


Department of Architecture

During the past few years the Department of Architecture has experienced rapid developments which resulted in its recent accreditation.

The department is concerned with understanding the relationship between man and his environment, and with creating physical environments which meet the physical and emotional needs of the individual and society. The comprehensiveness of the program results in studies at a range of scales, including: city planning and design, large building complexes, individual buildings, interior and landscape design, and others.

While the students have common studies in the lower years, they do have the opportunity to study in the area of their interest in the upper years. Another program feature is the effort to minimize the schism between the academic and non-academic worlds. This is accomplished by an extensive field trip and visiting lecture/design critic series, utilization of community oriented projects whereby students assist local communities while learning, and through the internship program whereby students receive on the job education in offices of some of this nation's leading architects and planners.











Over the years, Tuskegee has had a distinguished history of involvement in organized social research and data compilation through the Rural Life Council. The Department of Records and Research, and the Office of the Director of Research. In September, 1967, the Division of Behavioral Science Research was established to provide greater continuity and to create a more definite conceptual focus for research in the social sciences.

The research activities of the Division are devoted primarily, although not exclusively, to the study of Black People, Race Relations, and the South. Special emphasis is placed upon the interdisciplinary cross-cultural approach to these problems. The major objective is to contribute to the development of coherent theory which will explain a variety of phenomenological characteristics within a social system.



In Memoriam



Military's First Black General

Former Professor of Milita Science, Tuskegee Institute.

Brigadier General Benjamin O. Davis, Sr. July 13, 1898 - November 26, 1970

Army Brigadier General Benjamin O. Davis Sr., the first black to achieve the rank of general in the United States military, died November 26, 1970 at the Great Lakes Naval Hospital after a long illness.

Born in Washington, D.C. July 1, 1877, General Davis entered the military service in 1898, during the war with Spain, as a temporary first lieutenant of the 8th

In 1901 he was commissioned a second of cavalry in the Regular Army. After attaining the rank of Lieutenant Colonel, he was assigned to Tuskegee Institute as the Professor of Military Science. He served his first tour at Tuskegee from 1920 to 1924. In 1933, he was again assigned as the PMS—this time as a Colonel.


He was promoted to Brigadier General in October, 1940. During World War II he served in the European Theater of Operations. In 1946 he was assistant to the Inspector General in Washington, D.C., a position he held until his retirement in June, 1948.

After retirement, General Davis served as a member of the Citizens Advisory Committee to the District of Columbia Commissioners.

Carver Research Foundation Graduate Fellows and Teaching Assistants

1970-71 ACADEMIC YEAR



The Carver Research Foundation is the arm of Tuskegee Institute which is responsible for the promotion and coordination of research on the campus. It administers programs of a pure research nature, as well as programs dealing with training, development, and demonstration projects. Research programs, in science and technical areas, as well as those in the social humanities and education desciplines are administered by Carver Research Foundation. The new agency on the campus which relates Tuskegee Institute personnel in a very broad social involvement with people in all surrounding counties—the Human Resource Development Center is also administratively under the aegis of Carver Research Foundation.

George Washington Carver MUSEUM



George Washington Carver spent his life in a search for the secrets of God's growing things. He asked nothing for himself and gave his discoveries to mankind. He could have added fortune to fame, but caring for neither, he found happiness and honor in being helpful to the world.

George Washington Carver Museum



The George Washington Carver Museum was authorized by the Trustees of Tuskegee at the request of President F. D. Patterson, in 1938, to house Dr. Carver's extensive collections of native plants, minerals, birds; his products from the peanut, sweet potato, and clay; the permanent exhibit of vegetables that he had started in 1904, and his more than 100 paintings.

The Museum was formally dedicated by the late Henry Ford and Mrs. Ford in 1941.

In 1947 a disastrous fire caused great loss in the Museum. Fortunately, many of Dr. Carver's products were not seriously damaged. Only a few paintings were saved.

When the building was restored in 1951, it was enlarged by a second exhibit room. This made it possible to display an extensive collection of African Art and

twenty beautifully executed dioramas showing the contributions of the Negro to civilization.

For serious students of African Culture, the Museum is fortunate to have over 300 bound volumes and rare pamphlets on South, Central and West Coast Africa and more than a thousand photographs of life in Ghana and Nigeria in the Etta Moten African Literature Corner adjacent to the African Art Collection.

The art gallery on the lower level is a recent addition to the Museum. Outstanding traveling exhibits of contemporary and traditional paintings and sculptures, as well as a permanent collection, are shown.

Thousands visit the Museum each year to study the exhibits and to pay tribute to the memory of Dr. Carver and Dr. Booker T. Washington.



I call to mind a poem written by Langston Hughes entitled, "A Dream Deferred." This poem, is for the benefit of those who have been drugged by the red, white and blue, who actually believe that AmeriKKKa is a land of freedom and opportunity, and a beautiful country. For the benefit of those who pretend not to understand what it is doing to our people here, and what AmeriKKKa is doing to humanity daily, he raises the question:

What happens to a dream deferred?

Does it dry up like a raisin in the sun
Or does it fester like a sore and then run
Or does it sag like a heavy load
Or does it explode?

This poem was unanswered until Watts, Detroit, Chicago, Newark, Atlanta and every other city experienced and felt the Black fire. Kappa Alpha Psi was envisioned in the minds of several Black students at Indiana University during the school year of 1910-1911. After much preparation, these dreams became a reality on April 15, 1911. Originally chartered as Kappa Alpha Nu, the name was changed in December of 1914 to Kappa Alpha Psi. From then on, KappaAlpha Psi has enlisted thousands of dedicated young men.

Thus, on April 17, 1948, with the chartering of the Gamma Epsilon Chapter, Tuskegee Institute brought on yet another wave of dedication. The men of this chapter are still striving to fulfill Kappa's fundamental purpose: Achievement.

Gamma Epsilon's first endeavor of the year was to enlist in its ranks fifteen young men to carry on the Kappa style, known as the "Mafia." The "Nupes" second project was to select a needy family and to help with its problems. Repairs and chores were done around the house on weekends. In the meantime, money was raised for clothing, food, and Christmas presents through the sale of tickets. During the Christmas season, the Brothers worked wholeheartedly with the Tuskegee Fire Department in an effort to collect toys to be distributed.

Nonetheless, on the social scene, Kappas can be seen fellowshipping around the diamond or on the "steps," chatting or striking up a tune in hopes to relieve some of their day-to-day tensions or put a smile on their face.


