



The editors of this edition have attained a great deal of satisfaction from their work, and would now like to give you the opportunity of attaining an equal degree of satisfaction as you view it.



#### THE INSTITUTE

Founded under the dynamic leadership of the great educator, Booker T. Washington, Tuskegee Institute is a co-educational and privately controlled institution. The institute was founded in 1881 on a site one mile west of the city of Tuskegee, Alabama, and has a present enrollment of over 3,000 students.

Tuskegee is accredited by the Southern Association of Colleges and Schools and offers degrees in thirty-two courses of study which constitute the curricula for nine major areas of instruction. Of these nine fields of study, graduate degrees are offered in the Arts and Sciences, Education, Engineering, Agriculture, Home Economics, and Food Administration. Instruction is offered in each major area through two semesters of approximately eighteen weeks each. Opportunities for summer study are provided through an eight-week term where a considerable number of courses are offered from most curricula, and through two short terms with offerings limited to special needs.

In addition to its primary function of instruction, Tuskegee Institute consistently engages in fundamental research and extends its programs to other areas of human endeavor in the interest of the college, the surrounding communities, and the society on the whole. Research through the George Washington Research Foundation, community service through the John Andrew Memorial Hospital, and a strong relation between other universities through exchange programs has given Tuskegee a head start in its endeavors.

## THE PRESIDENT

DR. LUTHER H. FOSTER

With a sincere dedication to the position of President of Tuskegee Institute, Dr. Luther H. Foster has set forth a type of leadership which is indigenous of its "reason for being" and imbedded in the profound objectives of educating a growing society. In conjunction with the many duties of the chief executive, Dr. Foster is actively concerned with many community and world affairs.

Dr. Foster received a Bachelor of Science Degree from Virginia State College in 1932, a Bachelor of Science Degree from Hampton Institute in 1934 and a Master of Business Administration Degree from Harvard University in 1936. Following his acquisition of the Master's Degree, he was employed as Budget Officer of Howard University, Washington, D.C., and served from 1936 to 1940. In 1951 he received his Doctor of Philosophy Degree from the University of Chicago and became Business Manager of Tuskegee Institute. He was promoted to the presidency of Tuskegee Institute in 1953.

During Dr. Foster's administration, Tuskegee Institute has continued to grow, transmitting knowledge for the service of a growing society.




#### "THE OAKS"






In 1955, the second wing of the building for Mechanical Engineering was completed and dedicated to Robert Russa Moton Hall.





#### **AGRICULTURE**

The School of Agriculture is composed of five separate, yet closely interrelated programs. These programs are (1) Agricultural Economics, (2) Agricultural Education, (3) Agricultural Science, (4) Food Science and Technology, and (5) The Religious Extension Service. In the first four of these programs instruction is offered at the undergraduate level and the graduate level. The Religious Extension Service is a program which provides for constant, very significant liaison between the School of Agriculture at Tuskegee and rural communities throughout the State of Alabama.

Curricula of the School of Agriculture are designed to prepare individuals as trained professional and technical agriculturalists who possess an insight into the scientific disciplines and who are proficient in modern agricultural practices.



### COLLEGE OF ARTS AND SCIENCES



The Department of Physics offers a major curriculum in physics leading to the degree Bachelor of Science in Physics.



The School of Engineering at Tuskegee Institute offers two four-year programs leading to bachelor's degrees in Electrical and Mechanical Engineering. Beside the Technical preparation necessary to practice professional engineering, the Tuskegee engineering program provides through its foundation in the humanities the background which will enable its graduates to competently meet the complex challenges of modern society.

All Tuskegee engineering students pursue a common curriculum during the first two years of study. At this time a broad mathematics and science foundation is developed. In the final years of study the students build upon this foundation by selecting advanced courses in their area of interest.



The School of Nursing is fully accredited by the Alabama State Board of Nurse Examiners. The basic collegiate program is fully accredited by the National Nursing Accrediting Service to the National League of Nursing.

The program of study includes general cultural and professional courses. Nursing experience is given in selected hospitals and health agencies. Laboratory practice ranges from approximately four to eight hours per week in the freshman year to a maximum of 22 hours in the junior year. Throughout the curriculum, emphasis is placed on the individual student, her needs, growth and development as a person, citizen, and nurse.


Graduates of the basic program, as well as those who complete the Registered Nurse program, are qualified to hold beginning positions in professional nursing, clinical and public health nursing. They also have sound background preparation for graduate study in nursing and related fields.





- 4. To share and appreciate the achievements of all of the African Origin in all phases of life.






