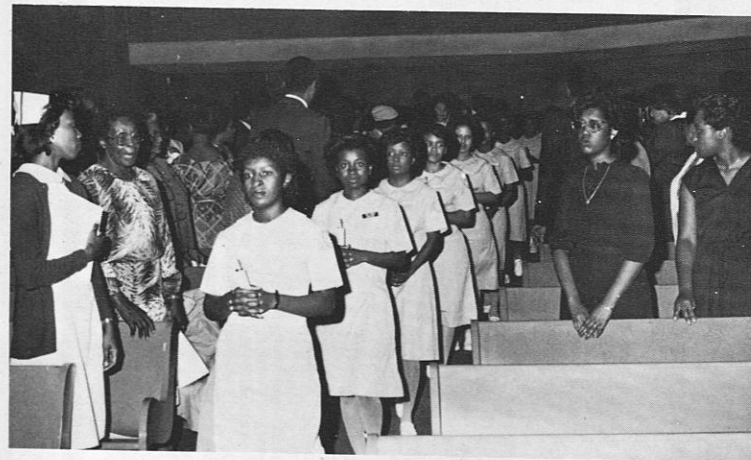

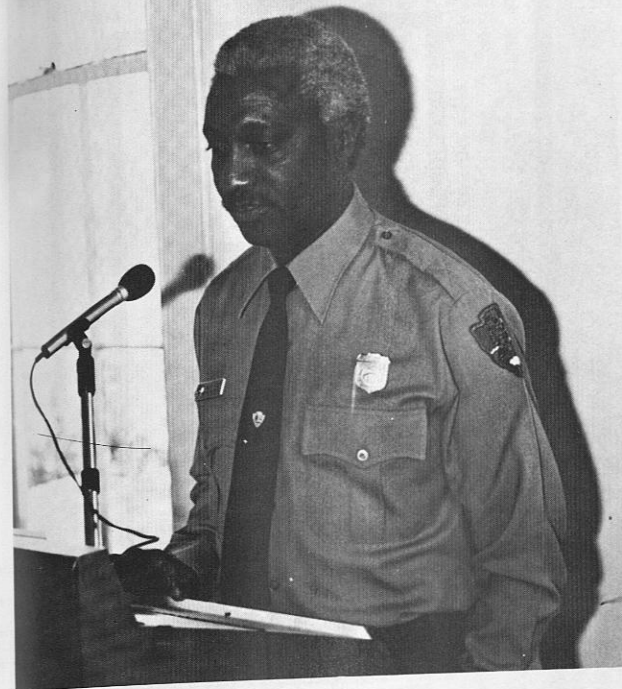

Doctor: Wallace in pain but able to work

BIRMINGHAM, Ala. — Gov. George C. Wallace will never be without pain, but the discomfort is "manageable" and there is no medical reason Wallace cannot perform his duties as governor, a doctor said Thursday.

Dr. Thomas James said the 63-year-old governor, who entered University Hospital on Saturday, should be ready to return to work in Montgomery "in a few days."

Despite lingering abdominal pain and minor depressions, James said, "there is no reason medically he could not continue as governor through his term," which ends in January 1987.

James said Wallace has had varying degrees of pain since 1972 when he was paralyzed from the waist down by a would-be assassin's bullet.

"The severity of the pain, on a scale of one to 10, usually is about a four," James said at a news conference. "It waxes and wanes, dropping at times to a one or two and increasing at times to a seven or eight."

"I expect he will have chronic pain for the rest of his life, but it will be manageable," said James, who is coordinating Wallace's treatment at the hospital.

James said that "in a few days" the govern-

nor will be released and will be able to go directly to his work at the Capitol, but he said he could not predict exactly when that will be.

"Our main hope is that he will renew his exercise and physio-therapy," James said. "Because of the demands of the campaign and of his work as governor, he has let them slip. I scolded him a little about it ... He was compulsive about his exercise for years. He is still in excellent physical health but we would like for him to regain some of that muscle tone. We are

asking him to regain that conscientiousness." The doctor said tests showed no enlargements of Wallace's vital organs. He said Wallace has mild hypertension but that medications have controlled it.

Billy Joe Camp, the governor's press secretary, said Wallace had several visitors representing possible new industries for the state, in his hospital room Wednesday and Thursday.

Wallace was hospitalized for a week in February for treatment of diverticulitis, an intestinal inflammation, and for a week earlier because of reaction to medicines.

Medication given him to clear up the diverticulitis lowered the levels of sodium and potassium, the doctor said, "and that has been corrected."

James said Wallace now is taking "a modest range of medication" for pain and depression. "He is not dependent on it. In fact, it helps improve his functions."

The depression, James said, is of the secondary type, a natural reaction to pain, "and is more straightforward to deal with than primary depression would be ... but it is a vicious cycle. As the pain gets worse, the depression gets worse."

Marcos swears in son, 24, as governor

MANILA, Philippines — President Ferdinand E. Marcos swore in his only son, Ferdinand Jr., 24, as governor of Ilocos Norte, Marcos' home province north of Manila, the presidential palace announced Thursday. Young Marcos, nicknamed Bong-Bong, replaces his aunt, Elizabeth Marcos Rocka, who the palace said resigned for health reasons. He was elected vice governor of the province in an unopposed election in 1980 and was responsible for upgrading the province's slaughterhouse and for holding sports tournaments, the palace said.

Picasso work damaged in Athens exhibit

ATHENS, Greece — A painting by Pablo Picasso was damaged while on exhibit at the National Gallery of Art in Athens, the Greek Ministry of Culture said Thursday. The painting, "The Reading Girl," was part of an exhibition of 106 of the artist's works from the Picasso Museum in Paris and private collections that opened March 14.

Clark a slave to artificial heart?

BOSTON — A medical ethics lawyer said Thursday that artificial heart recipient Barney Clark was a slave to the technology that kept him alive for 112 days.

"In the beginning the heart was a means to an end," said George Annas of the Boston University School of Medicine, "but in the end, the heart became the end and Clark became the means."

When Clark, 62, underwent the implant operation at the University of Utah Medical Center in Salt Lake City, the artificial heart was a means to keep him alive, Annas said.

"As time went on that changed, and Dr. Clark was a means to keep the heart alive. It's hard to say when that change occurred," he said.

The plastic device was still beating in Clark's chest when his major organs gave out Wednesday night and he died.

"I think it was an outrage to say he died a quick and painless death." The issue is, did he live 112 days, or was he dying for 112 days?" he asked.

Six perish in Florida motel fire

JACKSONVILLE, Fla. — A blaze apparently set by an arsonist at a motel without fire alarms killed six people and left one seriously injured early Thursday, firefighters said. Rest-dents of the Palms, a three-story brick and stucco building, scrambled down stairs and jumped to safety from windows after the fire broke out shortly after midnight. Current building codes do not require fire alarms for a building such as the Palms. Many of the motel's guests used the Palms as a rooming house. "We have reason to believe it was probably an arson fire," said Capt. R.E. Huntley, fire marshal's investigator. "There were three points of origin." No fire-code violations were discovered in the building's last annual inspection in March 1982, he said.

Birth of 'test tube' twins is first in U.S.

MANHASSET, N.Y. — The United States' first "test-tube" twins — a boy and girl — were born Thursday at North Shore University Hospital.

"The condition of the mother and the children is good," Dan Rosett, a hospital spokesman, said after the twins were delivered by Caesarean section.

Rosett identified the parents as Todd and Nancy Tilton, of Sea Cliff on Long Island.

Rosett said the girl, Heather Jane, weighing 7 pounds, 4½ ounces, arrived at 10:53 a.m.; the boy, Todd Macdonald II, was born a minute later, weighing 7 pounds, 1½ ounces.

The in vitro fertilization was done at the Eastern Virginia Medical School in Norfolk, Va., the first test-tube baby center in the country, Rosett said.

He said that, at the request of the Tilttons, there would be no interviews or pictures until a news conference at the hospital Monday.

Tilton, 37, is an accountant for a Wall Street firm. Mrs. Tilton, 31, taught art at the Friends' School in Locust Valley. They have been married about eight years.

There have been births of test-tube twins in Europe and Australia but Heather Jane and Todd Macdonald are the first in the United States.

Strong earthquake rocks western Greece

ATHENS, Greece — A strong earthquake Thursday shook western Greece, but no damage or injuries were reported, the Athens Seismological Institute said. The earthquake, registering 5.4 on the Richter scale, had its epicenter 180 miles west of Athens and was the fourth since Wednesday night in western Greece and the Ionian Sea.

Springtime storms sweep across the nation

Surprising spring dropped a half-foot of wet, heavy snow on Dixie's magnolias and dogwoods Thursday. The biggest storm ever so late in the season knocked out power to thousands, shut schools in four states and menaced budding fruit crops.

Northern California slogged through another routine day — torrential rain, hail, thunder, lightning, powerful winds and raging surf.

Up to 14 inches of snow fell in the Sierra Nevada and steady rains triggered mudslides in saturated Southern California.

Arctic cold froze the Northeast, plunging the mercury to 5-below zero at Pellston, Mich.

The Dixie storm system spawned strong winds and tornadoes on central

Florida's Atlantic coast. It ripped off roofs, overturned mobile homes and cars and knocked down power lines and trees.

The snowstorm, spawned by a low pressure system off the Gulf of Mexico and catching forecasters by surprise, was greeted with chagrin by a transplanted Yankee and delight by a Florida family vacationing in north Georgia.

"I woke up and opened the curtains and there was all this snow. It just flooded me. I thought I left all this all behind me," groaned Kevin Conlin, who moved recently from Delaware to Birmingham, Ala.

Said Ann Cabre of Merritt Island, Fla.: "My 12-year-old daughter had never seen snow and she almost bounced off the four walls in the chalet when she woke up this morning. It is simply beauti-

ful. We had never expected anything like this on the trip. We had planned to leave but I think we will stay and enjoy this."

Seven inches of snow fell on Atlanta and 4 inches on Birmingham, the heaviest snow ever to fall so late in the year in Georgia and Alabama. Several inches more were expected in some spots. The storm stretched into Tennessee and North Carolina, where it threatened to freeze tender strawberry vines and peach buds.

Schools were closed throughout most of north Georgia and central Alabama, and in northeast Mississippi and North Carolina. The wet, heavy snow knocked out electricity to about 14,000 homes in Georgia, and 2,000 in Alabama.

Morning rush hour traffic moved slowly and various runways were closed

for a time at Atlanta Hartsfield Airport. City side streets were glutted with slush.

The Florida twisters forced postponement of the opening round of the \$700,000 Tournament Players Golf Championship, richest stop on the pro tour.

One Binghamton, N.Y., vacationer, camped in a recreational vehicle near Winter Haven, Fla., said the storm was frightening as it swept through.

"It sounded like the world was coming to an end. We'll take snow any day," Audrey Casey said.

Rain-soaked hillsides slid onto the Pacific Coast Highway at several points in the Malibu and Culver City areas near Los Angeles, closing a 14-mile stretch of the coastal road at Malibu.

Twin-engine plane crashes near Macon, killing four members of Arkansas family

MACON — Four members of a Pine Bluff, Ark., family, including two children, were killed early Thursday when a twin-engine airplane ferrying checks for the Federal Reserve Board crashed into a swamp about 15 miles southeast of Macon.

The Twiggs County Sheriff's Department identified the victims as Joe Michael Holland, 28; his wife, Betty A. Holland, 26; and their children, Beverly Gale Holland, 4, and Sandy Holland, 6.

Jack Barker, a spokesman for the Federal Aviation Administration in Atlanta, said the airplane, operated by McCauley Aviation of Pine Bluff, was transporting bank checks from Jacksonville, Fla., to Atlanta when it crashed, about 2:40 a.m. Thursday.

Barker said the plane, a turboprop MU-2 Mitsubishi, was flying at 18,000 feet when it lost contact with the Atlanta air traffic control center. He said an investigator from the National Transportation Safety Board and an inspector from the FAA were at the scene of the crash trying to determine the cause.

Twiggs County Sheriff Robert Weekly, who found the wreckage about one-half mile east of Bullard Road near Interstate 16, said his wife heard the crash from their home six miles away.

Weekly said officers had to wade through waist-deep water to reach the main part of the wreckage. He said debris from the crash was scattered in a half-mile radius around a beaver pond inside the swamp.

Ron Stallings of Atlanta, a partner in McCauley Aviation, said the crash was the first involving an airplane from his company, which contracts with the Federal Reserve Bank to transport checks between banks at night.

The checks on board the flight that left Jacksonville early Thursday were scattered in the area around the crash, Stallings said, noting that such checks are microfilmed routinely before being put on the plane so there will be a record should an accident occur.

Stallings said Holland was the chief pilot for McCauley Aviation and had worked for the company since 1981. He said company policy allows pilots to bring their families along on such flights.

Chicago: Are rules same for blacks?

CHICAGO — "Now — before it's too late!" is the tag line of one of the radio commercials being used by Bernard Epton, the Republican candidate for mayor of Chicago.

The words of the commercial are about city finances. But political messages here are being delivered in code these days. After all, it would be impolitic, maybe even impolitic, to come right out and say: "Now — before the blacks take over."

As a Republican candidate in a very Democratic city, Epton wouldn't have enough money to buy radio time and would be extraordinarily lucky to get even a third of the vote on April 12. As a white candidate against a black Democratic candidate, however, Epton could conceivably win.

I doubt very much that that will happen. But a lot of Republicans seem to believe that it can if they scare enough whites. Before Rep. Harold Washington won the Democratic nomination against the split vote of two white candidates, Epton was ignored even by his own party. He wasn't even invited when President Reagan visited Chicago in February for a Republican fund-raising dinner.

Now there are funds and help. James Fletcher, Gov. James Thompson's former campaign manager, is there to direct the Epton campaign, and media consultant John Deardourff, the best the Republicans have, has rushed in from Washington to make the Republican's commercials.

Epton's campaigning has changed since his new advisers hit town. Epton, a former state representative from one of Chicago's few integrated districts, used to ramble on about taxes and education, sort of vaguely dismissing race as an issue. He seemed embarrassed about the whole thing.

Now — before it's too late — he knows better. His talk and his commercials follow the private polls on both sides that identify certain issues as essentially racial.

Physical fear is one issue. Epton has scheduled then canceled appearances in black neighborhoods, announcing that he is afraid that his supporters might be attacked.

Jesse Jackson is another. Epton has created opportunities to bring up the name of the big-talking reverend, who is despised and feared by white Chicago (and by some of black Chicago, too).

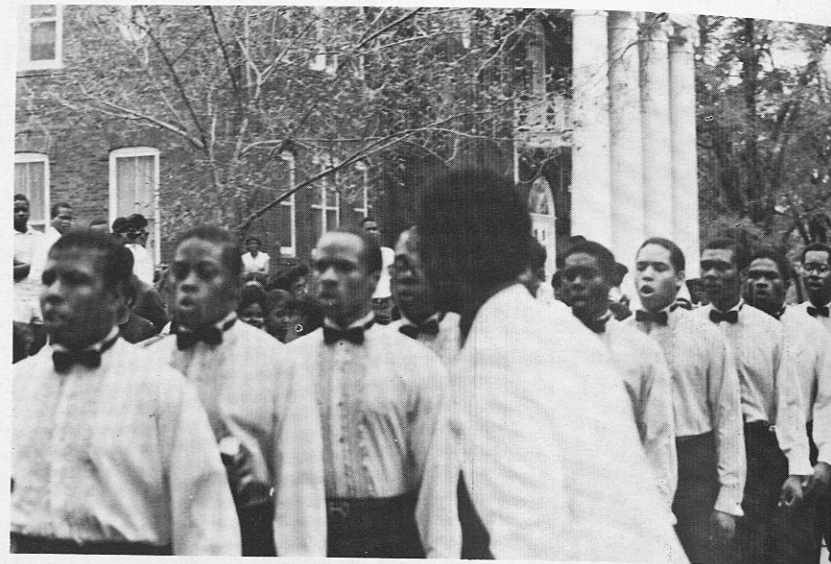

The only issue in Chicago is race. Mayor Jane Byrne, a loser in the Democratic primary, would not have attempted to run a pathetic write-in campaign if Washington were white, she seemed to think she could get some votes because the Democrat is black and the Republican is Jewish.

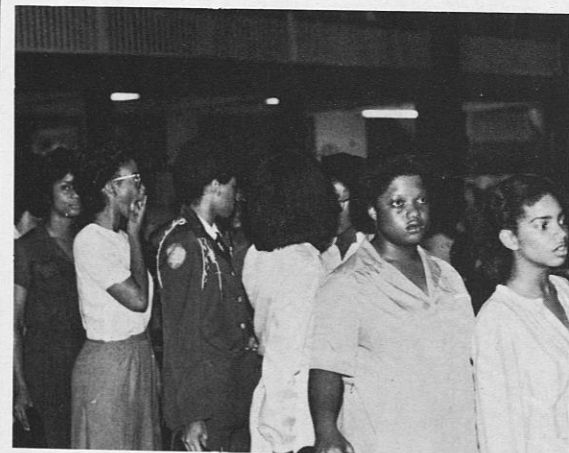
In fact, there would be no real contest at all if the Democratic candidate were white — even if he had had a few run-ins with the law. Big-shouldered Chicago laughed at Republicans but the game changed when a black man won the Democratic race. The question in Chicago now is the great American issue: Are the rules of the game the same for black people as for white people?

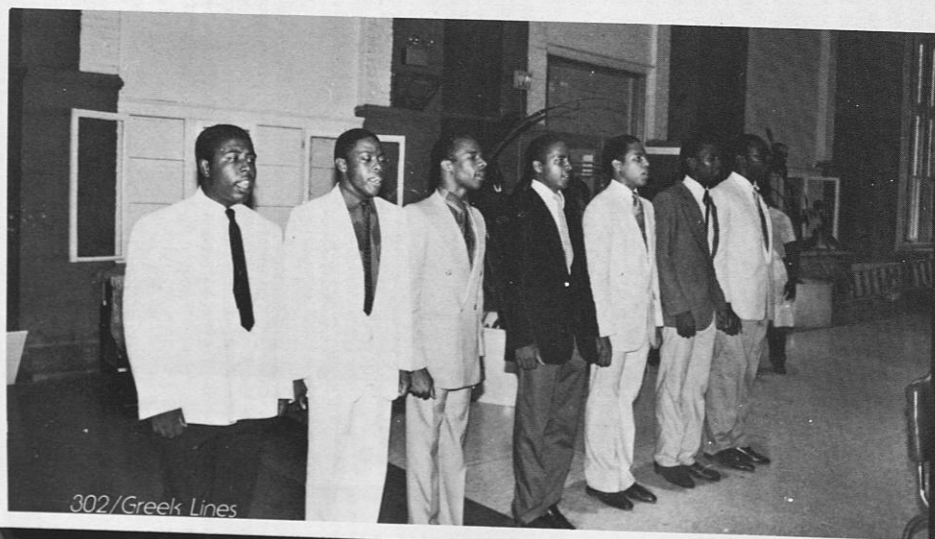

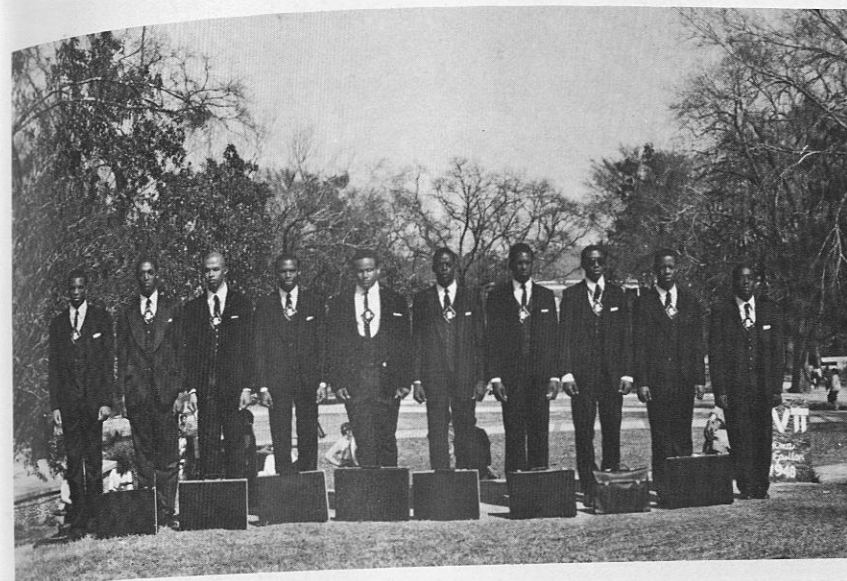

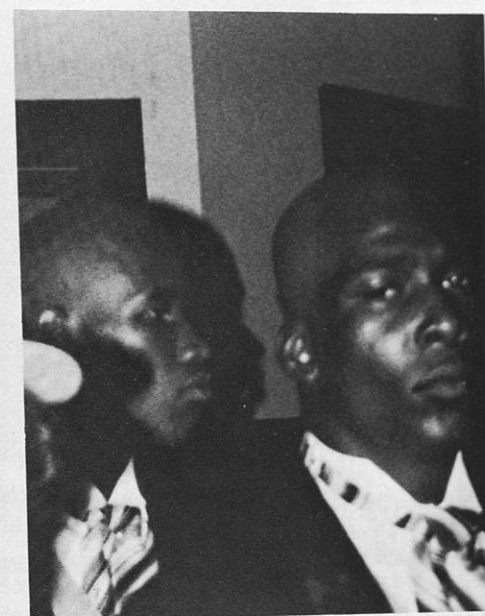

The significance of walking in line is to make the pledges feel as though they're one unit. This helps them to organize, and get to know others in which they are coming into the organization with, and to

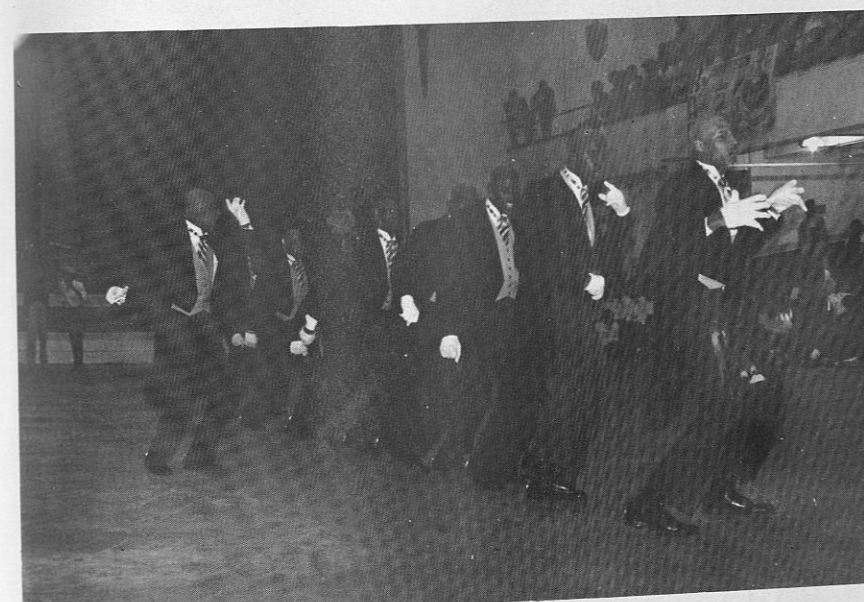
