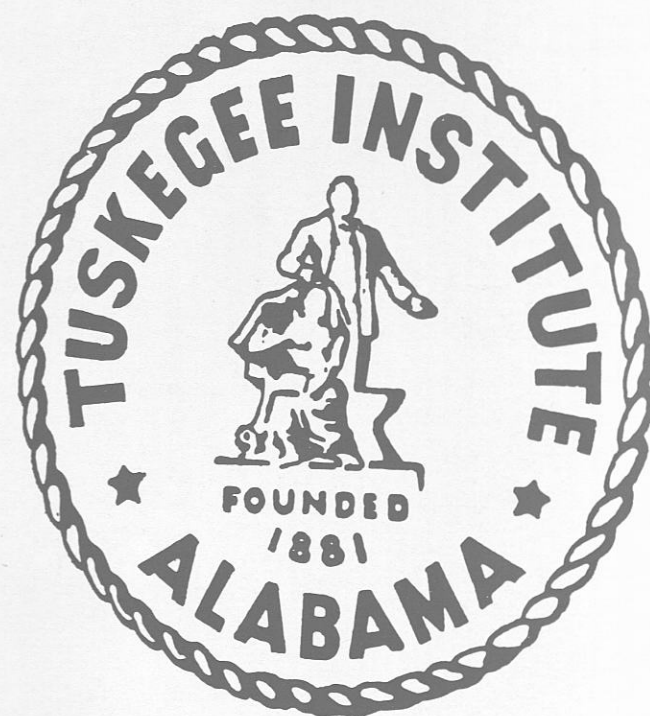

A TOUCH OF CLASS

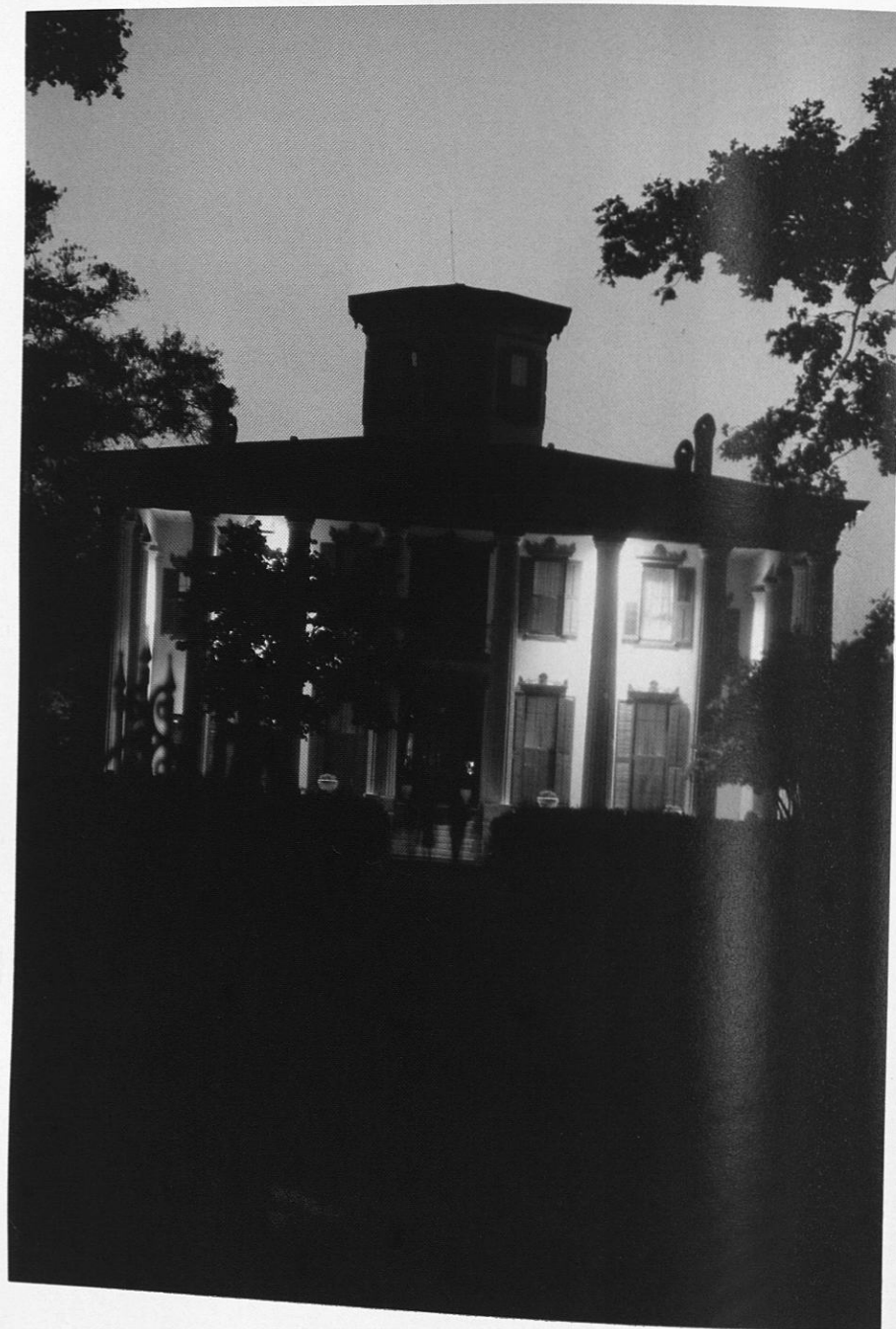


In 1880, a bill which included a yearly appropriation of \$2,000 was passed by the Alabama State legislature to establish a school for blacks in Macon County. This bill, signed by Rufus Willis Cob became law February 12, 1881, thus establishing the Tuskegee Normal School for the training of Black teachers. Soon after, a three-man commission was established to govern the school, who in turn hired Booker T. Washington to teach. Booker T. Washington opened the school on July 4, 1881, thus changing the name from Tuskegee Normal to Tuskegee Institute. On this most glorious day, thirty black men from Macon and neighboring counties gathered to attend school.

On November 14, 1915, Booker T. Washington died. At the time of his death, the foundation had been laid for a strong Tuskegee Institute. Its endowment amounted to approximately \$2,000,000 and the student enrollment numbered 1,500.

Tuskegee regards its first 100 years with considerable pride. Founded under the dynamic and creative leadership of one of the nations greatest educators, Tuskegee Institute developed from a humble beginning to an astonishing educational landmark. It was founded in the purest "log cabin tradition," for Booker T. Washington held his first class in a one room shanty. The Institute was first acclaimed by Alabama and then by the nation, for the soundness and vigor of its educational programs and principles. This renowned vigor has continued through subsequent administrations of the late Dr. Robert Russa Moton (1915-1935); Dr. Frederick D. Patterson (1935-1953); Dr. Luther H. Foster (1953-1981); and presently, Dr. Benjamin F. Payton, Jr. (August 1, 1981).

The Grey Columns mansion, built for William Varner by slave craftsmen, exemplifies the gracious style of living that was typical of high southern society in the 1850's. The house is a fine example of Greek Revival architecture with some Italianate features.

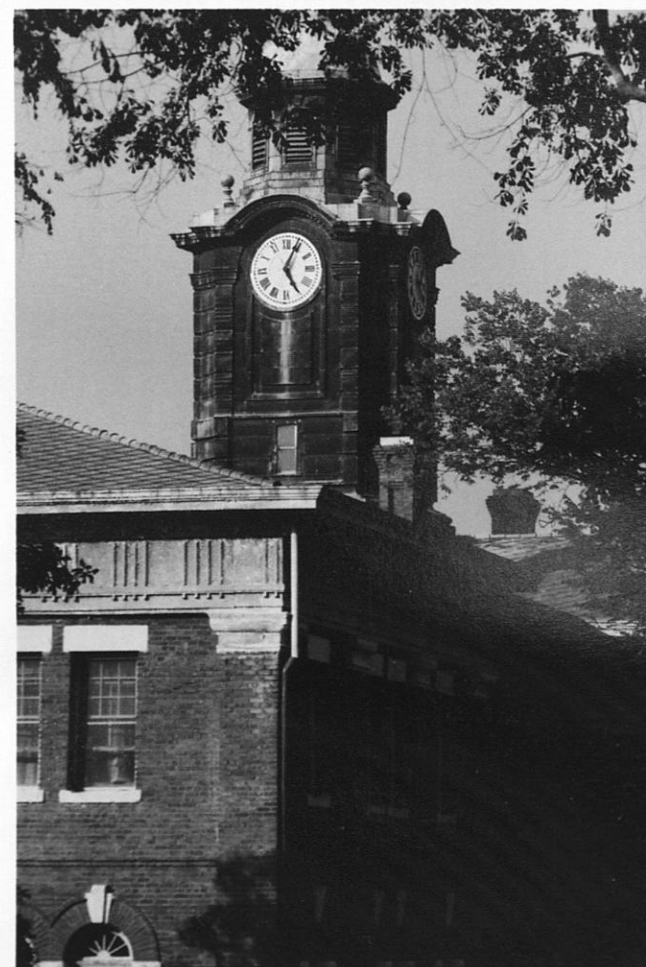


A TOUCH OF CLASS THE INSTITUTE

Many of Tuskegee Institute's buildings constructed while Booker T. Washington was alive, still exist. Most of them are built of brick made on the campus by students. Architect R.R. Taylor, the first black graduate (1892) of MIT, and a Tuskegee faculty member, designed most of the historic buildings and supervised construction by students. Many new buildings have erected since then, among them are the Architect Building, Tuskegee Institute Chapel, and in the very near future, a new Aerospace Engineering Building.

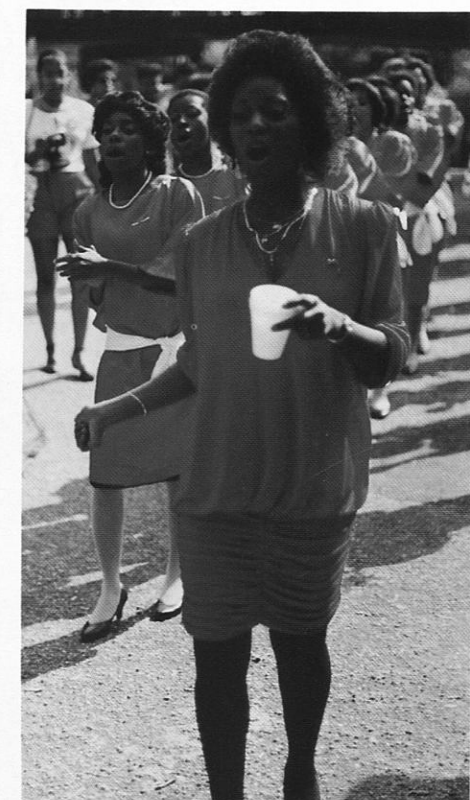

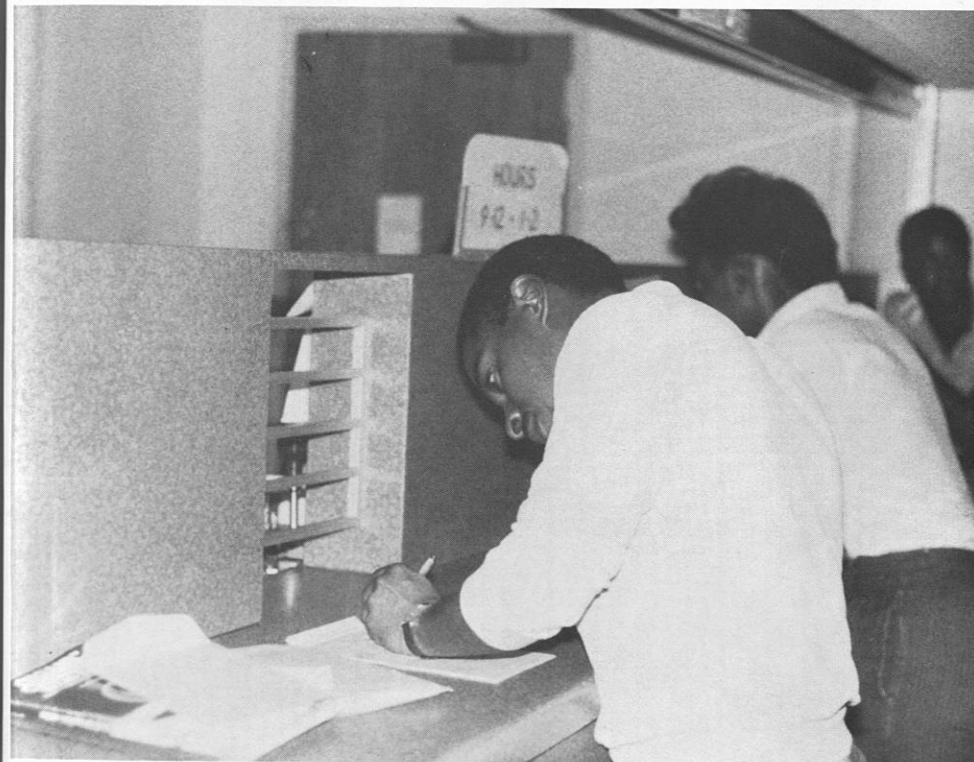

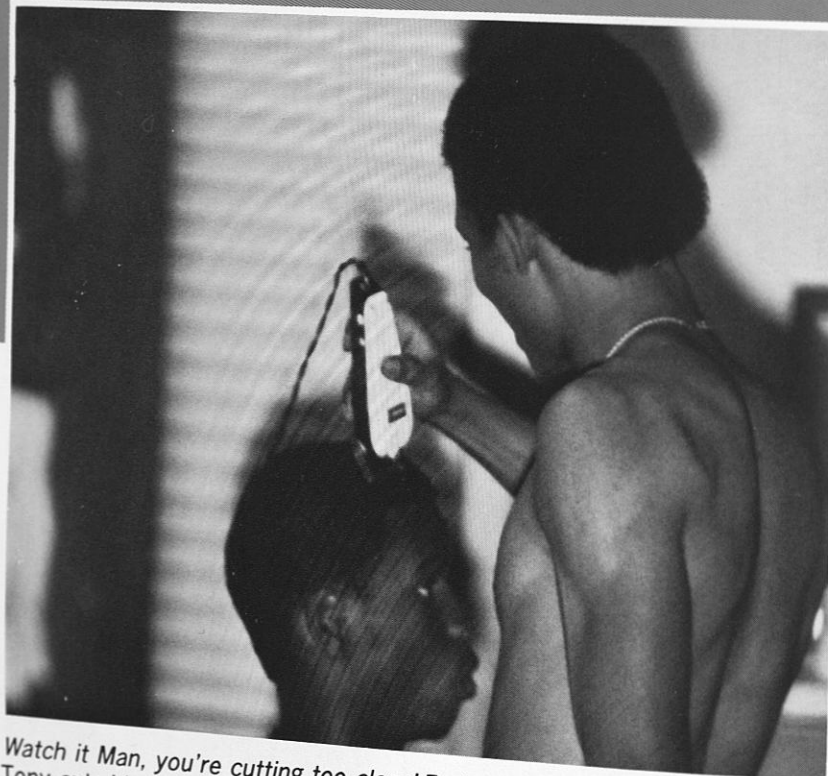
TAKE TIME TO MAKE TIME . . .

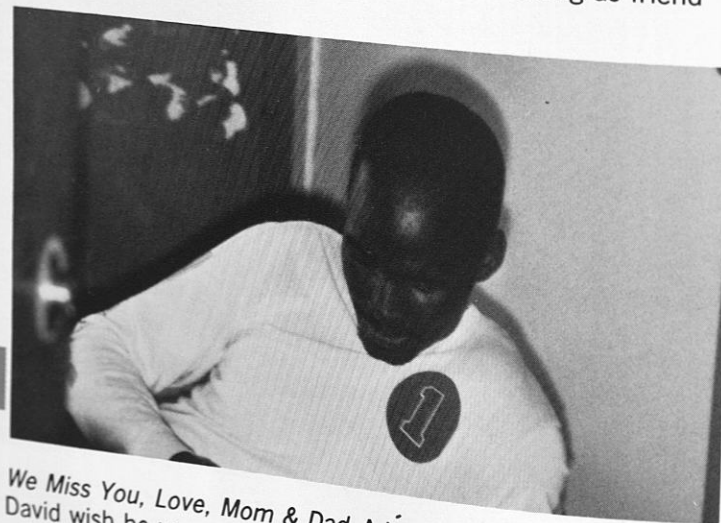
off campus it could cost anywhere from three to six dollars, but on campus it only cost one or two dollars.

How about taking time to read your mail or to write a letter! It takes time. Who knows it could be a letter from Mom, Dad or even the

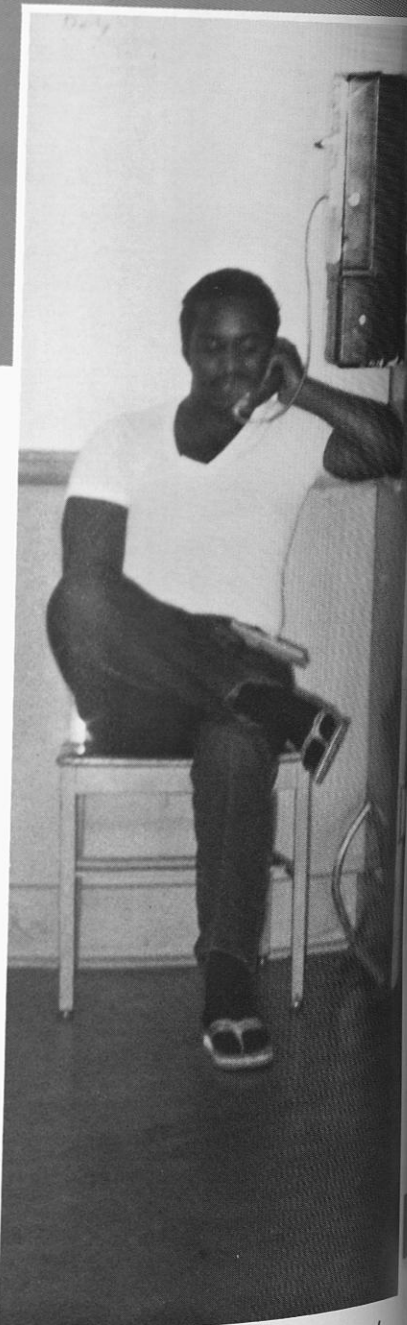

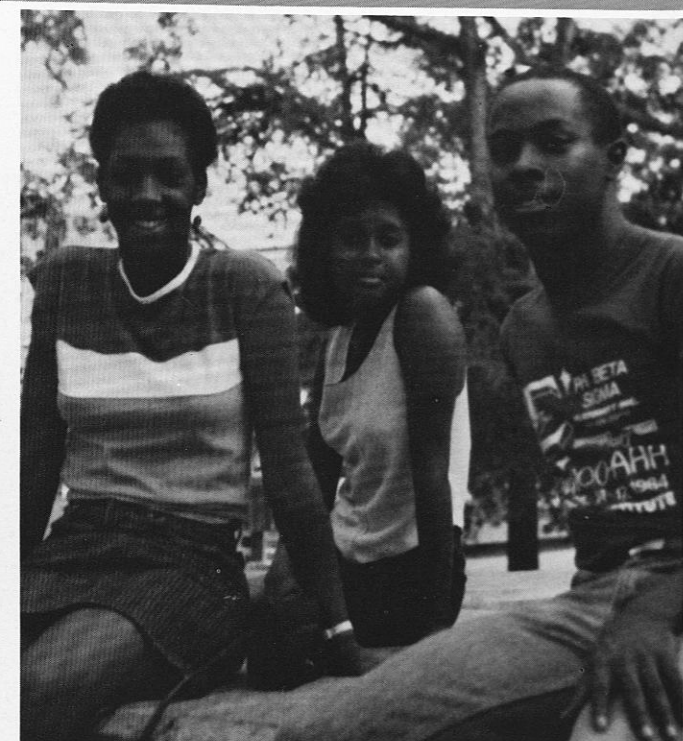

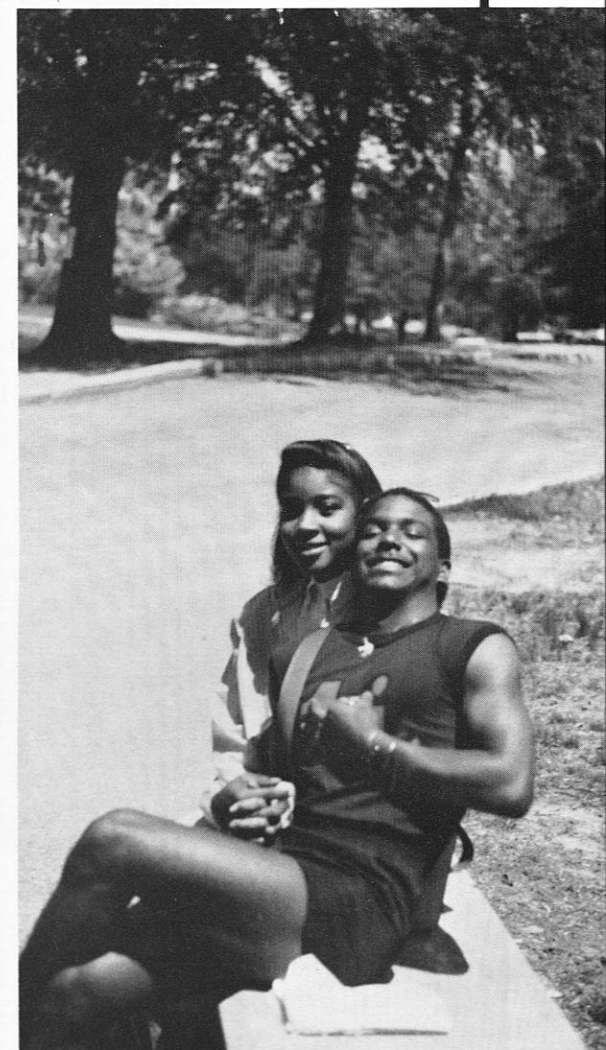

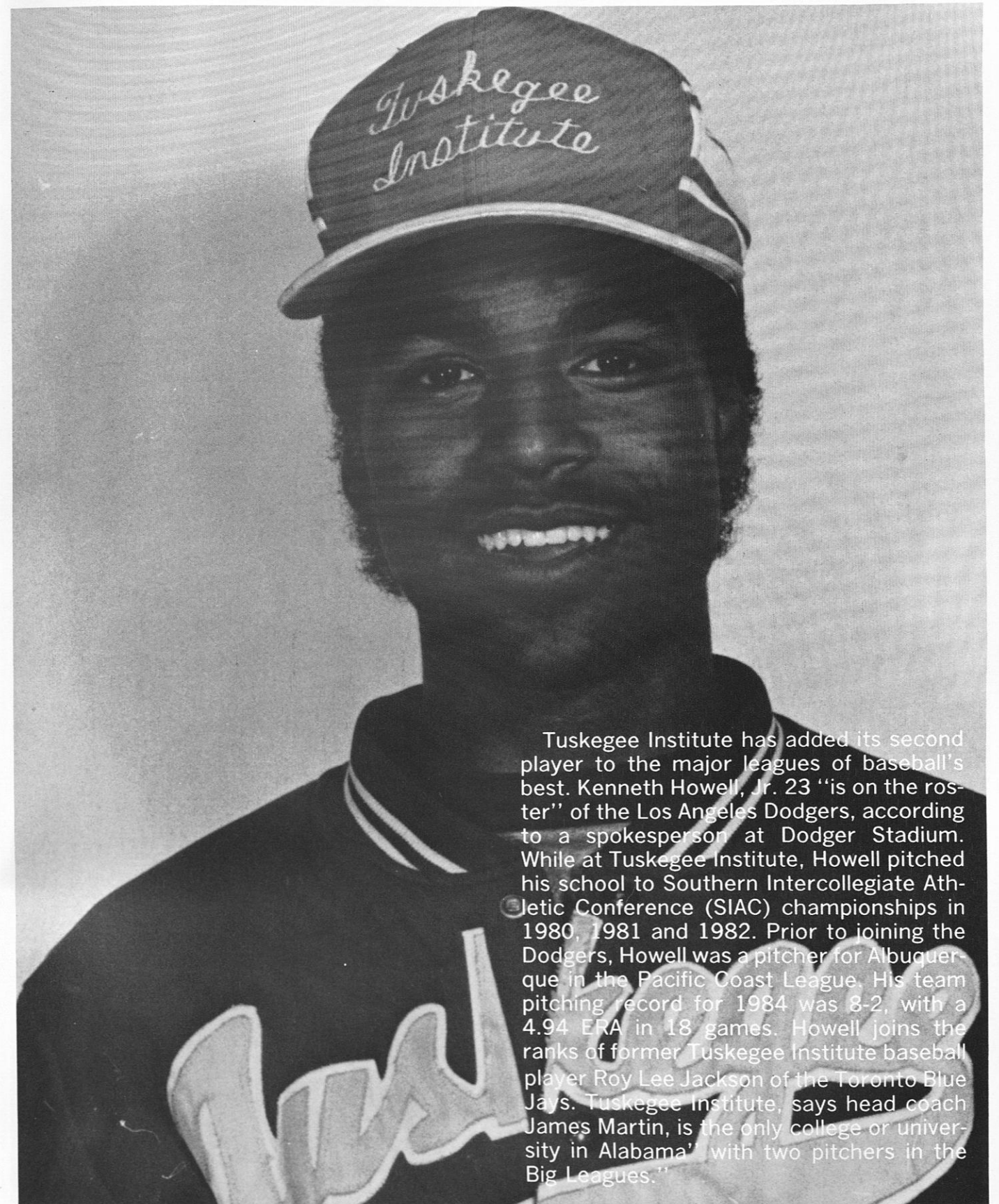


Tuskegee Institute, Al. — Tuskegee Institute's "Operation Discovery" project was scheduled months ago but, as workers and coordinators of the project put it, "The project kept growing and growing." Grammy Award winner and Tuskegee graduate Lionel Richie has agreed to chair a nationwide search for graduates and former students of Tuskegee Institute who number, school officials believe, about 75,000, as well as prospective students. Although it has correct and updated addresses for some 20,000 alumni, Tuskegee's Office of Alumni Affairs has set a goal of finding 70,000 alumni by 1986. Tuskegee Institute has

well over 100 alumni clubs throughout the country, and many will play an active roll in the "Operation Discovery" project. Alumni clubs are organizing volunteer groups to help record the whereabouts of 'lost' alumni. On October 6, radio stations across the country will broadcast a tape with Richie's appeal to Tuskegee alumni to inform the school of their whereabouts. Richie and his wife Brenda, also a Tuskegee graduate, are co-chairing "Operation Discovery" on October 6. Committees have been formed in Tuskegee to ensure the success of the event. Alumni chapters are being asked to secure one-half page adver-

tisements in the major newspaper in their vicinity to promote "Operation Discovery".

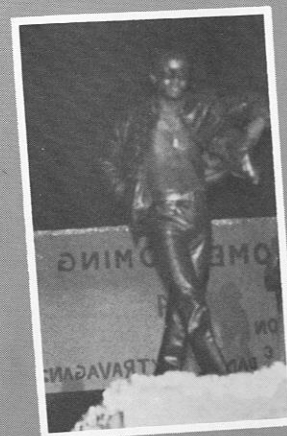
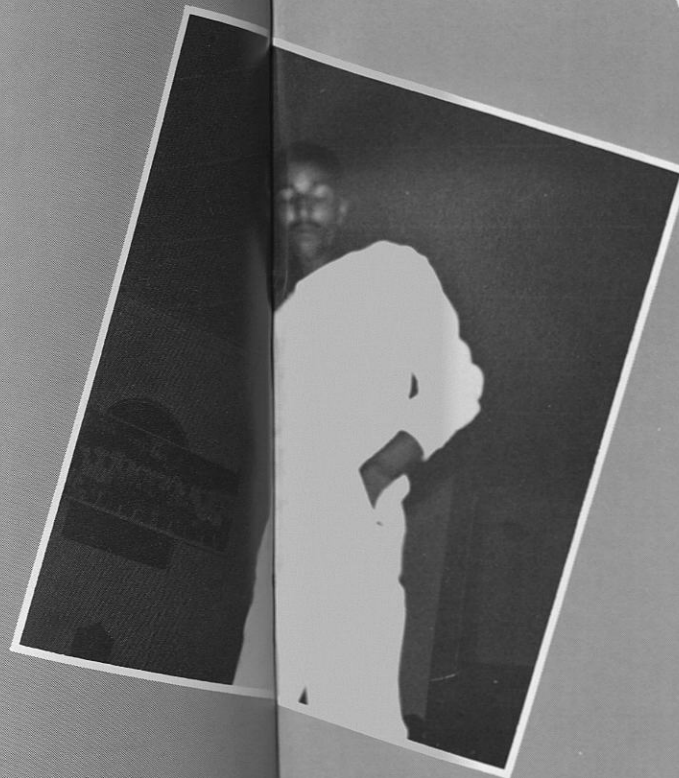
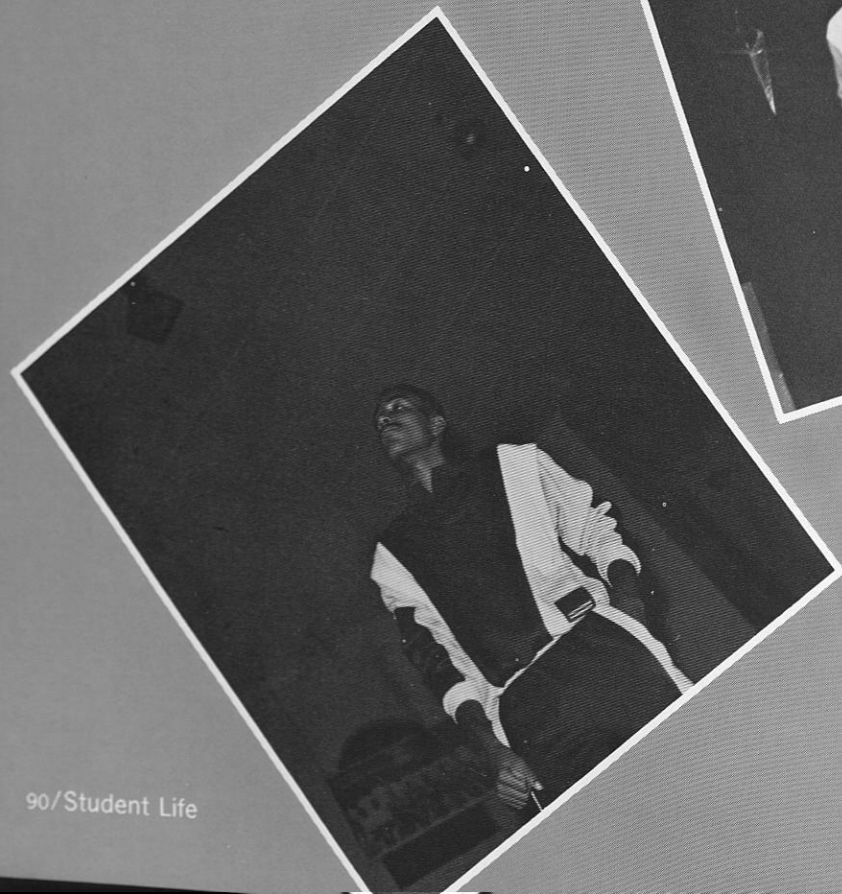
Each predominately black church in the areas of "Discovery" broadcasts will receive a letter from Richie to be read before congregations on Sunday, October 7. In the letter, Richie will express thanks to all Tuskegee Institute alumni and prospective students for participating in the program. The letter will also include a toll-free number for those who wish to call during the following three weeks. Cynthia Henderson, Alumni Affairs director, and Alberta Richie, Lionel's mother, are serving as national coordinators for "Operation Discovery."

MASSEY NAMED



DEAN OF CHAPEL



A minister and educator, who for some six years was the speaker on an international radio broadcast program of the Church of God, has been named Dean of the Chapel and Institute Professor of Religion at Tuskegee Institute.

James Earl Massey is coming to Tuskegee Institute from the Anderson Graduate School of Theology (Indiana) where he was Professor of the New Testament and Preaching. He is replacing Chaplain Andrew L. Johnson, who is retiring.

In announcing the appointment, President Payton said the chaplaincy has been elevated to the position of dean, and Dr. Massey will also have professorial status and teach classes in the Department of Philosophy and Religion.

A religious editor and author of more than sixteen books, President Payton called Dean Massey "one of the most outstanding preachers and religious educators in America."

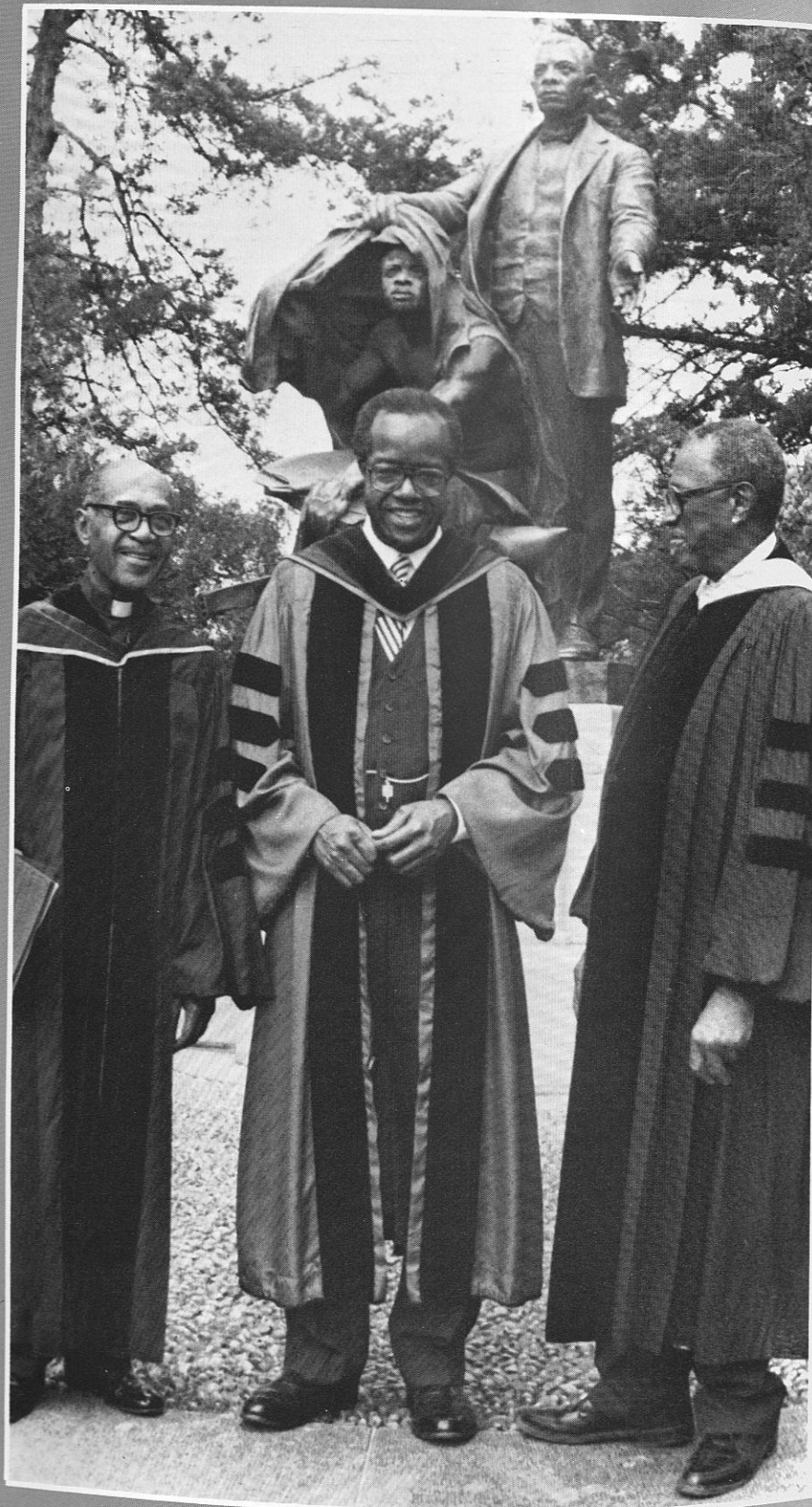

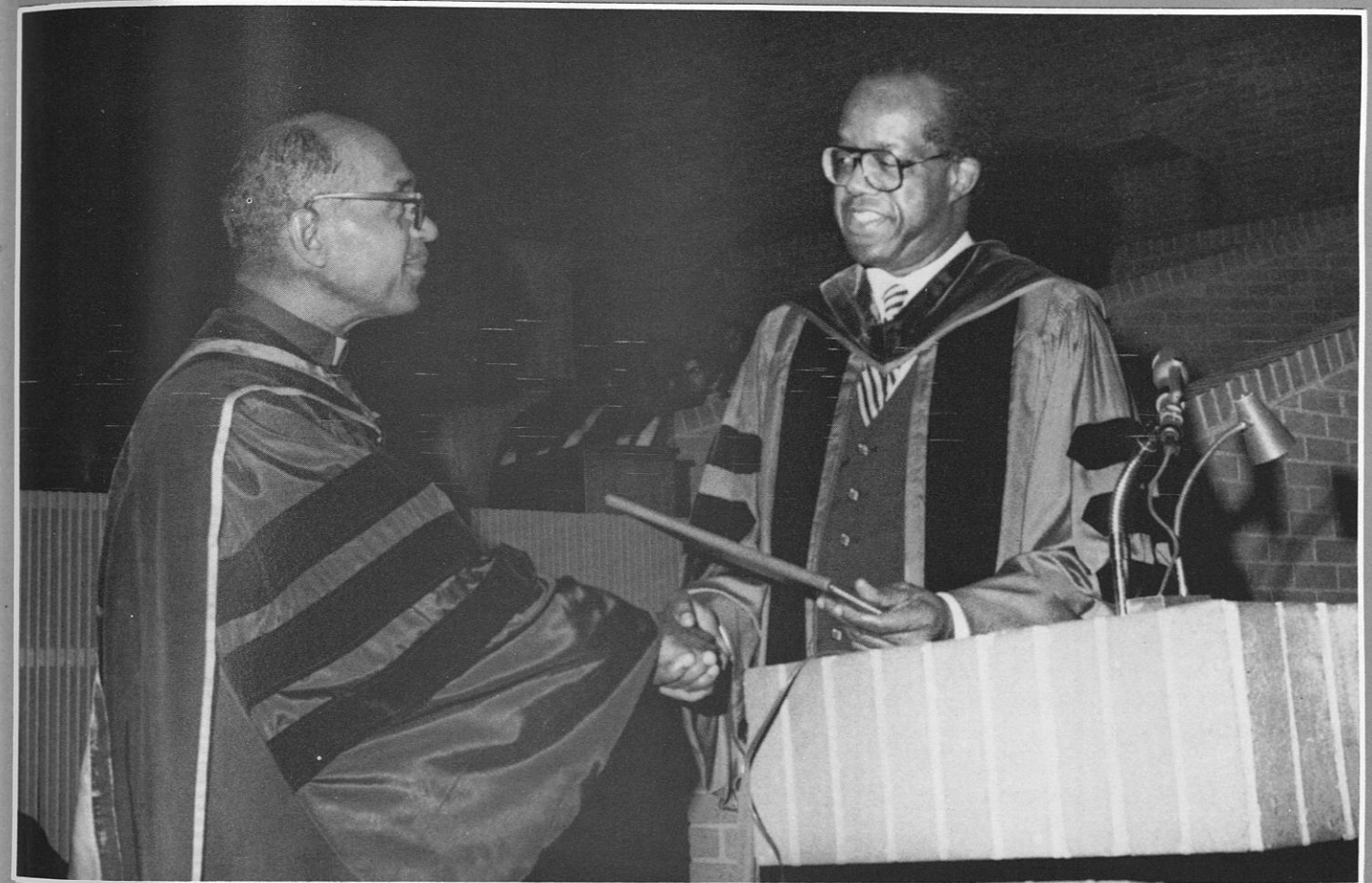

During the Fall Convocation this year, the school's former chaplain and retired dean of Agriculture and Home Economics were named to EMERITUS status.

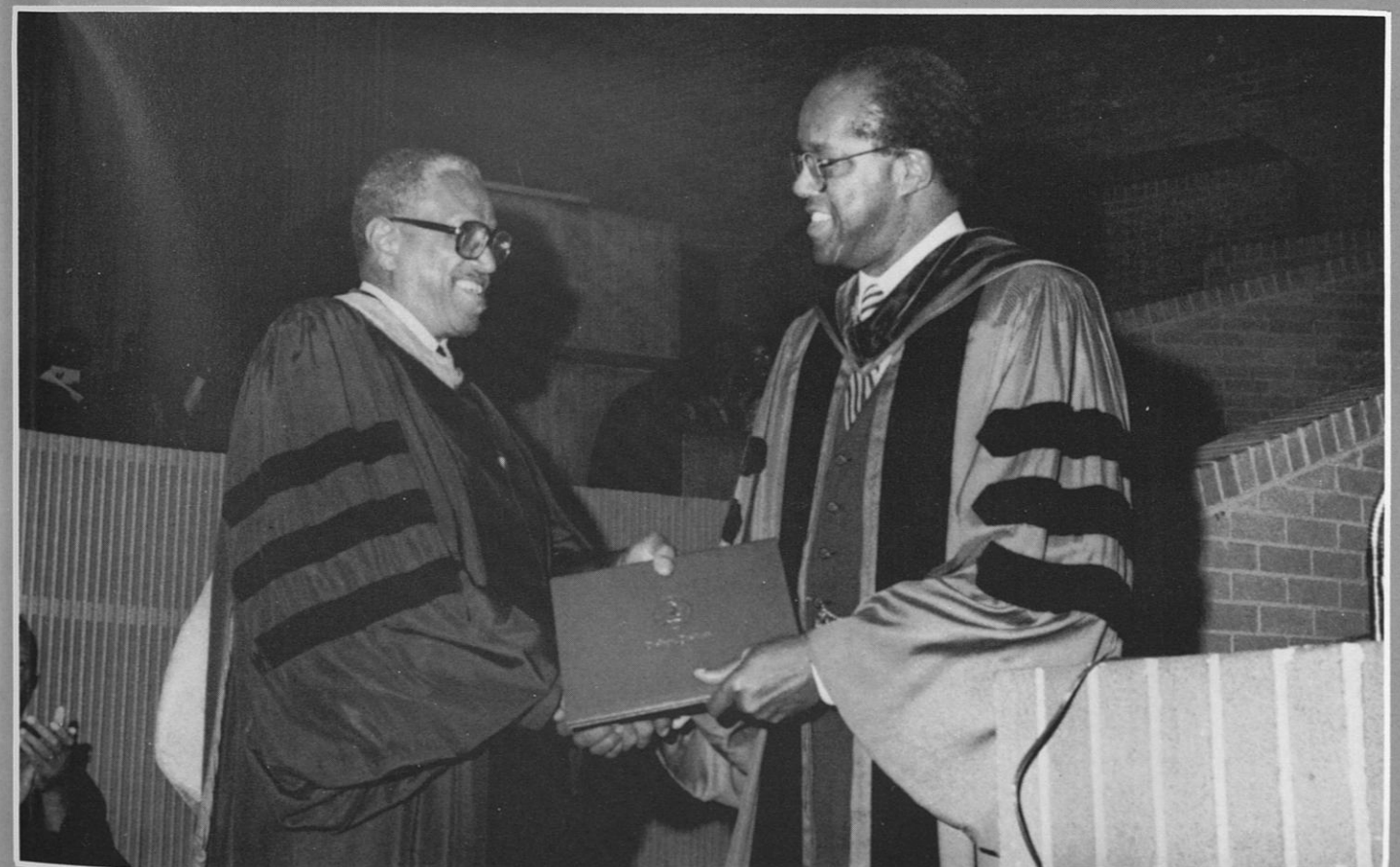

T.I. ESSAY CONTEST AND ACADEMIC AWARDS NIGHT HELD

A freshman student speaker has changed the American public with responsibility for what he called "a cancer that is eating away at our public education" system. One of three winners from an original field of more than 20 student participants, Joseph Pace took exception to the long standing notion among some people that a better education was available at northern institutions as opposed to southern schools, and that white schools should be preferred over black institutions.

"We are responsible for that cancer. We are that cancer." Pace told the standing room only audience. The students had been asked to write five-minute presentations on the theme: "Education in a Changing South: A Commitment to Progress and Excellence."

Pace called for "excellence in education not just for the sake of the South, but for ourselves."

Pace was joined by a junior English education major, Kiralfy Forte, and Ronald Roulhac, a junior architecture student. Roulhac was the second place winner and Miss Forte won third place in the essay contest.

Roulhac cited indications of progress toward excellence in public education in some southern states, but he said no southern state could be considered progressive until it provided a quality education to all its citizens.

An increase in the number of Tuskegee residents with high school diplomas, Georgia's recognition of high academic achievement in public schools, and Mississippi's funding of teaching assistants were all indications of progress in southern educational systems, Roulhac said.

Roulhac said the commitment to excellence should begin in the home. Schools, he said, could only supplement the values of students estab-

lished in the home. But, he added, the commitment did not stop in the home but extended to students themselves, teachers and administrators of educational systems.

Students should exercise responsibility about the public education process; teachers should evidence the competence they expect of their students' and administrators should support the professional efforts of their students.

Ms. Forte agreed with Governor Wallace that the South was benefitting from industrial migration to the south, but she insisted that the South would need much better schools to capitalize on industrial interest in relocating in the South. In conjunction with the Presidential Essay Contest, The Academic Awards night was also held. At the affair, a number of awards were given to deserving students.

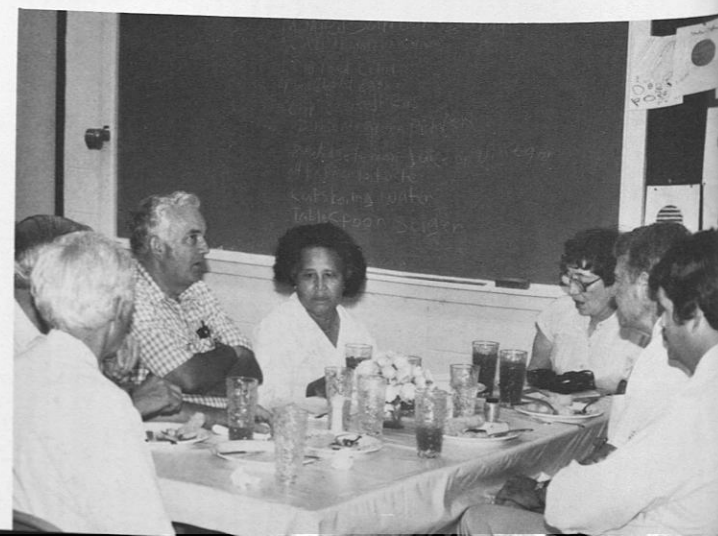
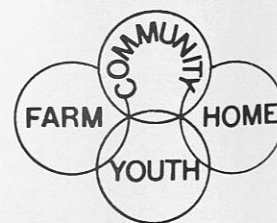
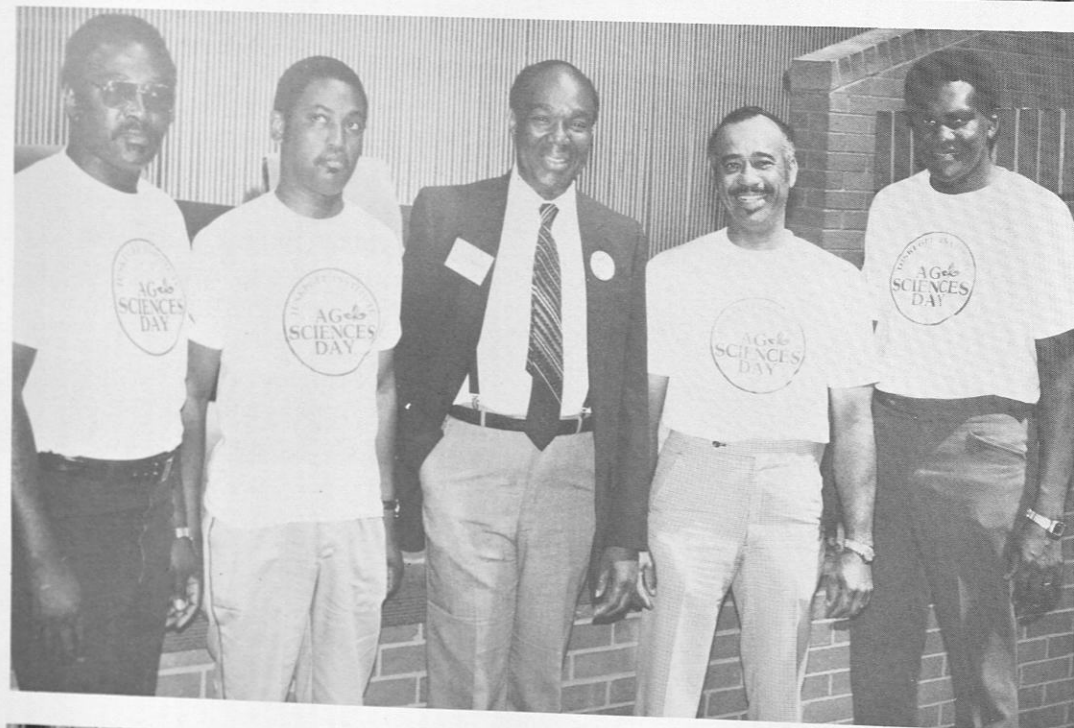
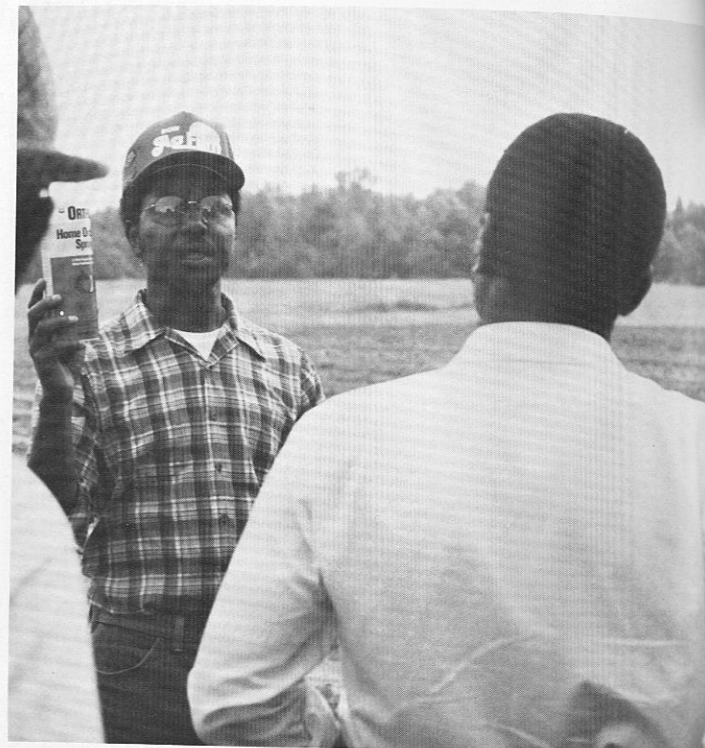
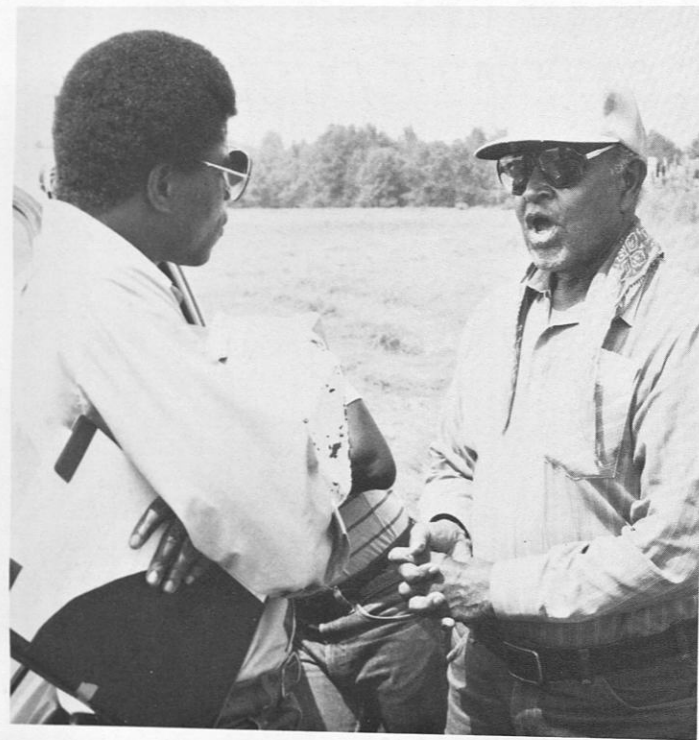
COOPERATIVE EXTENSION PROGRAM AT TUSKEGEE INSTITUTE

JOB CORPS

Job Corps is a unique program which provides intensive educational and vocational training to economically disadvantaged young men and women through the combined efforts of business, labor and government. Program participants must be between the ages of 16 and 21 inclusive. They receive a comprehensive program of basic and remedial education, vocational training, work experience, and counseling (both vocational and personal) and placement services. The Tuskegee Job Corps Center established June 1, 1980 is operated by Tuskegee Institute under contract with the U.S. Department of Labor.

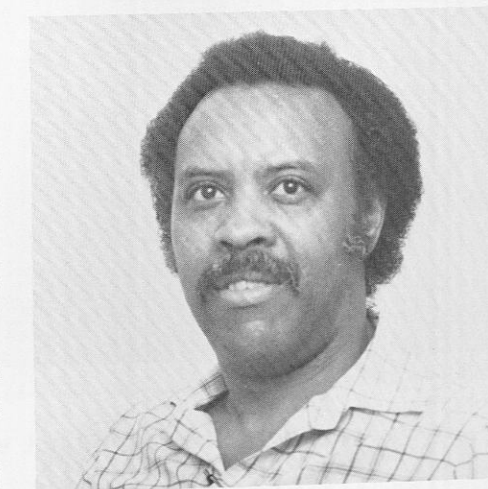
It offers vocational, educational and community life training to youth from eight (8) southeastern states — Alabama, Georgia, Florida, Kentucky, Mississippi, North Carolina, South Carolina, and Tennessee.

The Center is located on the spacious campus of Tuskegee Institute, Tuskegee, Alabama. The administrative offices and some academic classrooms are located in Moton Hall. The vocational classrooms occupy two of the Wilcox Buildings formerly used as industrial trade buildings on the campus of Tuskegee Institute.

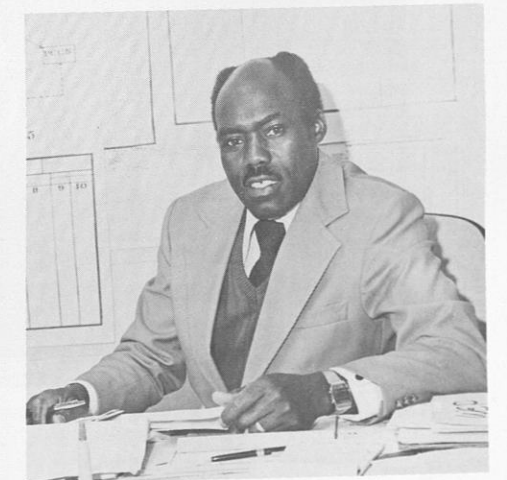
Residential living is contained in the four historical Emery buildings. The program accommodates 122 males, aged 16-21, who qualify for enrollment according to the Federal Government screening standards and policies.



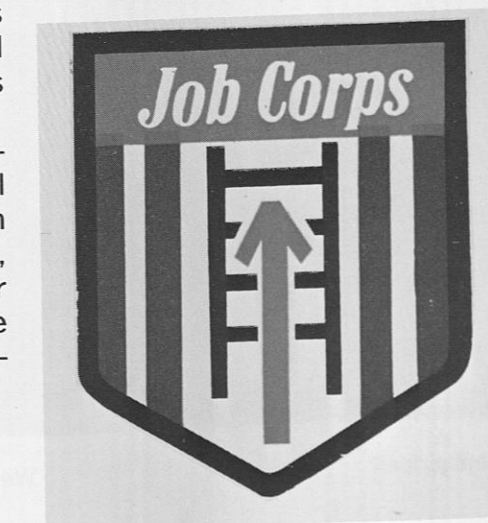

I was very disappointed when I first arrived at Tuskegee Institute because what I saw was the opposite of my expectations. As an international student, some of my main problems here were the lack of public transportation, inadequate shopping facilities, and a lack of variety (international) in the food at Tompkins Hall Cafeteria.

However, as time went on I adjusted to my task environment and I later found that the quiet atmosphere of the Tuskegee community was profitable to me because I was able to settle down to serious study without too many distractions. I was rewarded for this by outstanding grade point averages.

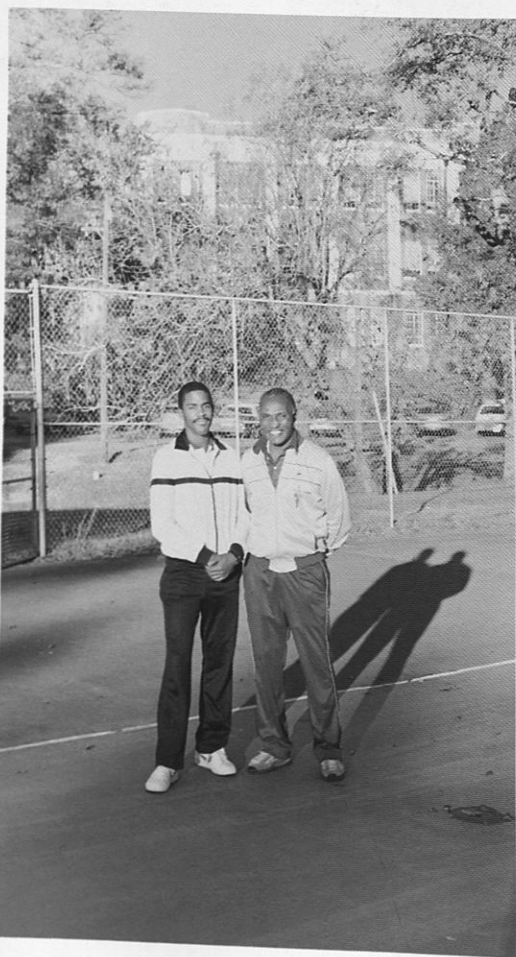
