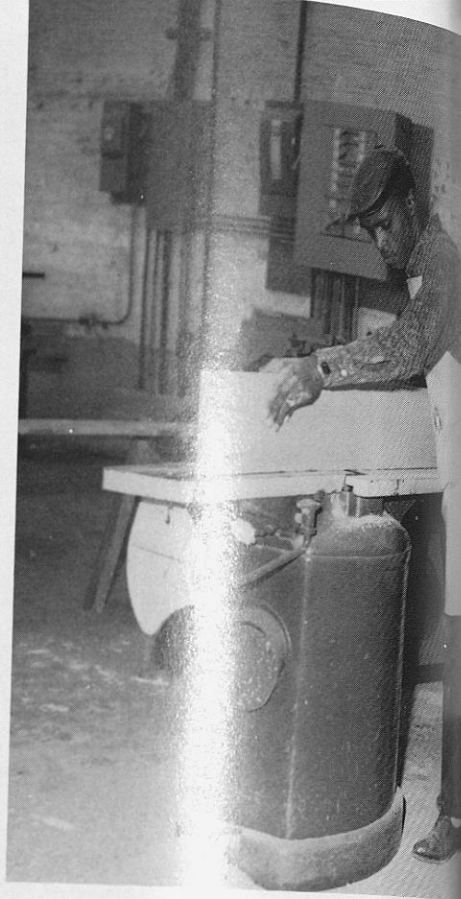
The program in Industrial Education has as its prime objective the development of trade teachers for secondary schools. Trade training, general education and professional education courses are offered for the development of such teachers.

The years that we have spent here have been most rewarding. We have participated freely in the

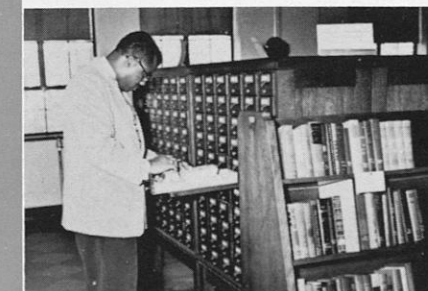

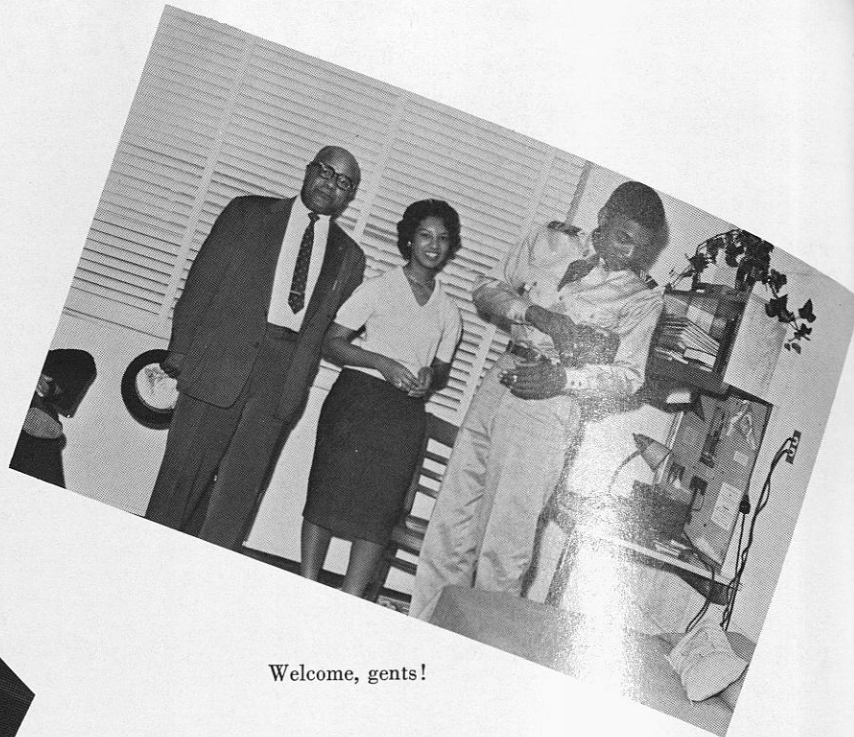


that are capable of performing efficiently in our various areas of specialization.

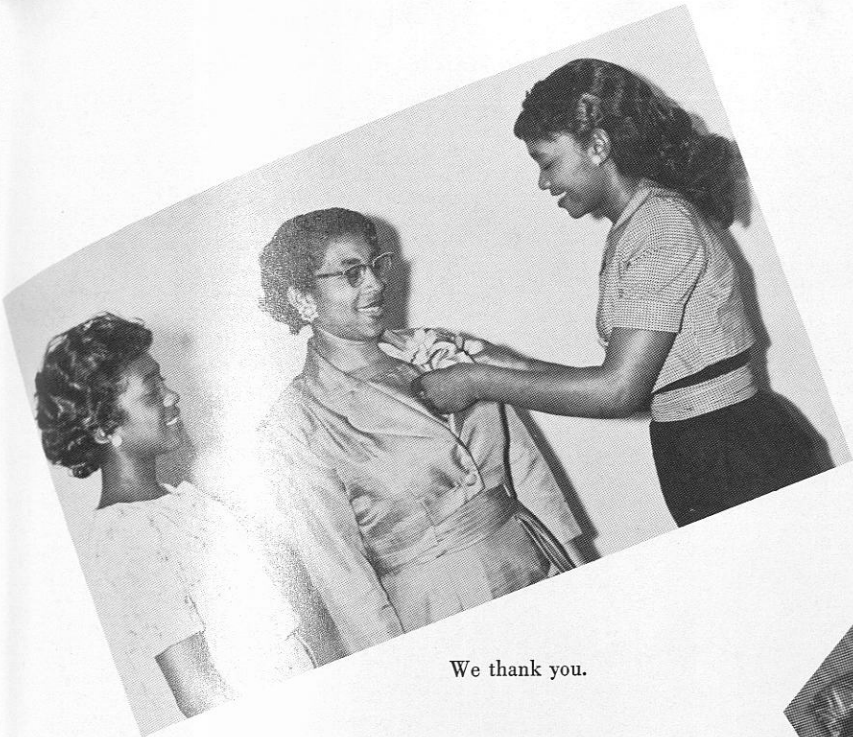

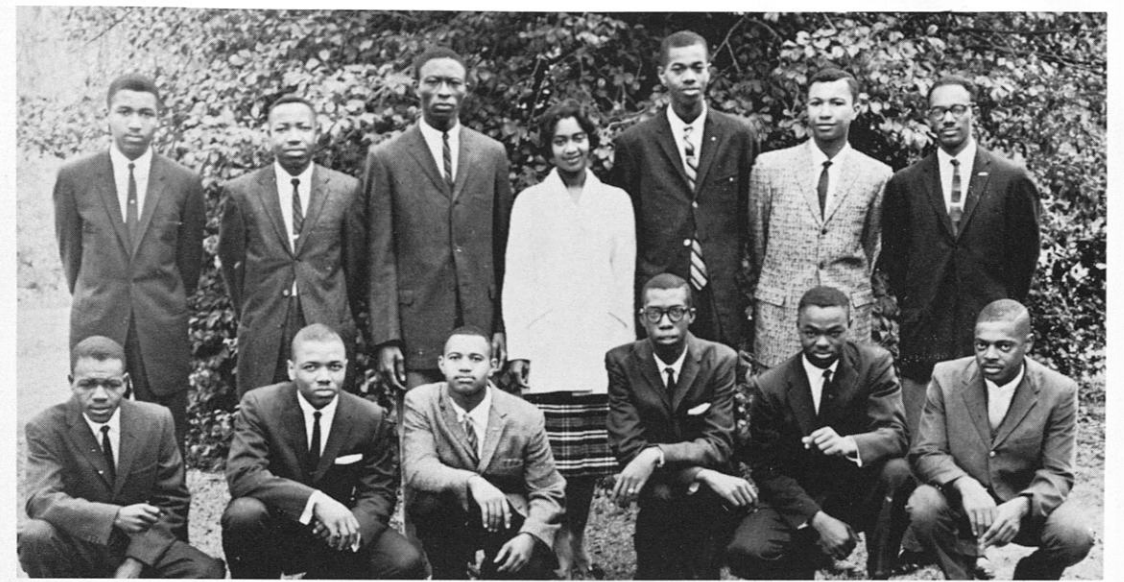

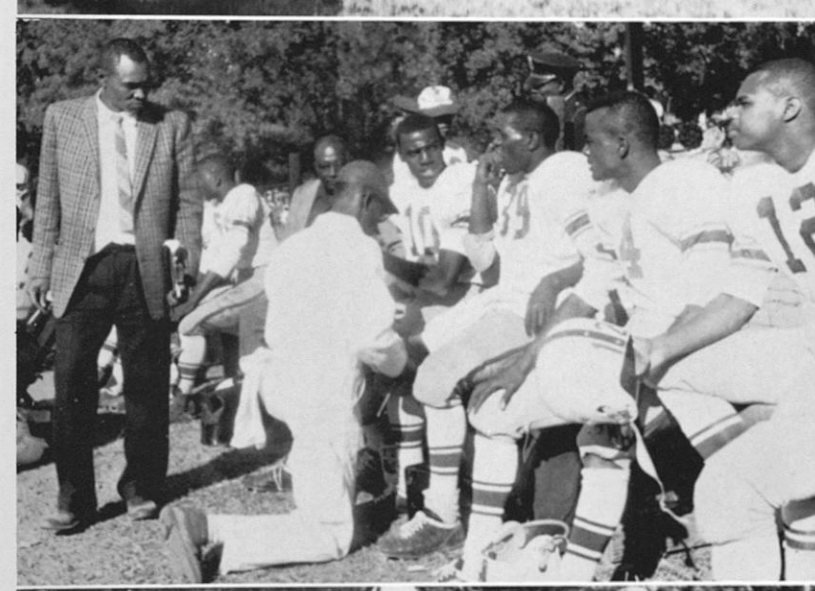


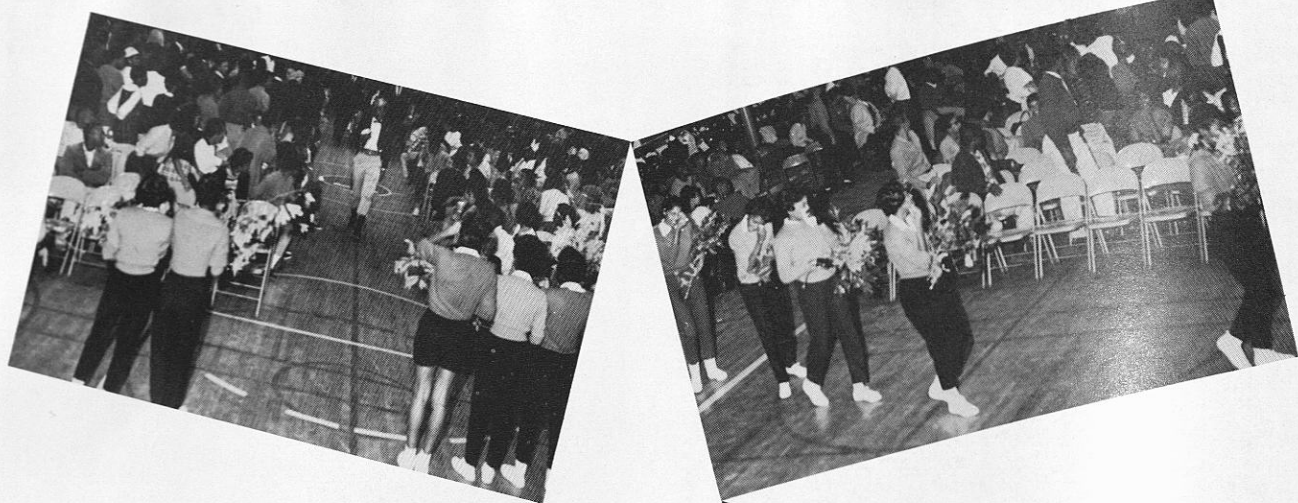
The Golden Tigers kicked off the 1960 football season with a 14-12 victory over the Johnson C. Smith Bulls of Charlotte, N. C., September 24.

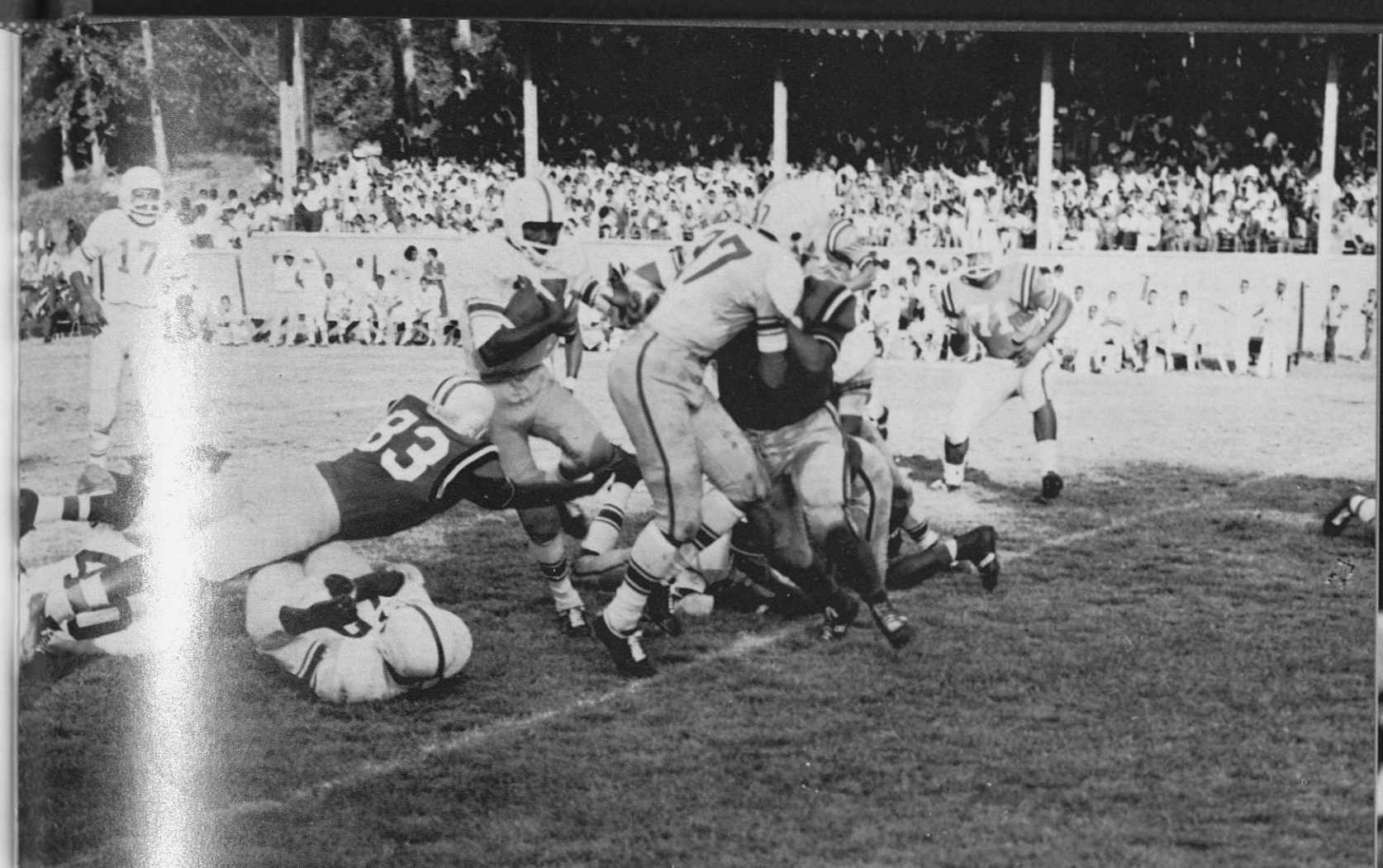
After losing a 13-6 to Morehouse College of Atlanta (Oct. 21), an untamed herd of Golden Tigers returned to the gridiron on Oct. 29 and defeated the Fort Valley Wildcats, 18-13.

The victory against Fort Valley was the fifth of the season for Tuskegee with only one defeat.

Robert Walker, fiery Tuskegee half-back, boosted his scoring the Tigers' first touchdown on a 17-yard run late in the first period.

Taking advantage of a Fort Valley fumble in the second quarter, Tuskegee scored their second touchdown on a seven-yard bootleg play by quarterback Willie Williams.

The fleet Tuskegee backfield and the genius of quarterback Willie Williams scattered the hopes of the outmanned Knoxville boys who were looking for their first victory in three attempts.

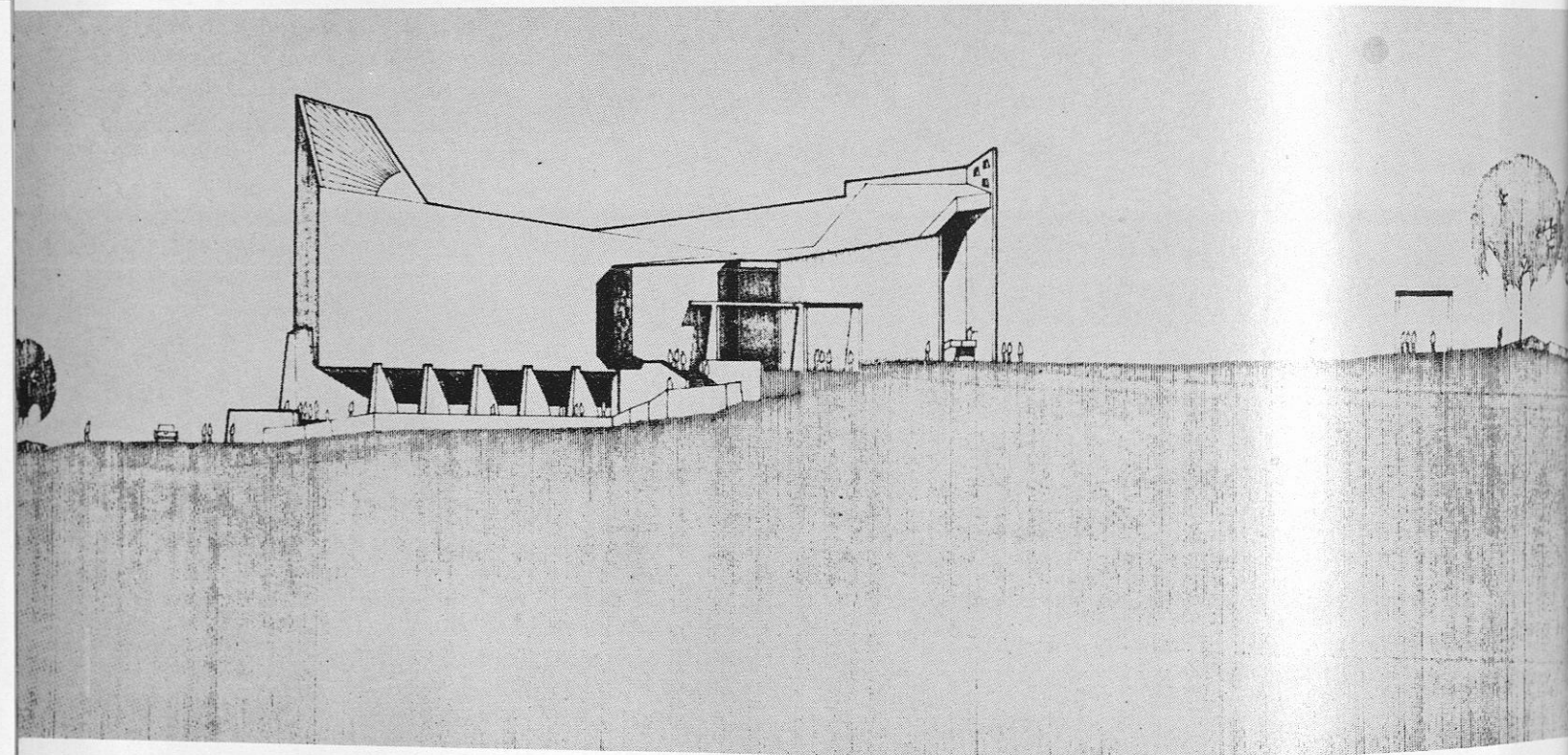


Construction of the "Master Plan" will begin with the new \$800,000 nondenominational chapel—a sanctuary that will represent the "pride and spirit of the swift growing South."





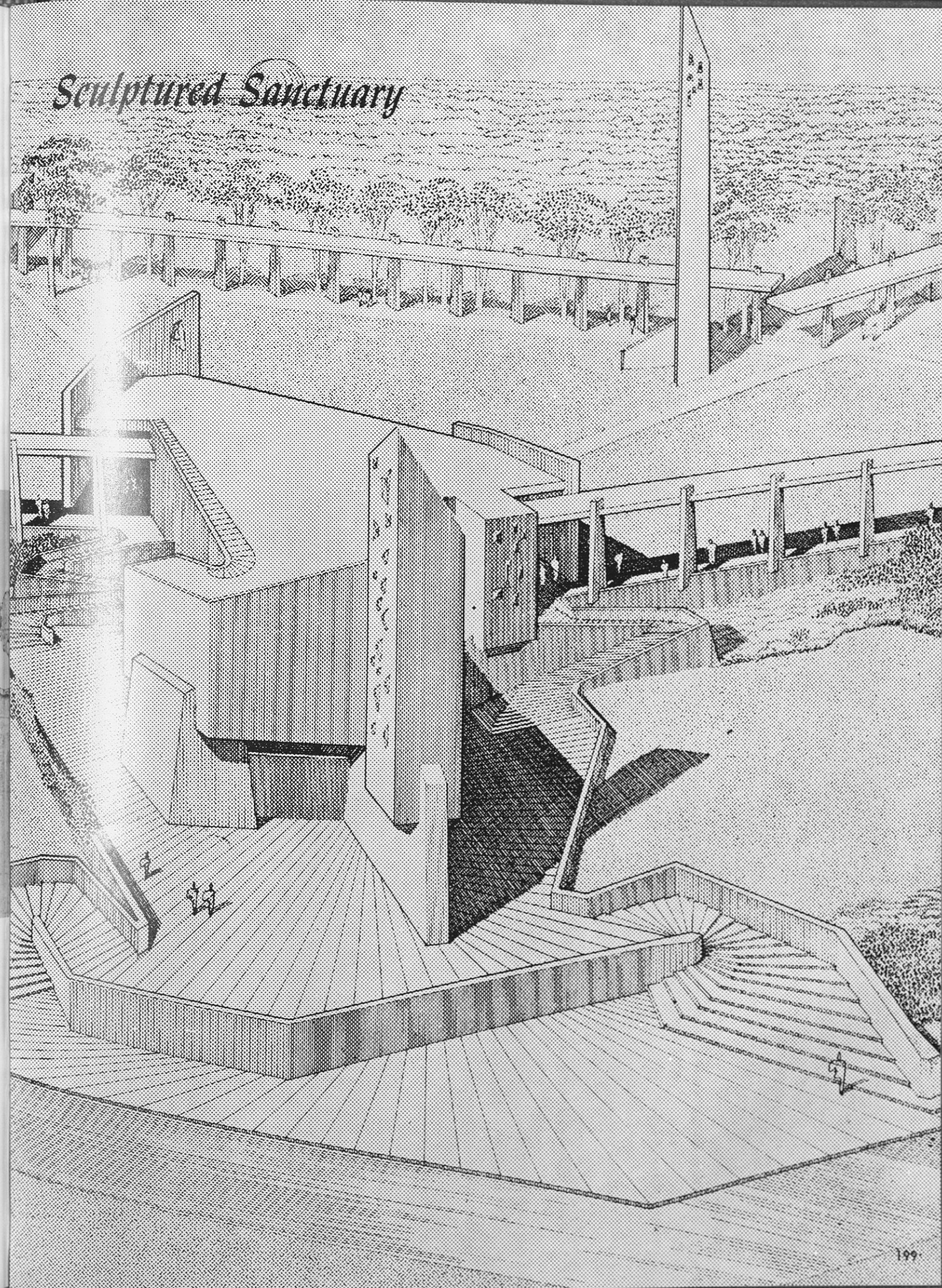

The tall element at the left end of the building is a meditation chapel lit from above and through slots of colored glass. The tall element at the right is a concrete wall perforated with roughly triangular openings that will hold church bells of different sizes.



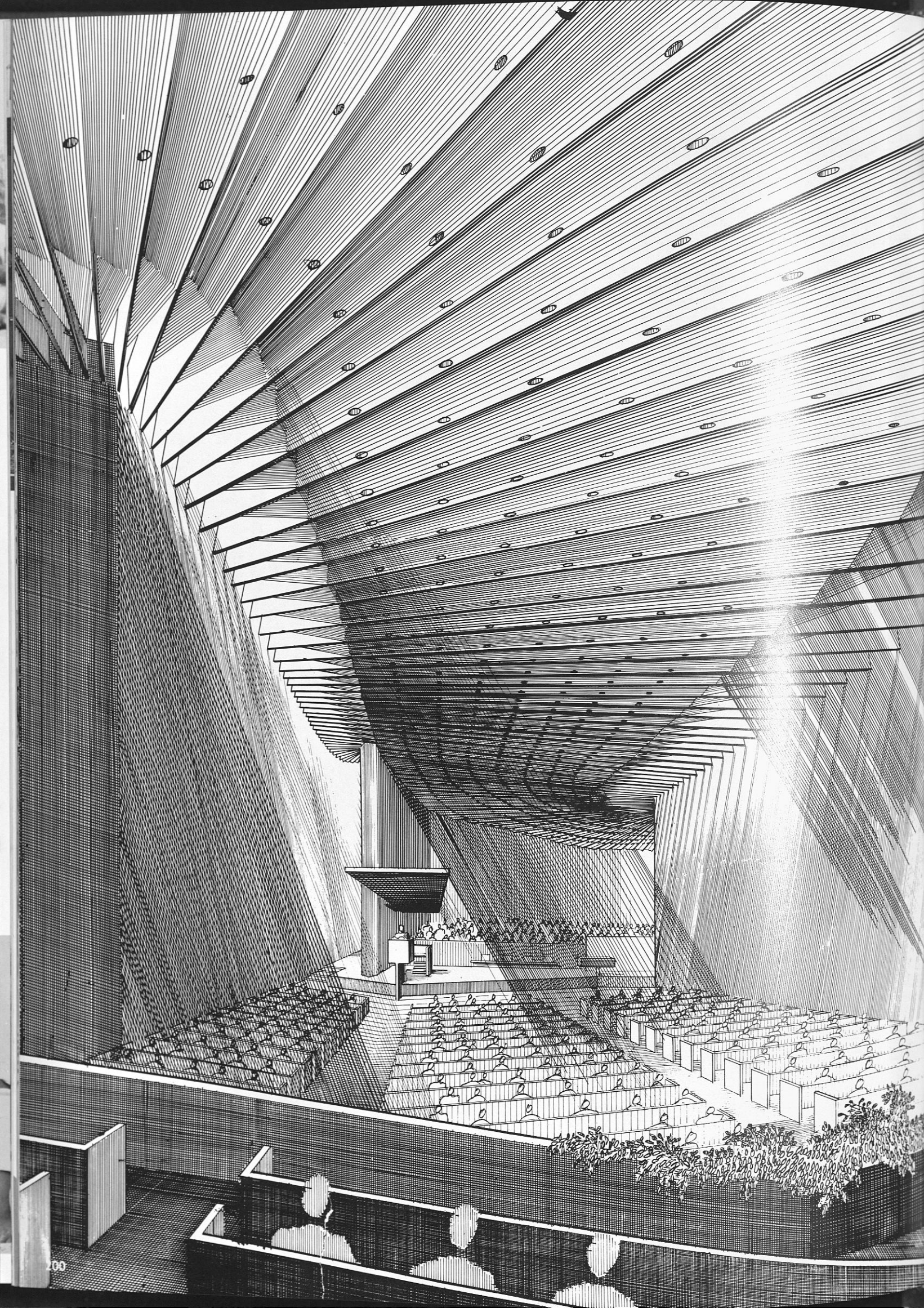

This character is due, in part, to the requirements of acoustics, and in part to the architects' determination to make this focal building distinctly different from the rest of the campus. 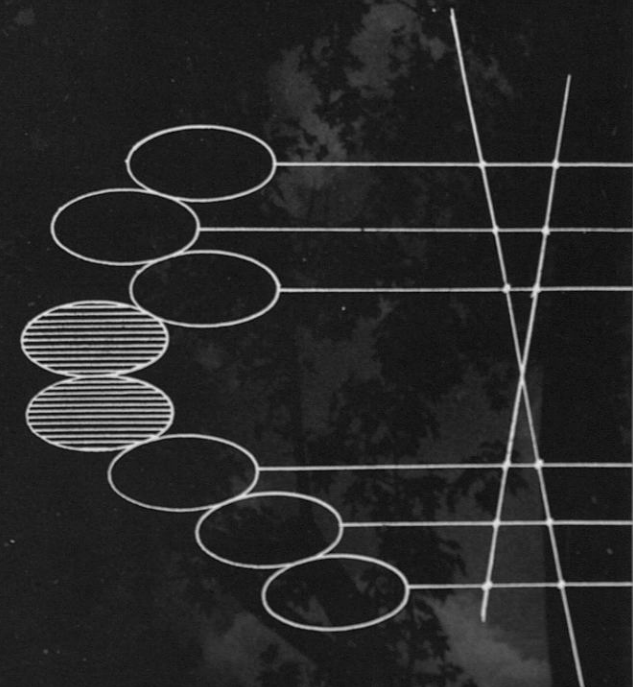
When things go wrong, as they sometimes will,
