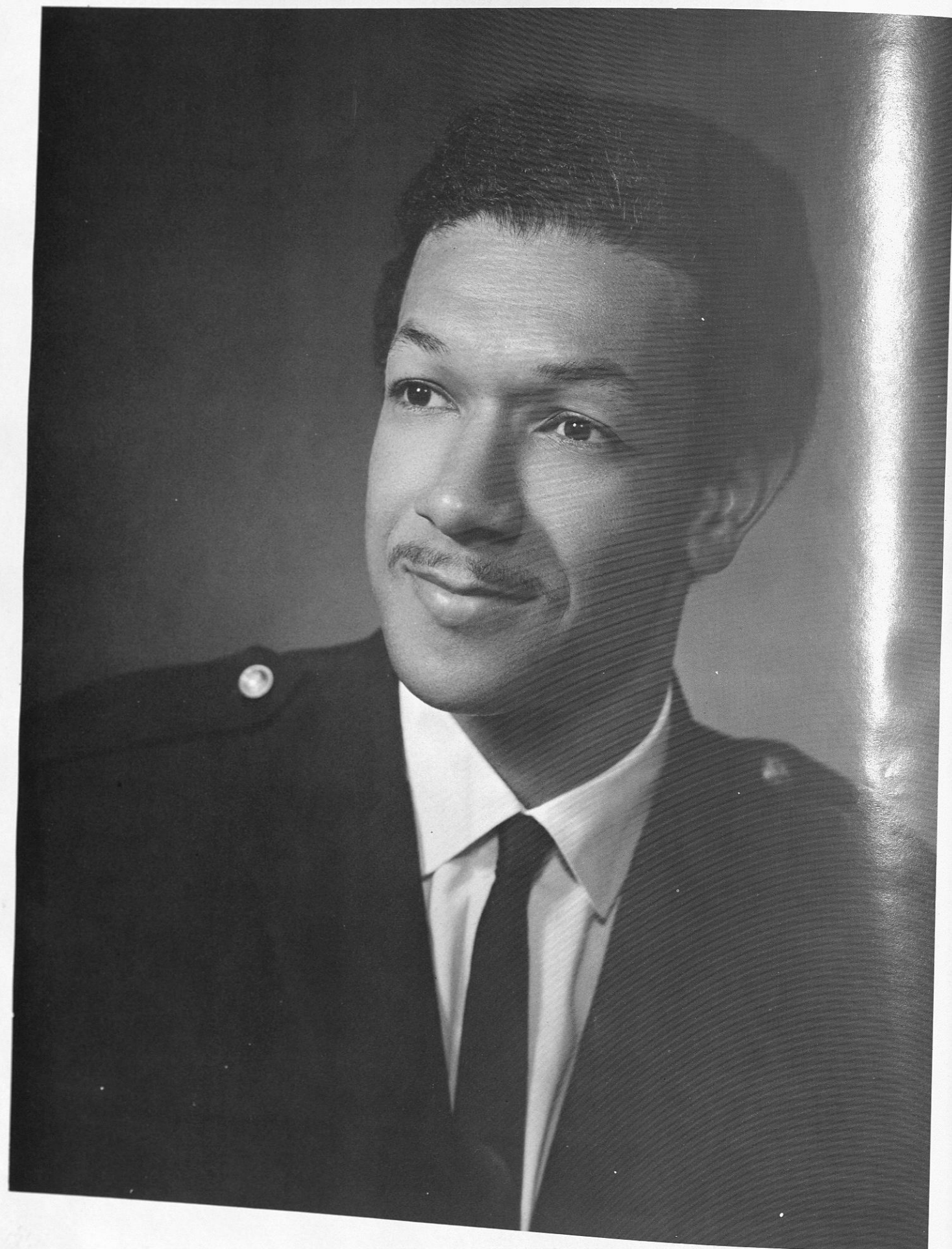

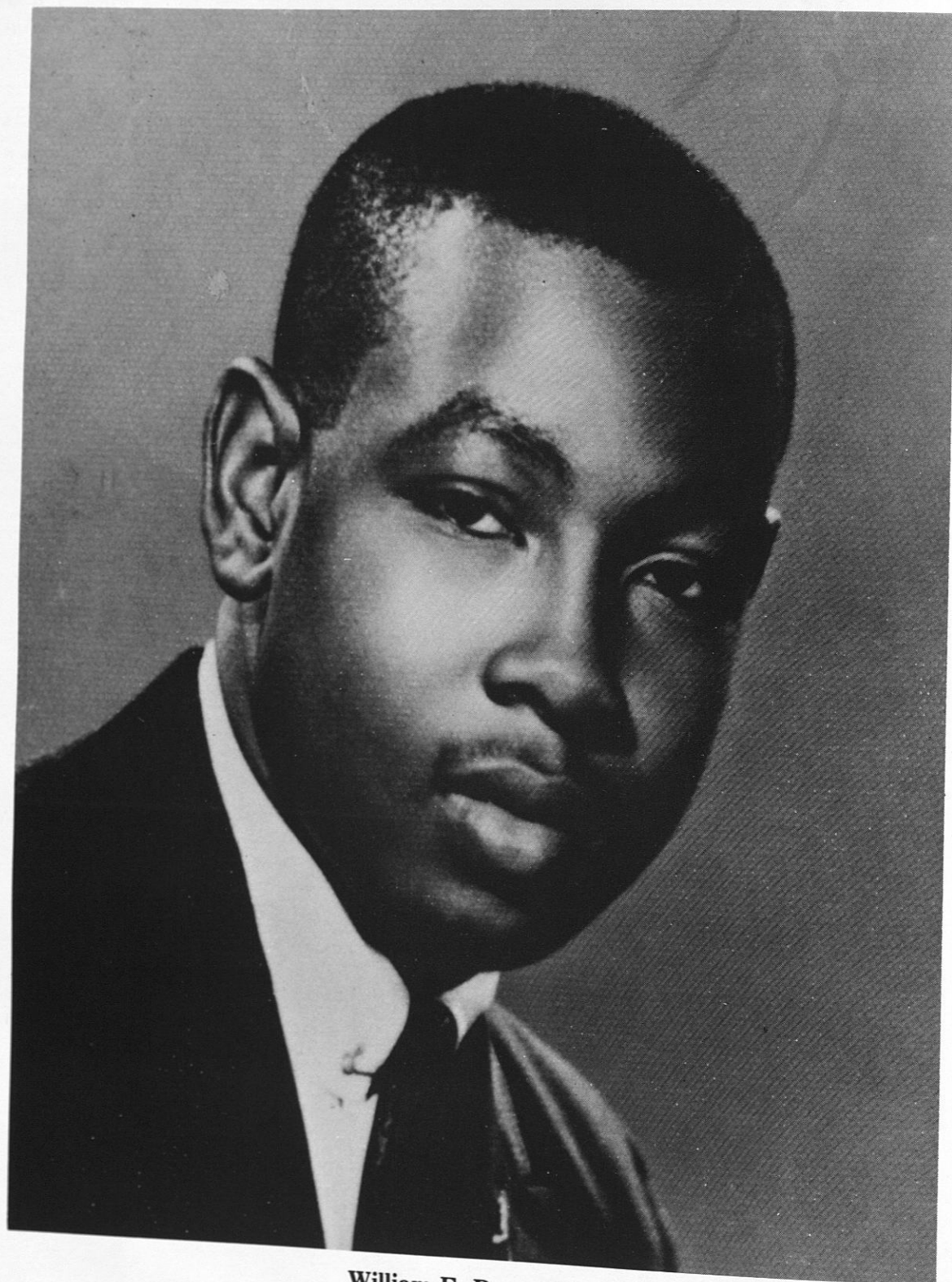
Lucius R. Wyatt, a native of Waycross, Georgia and director of bands at Tuskegee Institute received his Bachelor's Degree in music from Florida A&M University in Tallahassee, Florida, and a Master's degree in Performance and Literature from the Eastman School of Music in Rochester, New York.

Mr. Wyatt served as musical arranger and trumpet soloist with the U.S. Army Eruope Band, Heidelberg, Germany, and performed throughout Europe during 1964-65. During 1965 he performed as trumpet soloist with several chamber orchestras in Germany, including the Orchestra of the Hochschule fur Musik at Heidelberg, Germany. He performed frequently as trumpet soloist and serves annually as adjudicator and clinician for various music festivals in the Southeast.

Under the outstanding directorship of Mr. Wyatt, the band has had unparalleled success in achieving an electrifying sound matched only by its high stepping precision marching.

William E. Boone IV, a 1966 graduate of Tuskegee Institute, and a Navy hospital corpsman, was killed Saturday, April 5, near DaNang, Vietnam. Boone was the oldest son of Mr. and Mrs. W.E. Boone, Sr., both employees of Tuskegee Institute.

According to Navy sources, Boone was killed while going to the aid of a wounded Marine of the 1st Battalion.

Boone had been in the service for nearly two years and arrived in Vietnam March 17.

Prior to joining the Navy, Boone studied for one year at the University of Alabama.

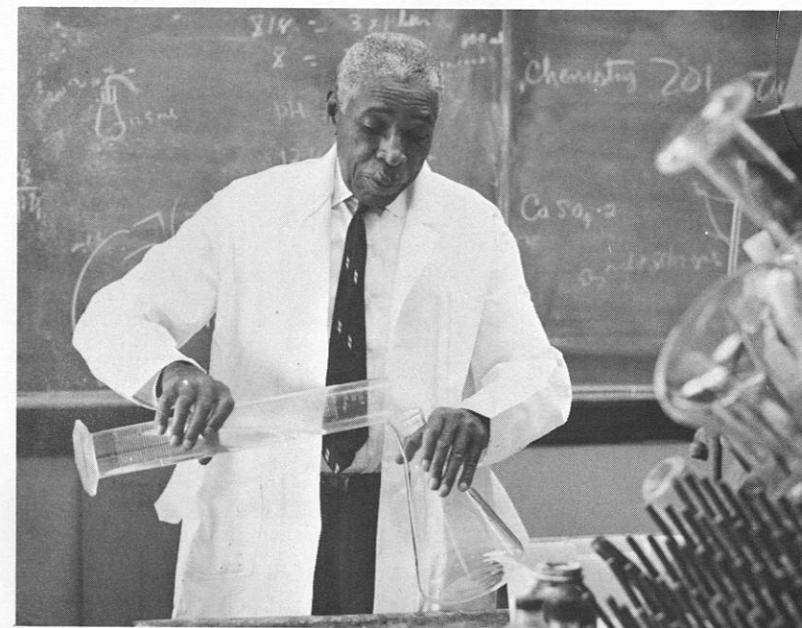

Program and Faculty

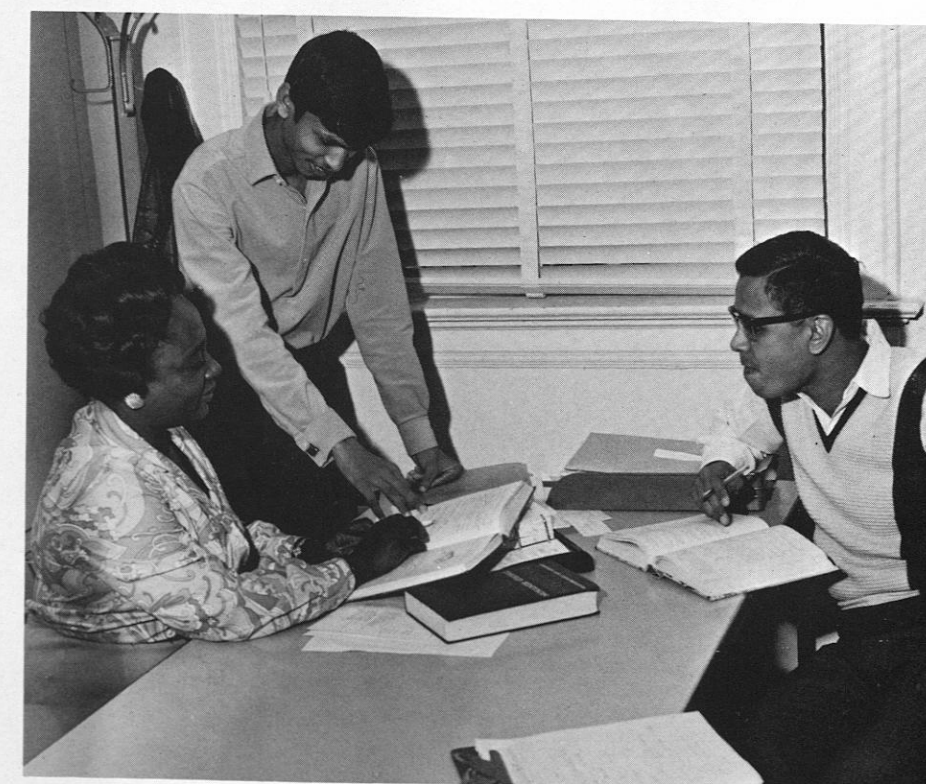
The Department of Mathematics — with a faculty of twelve — offers a curriculum which leads to the B.S. degree in mathematics. The objectives of this curriculum are to prepare students for graduate studies in mathematics or related fields, or for employment in industry. (Forty-five per cent of the Department's graduates have pursued graduate studies and a majority of them have gained employment in the computer field).

Courses are offered in elementary and advanced calculus, differential equations, linear algebra, modern algebra, modern geometry, complex variables, computer-programming, numerical analysis, probability and statistics, and applied mathematics. A precalculus course is available for freshmen needing further preparation for calculus.

This variety of courses permits each student some degree of flexibility in taking courses in accordance with his career objective.

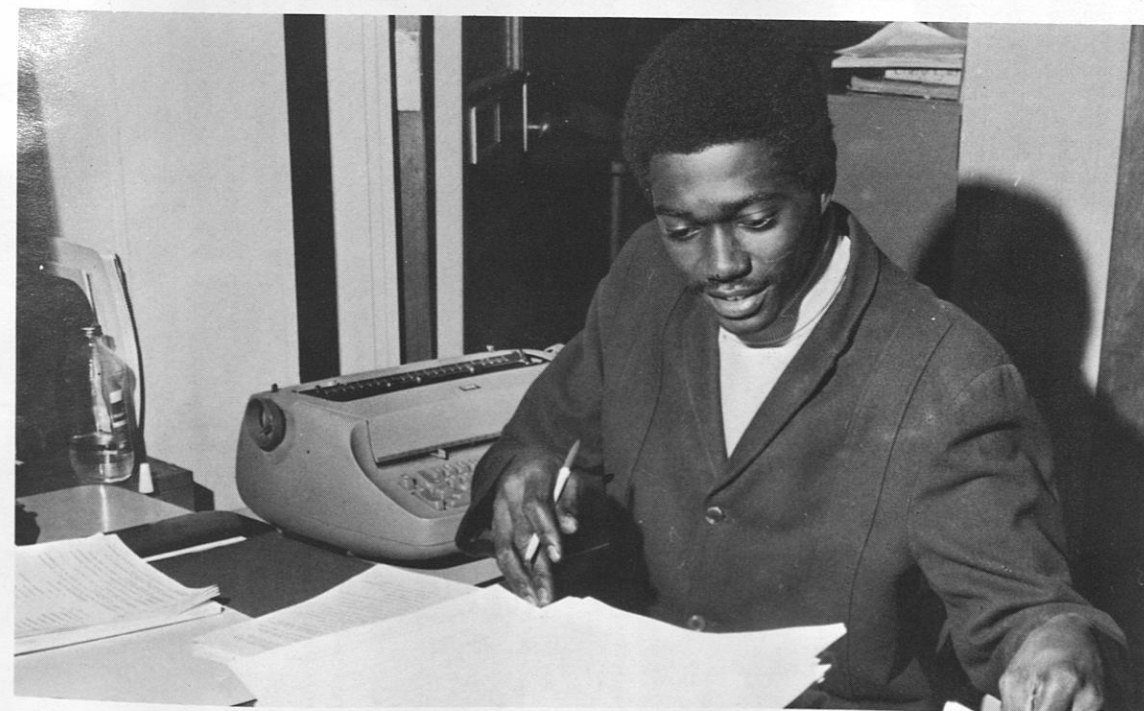

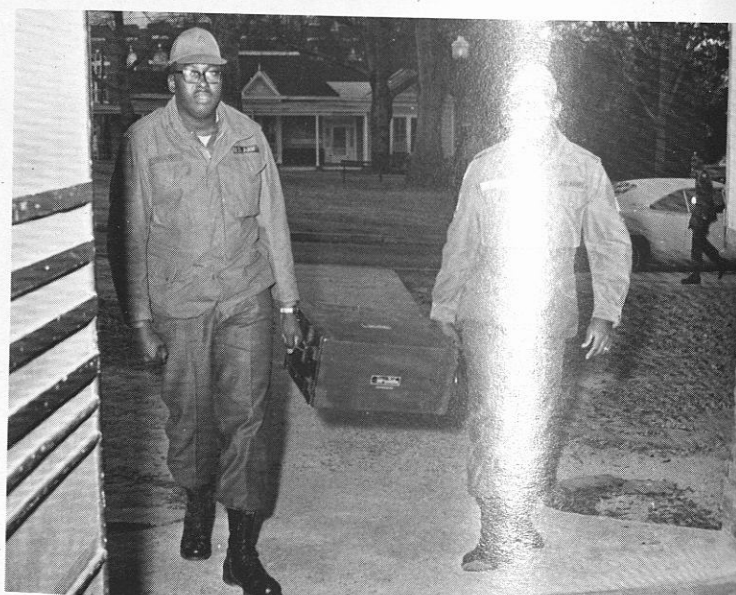
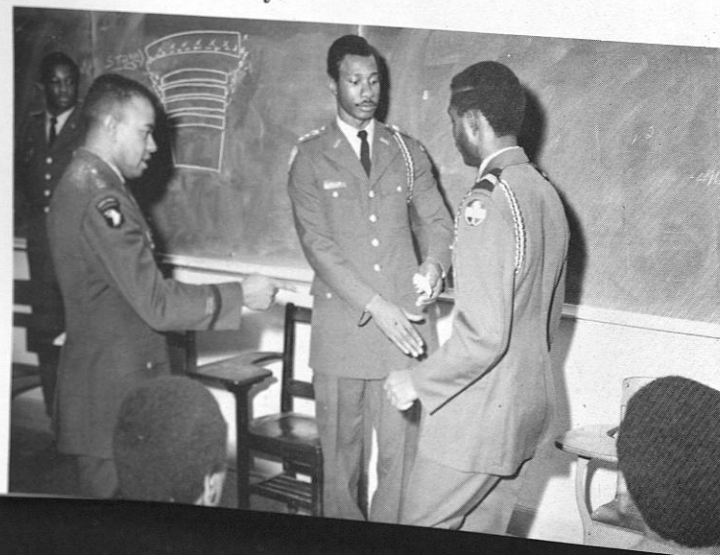
Using knowledge gained here, these officers assumed positions of high responsibility. For the majority who chose civilian careers, the leadership training made them valuable assets to business and industry.

This year, the Department of Military Science continued the tradition of commissioning outstanding black officers for positions of leadership.



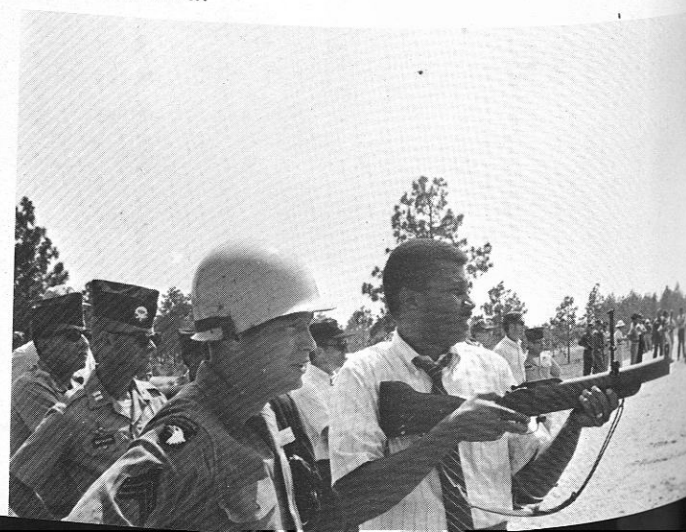

The Tuskegee Institute Pan-hellenic Association is comprised of three national sororities and four national fraternities. The governing body of the organization is the Pan-Hellenic Council, which includes two delegates from each of the sororities and fraternities. The purposes of the Association are to maintain high fraternal and sororal life, interfraternal and sorority relations, to unify the interests of the Greeks and non-Greeks, and to cooperate with the administration in developing high school and scholastic standards.

Omega Psi Phi



The Omega Psi Phi Fraternity was organized Friday evening, November 17, 1911, in the office of Ernest E. Just, Professor of Biology, Howard University. The organizers were three students in the College of Liberal Arts, Edgar A. Love, Oscar J. Cooper, and Frank Coleman. Professor Just was their faculty advisor.

At the first meeting the name of the Fraternity was formed from the initials of the Greek phrase, meaning "Friendship is essential to the soul." The phrase was selected as the Fraternity's motto. Manhood, Scholarship, Perseverance, and Uplift were adopted as the cardinal principles.

"It was impossible", said Edgar Love in 1961, "to dream that the Fraternity would grow from fourteen members in 1911 to more than twenty-five thousand in a period of fifty years."

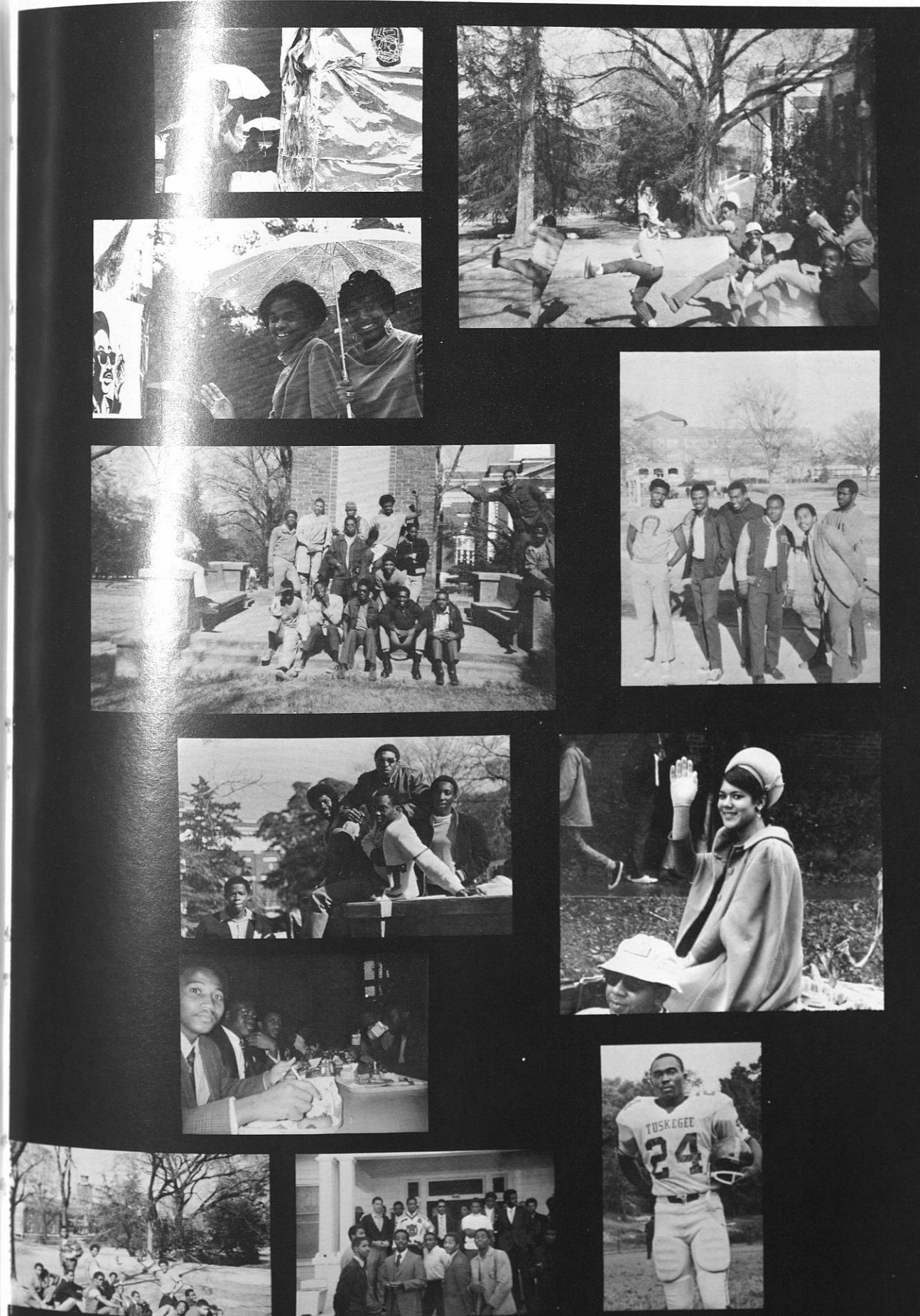

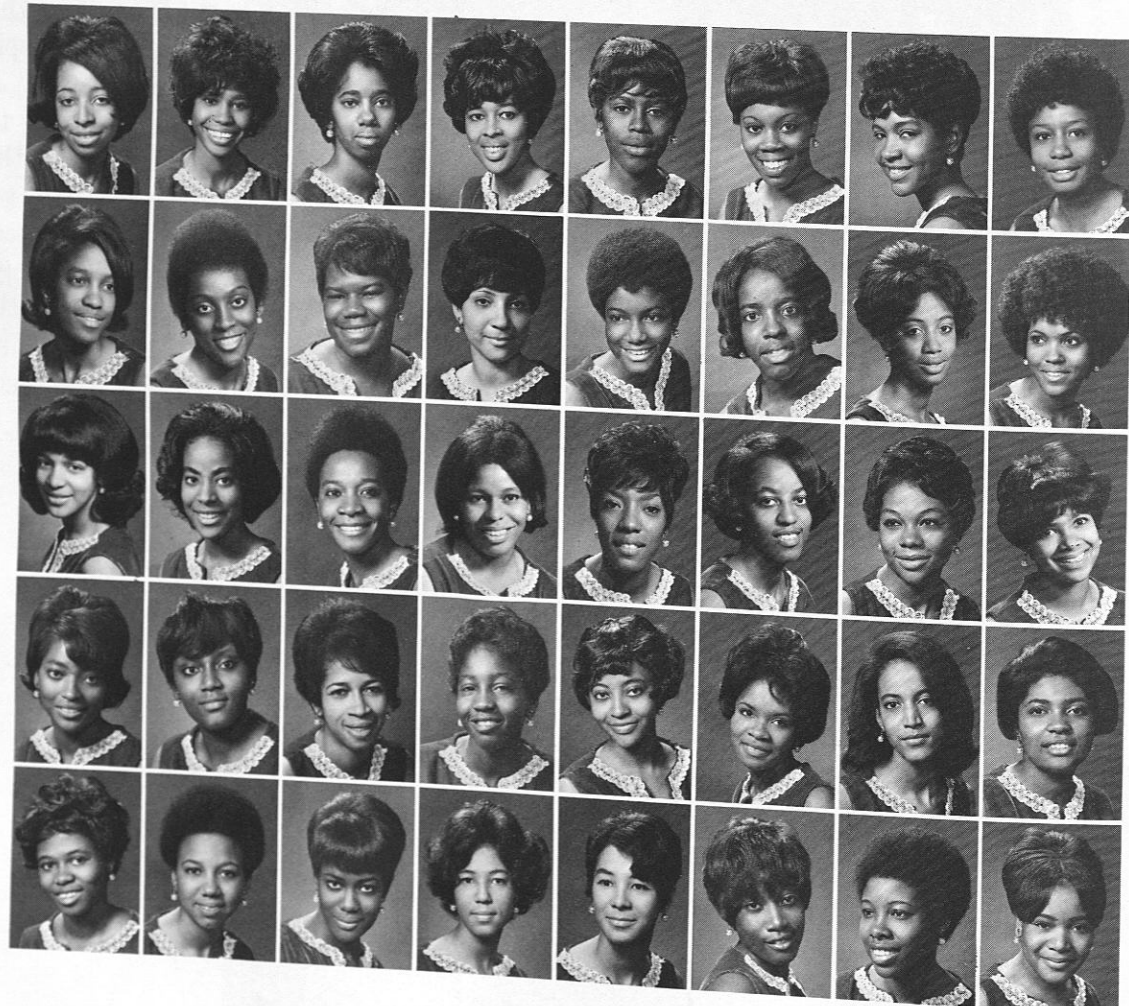

Delta Sigma Theta

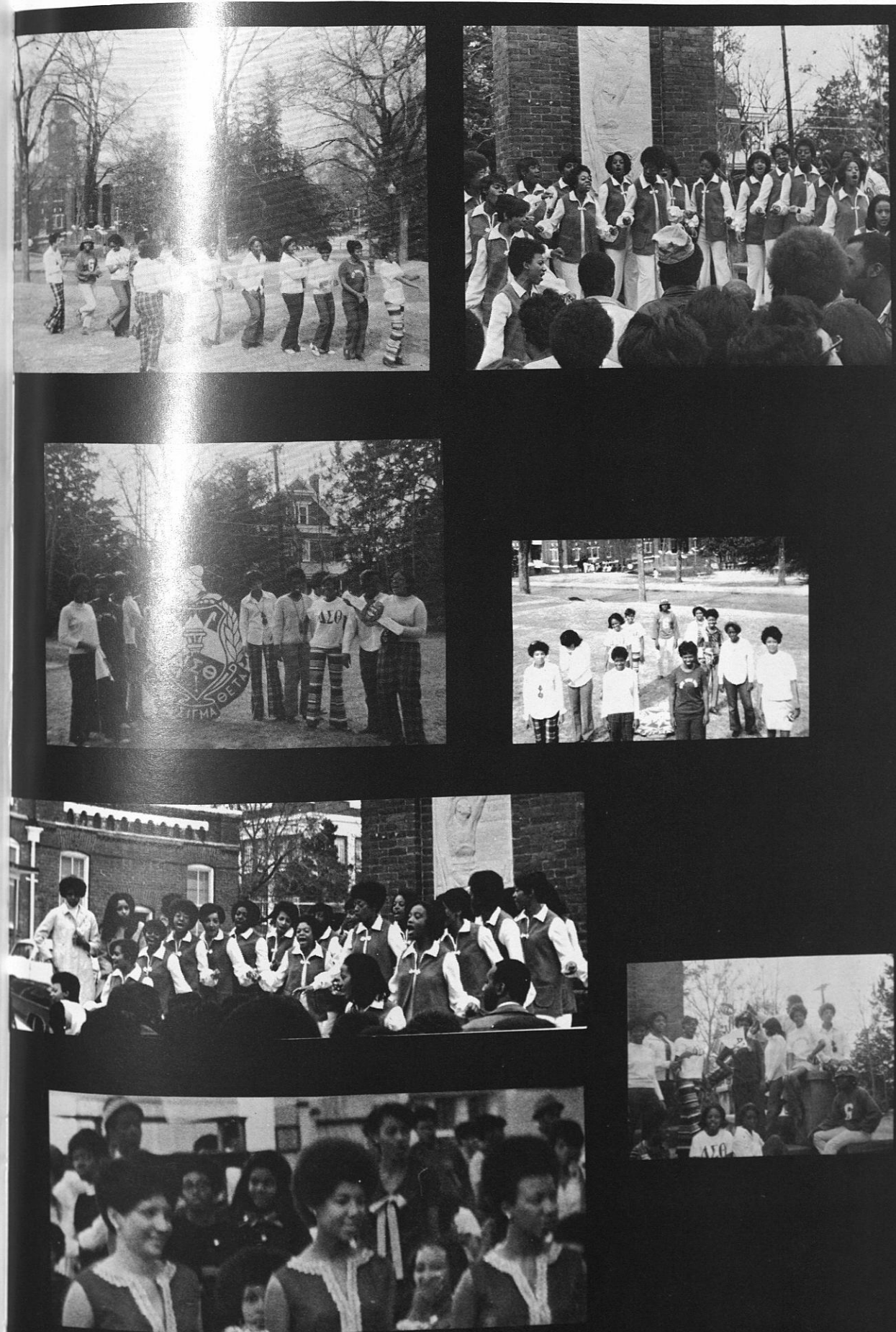


At the inception of Delta Sigma Theta in 1913 at Howard University, the Founders envisioned an organization of college women pledged to serious endeavor and community service. These youthful students demonstrated a vital concern for social welfare, academic excellence, and cultural enrichment, de-emphasizing the social side of sorority life. Their ideas of scholarship and service have withstood the test of time, and today Delta Sigma Theta is a public service sorority, dedicated to a program of sharing membership skills and organizational services in the public interest. 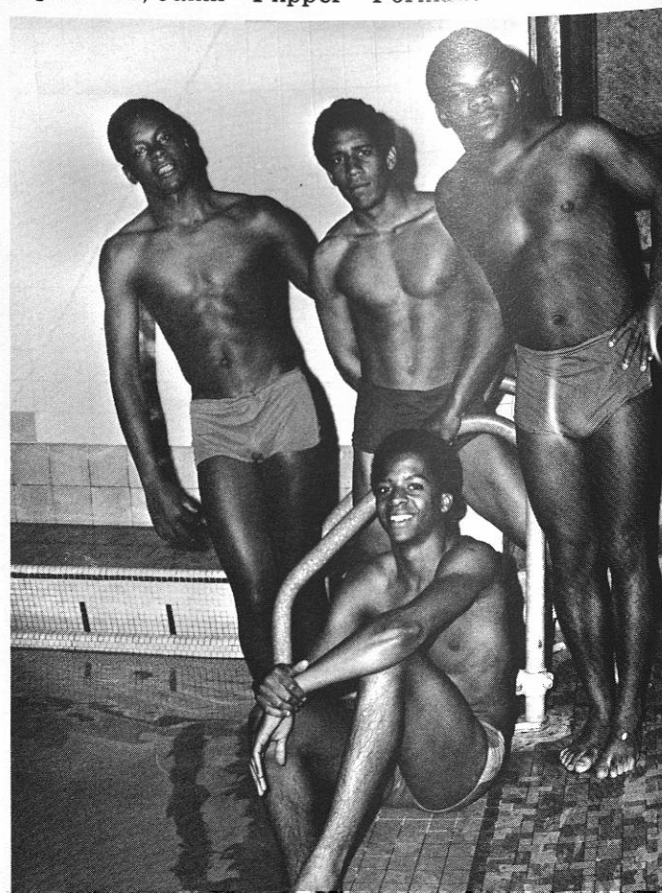

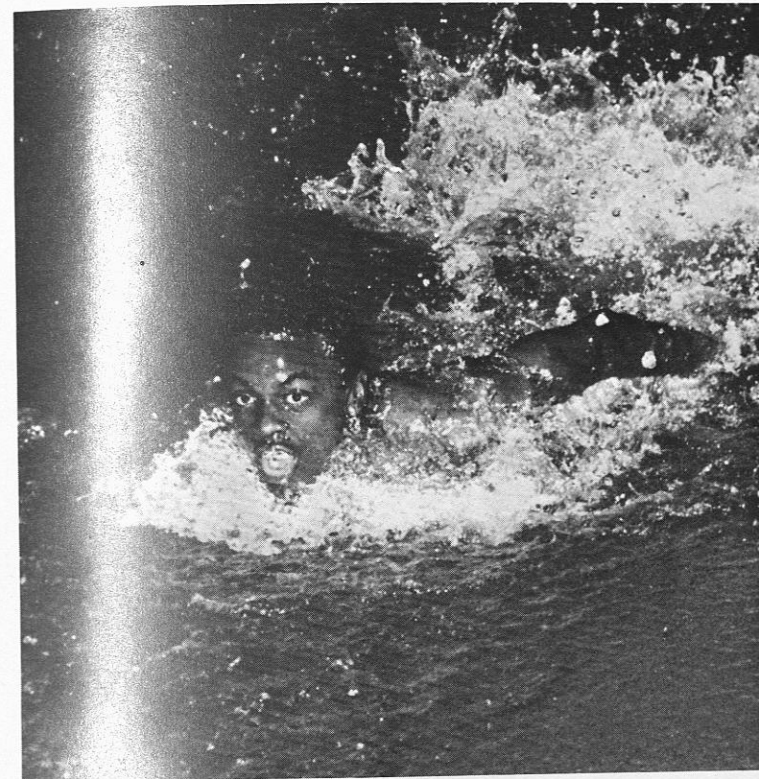

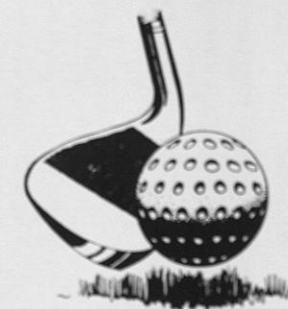
