Dr. Howard P. Carter is a native of Houston, Texas, where he completed his elementary and high mool training. He entered Tuskegee Institute in 1937 and received the bachelor of science degree in 1941. Show after graduation, he entered the Armed services and was stationed in Hawaii. He was soon selected for the Officers Training School and returned to the mainland for this training. Upon completion of this period of training, he returned to Hawaii as a lieutenant and remained there until he was discharged in 1945. After year in the postal service in Houston, Dr. Carter decided to enter graduate school to pursue his interest in science. He enrolled at Columbia University where he received the master of arts degree in 1950. That same year, Tuskegee Institute requested the placement service at Columbia to recommend an instructor for biology. Dr. Carter was highly recommended, and he returned to Tuskegee in the fall of 1950 to begin his teaching career. His genuine interest in teaching led him to seek additional training at the University of California where he received in 1956 a second master of arts in Parasitology. Five years later, Dr. Carter was granted leave for further study at the University of Wisconsin. He was awarded the doctor of philosophy degree from Wisconsin in 1964. Two years later he entered the University of California at Berkeley for post doctoral training.


Dr. Carter served as a member of the biology faculty from 1950 to 1968 except during the periods he was on leave. On June 1, 1968, he was appointed Dean of the College of Arts and Science, the position he now holds.

Dr. Carter is married to Mrs. Lolla P. Carter. There are two children, Vicki and Howard III, both of whom are students at Tuskegee Institute.


Among professional organization in which Dr. Carter holds membership parasitologist, American Micoscopical Society, American Association of Higher Education, and American Institute of Biological Sciences. He is also a member of at least two professional honorary societies, Society of Sigma Xi and Beckappa Chi Scientific Society. His civic and social organization memberships include Phi Boule, Alpha Alpha Fraternity, Scabbard and Blade, Tuskegee Civic Association, and the National Association for Advancement of Colored People. He has at least six publications to his credit.

Dr. Carter has many responsibilities and is therefore a busy man; but he always finds time to see and take with students whenever they need him. In fact it is his genuine interest in students whenever and also in his faculty members that has endeared him to the entire Tuskegee Family.

With all due respect to Dr. Carter-with gratitude and affection for loyalty and service to our Tuskegee family-we dedicate this Tuskeana, a small gesture in appreciation for twenty-five years.

The services may be categorized as counseling (educational, vocational, and personal/social), international education, testing and research, tutorial and skills development programs, and outreach activities.






BEHAVIORAL SCIENCES

The Division of Behavioral Science Research is a research unit within the Carver Research Foundation. It subscribes to the general mission of the Foundation, that is, research administration, coordination, and facilitation.

The Division acceptas as its general mission to provide continuity to Tuskegee Institute's early involvement in objectivity assessing issues and problems facing disadvantaged groups, particularly in the southeastern region of the country; to provide personnel and technical facilities for social research on problems relating to the black community; to provide consultative services for other units within this university, and for outside as ancies; to provide research training opportunities for Tuskege has titute students; to stimulate research activities among faculty reambers; and to coordinate research between Tuskegee Institute and other institutions.

READING CLINIC



Dr. A.M.S. Rao, Director

The Reading clinic is one of several units of the college of Arts and Science and serves as a laboratory to the Graduate Reading Program in the School of Education. Presently the instructional staff includes a professional educational psychologist as director, five full-time instructors and two graduate assistants.

The primary service function consists of a semester long, one-credit course designed for students having difficulties in reading and learning skills necessary for a successful college level performance. These skills are related to communication listening, comprehension study, note-taking, test-taking, vocabulary development, spelling, and the like.

Each freshman student who does not make the option level in the Placement Test is required to enroll in reading improvement course 101/102 during the first semester of his admission to Tuskegee Institute. Those placed in the option category and upper class students will profit from a semester study at the Clinic to the extent that they understand improved methods of reading and learning.

All students receive a thorough diagnosis of their reading and learning problems, and individual aid is provided through intensive counseling and instruction. An extensive selection of films, filmstrips, and programmed learning materials are maintained. A complete learning center including a 48-position reading laboratory is used during the instructional stage.

The reading clinic serves as a training ground for graduate students in Reading and offers them laboratory facilities and opportunities for supervised practicum experience in psychological analysis and treatment of reading deficiences.








This year the enrollment in AFROTC is a total of 179, with 54 of these cadets enrolled in the Professional Officer Course which leads to a commission as a Second Lieutenant. Last school year, 14 cadets were commissioned and put on active duty.

The AFROTC Programs at Tuskegee Institute enrolls students in the two-year and four-year programs. The programs are available for women and men to pursue a commission.

AFROTC offers scholarships to students in the twoyear and four-year programs who meet the application requirements. These scholarships cover full tuition, fees, and \$100 per month. Presently, there are 25 cadets on AFROTC scholarships.

The AFROTC staff consists of three officers and four Noncommissioned Officers.
































THE MONROE N. WORKS SOCIOLOGY **CLUB**
