




First Time

Where Am I Going To Live



The Age Of Finals


Finals for many students brought about a lot of stress. Students are already drained when going into finals' week because many teachers were playing catch up with the material.


Vice President Academic Affairs




Mr. Sinnot believes the University will be larger because of its increasing interest in science technology. We look forward to his future services to the University.





















































































The IGNORANT Bench













































To Study Or Not To Study








































































Forever Friends

Those young men worked diligently throughout the year to achieve athletically, as well as academically. Achievement by athletes cannot be successful unless they have accepted the challenge of victory.



R.O.T.C. Commission






Crimson Pipers "RAGS to RICHES"
