








## Dedication



#### DR. BOOKER TALIAFERRO WASHINGTON

Booker Taliaferro Washington, the founder and first principal of Tuskegee Institute, was born near Hale's Ford in Franklin County, Virginia, in 1856, and died at Tuskegee Institute, on November 14, 1915.

Dr. Washington's work in the fields of education and race relations ranks among the great contributions to the advancement of the Negro, the South, and the nation.

He was a great man: many had trust in him and believed in him, for he was not only a leader but a friend to all men of his race. He was always willing to help anyone in need of aid.

Dr. Washington was elected to the Hall of Fame in 1945.

#### DR. ROBERT RUSSA MOTON

Robert Russa Moton, successor to Booker T. Washington, was born in Amelia County, Virginia, on August 26, 1867.

His career as an educator and distinguished leader is reflected in the field of race relations. His treatise, What the Negro Thinks, represents an analysis and reflection regarding race relations.

Dr. Moton was a very admirable character: he was respected and liked by all who knew him. In addition, he was a "good sport" and very interested in the welfare of his race.

Dr. Moton died on May 31, 1940, in Capahosic, Virginia.

#### President Patterson's Tenth Anniversary

This school year closes the tenth year of commendable service performed by Dr. Frederick D. Patterson in the capacity of President of Tuskegee Institute.

Dr. Patterson attended Prarie View College, Prarie View, Texas, from 1915 to 1919; received the degree of Doctor of Veterinary Medicine from Iowa State College in 1923; received the Master of Science Degree in bacteriology, from the same college in 1927; received the degree of Doctor of Philosophy, from Cornell University in 1932.


Previous to his inauguration as president of Tuskegee Institute in 1935, he served in the capacity of veterinarian and instructor in bacteriology from 1928-1932; he was elevated then to the position of Director of the School of Agriculture for three years. He is responsible for the organization of 32 private colleges into the United Negro College Fund which he launched in 1944, and is president of the organization.

In spite of the difficulties which have confronted him since his presidency — especially during these last four chaotic war years — he has done an exceedingly commendable job and has brought our school through many struggles.


We feel ertremely proud of Dr. Patterson and are fortunate in having such a great man for our leader.

We extend our hearty appreciation and gratitude toward him and wish him many more ripened, successful years.







## Class History

"Ah! Sweet mystery of life at last I've found thee!" was the impression the supposedly venerable upper-classmen might have received from the facial expressions of the insignificant creatures the newly arrived "crabs" and "crabettes." "It is a beautiful campus and the weather conditions are perfect" must have been the verdict of incoming freshmen, representing every state in the union.

We "crabs" and "crabettes" seemed to be omnipresent during the first week; we were everywhere, under the feet of the dignified rulers of the vast domain—the Seniors. What a mess! We were really busy for three days after our arrival; we had never gone through the registration procedures before. Rushing hither and yon, we made a grand hustle and bustle everywhere. In fact, we were—just lost. Too frequently one could be heard to say, "Whew, I'm breathless."

Under the supervision of our class sponsor, Mr. J. J Flood, elections were held and Garvin Tutt became the first president of the class of '46.

In previous years, the "crabs" had looked forward to the third quarter during which time the gala Social Club dances occurred. We thought we too must wait two quarters, proving ourselves worthy, ere we could attend club dances; but, no, in 1942, this privilege was extended to freshmen during the second quarter. That, we understood, was "history!" For weeks, we went around with our chests poked out! Instructors had told us that we were the best class that had ever enrolled in Tuskegee, and, strange as it may seem, when the privilege was granted, we believed it.

To top that, we sponsored a formal Christmas dance which was held in the Chambliss Children's House. A marvelous time was had. The hackneyed expression: "When it rains, it pours" was exemplified the night the Kryl Symphony Orchestra gave its concert. Many girls who left the dorm bedecked in dresses sweeping the street returned in the same raiments now become so short that some were actually mistaken for afternoon dresses. Remember?

One day during the freshman regime, Lord and Lady Halifafx of England paid us a visit. On January 5, 1943, the whole campus mourned the loss of our great friend and scientist, Dr. George Washington Carver.

During the first quarter, the men had outnumbered the women, but when March rolled around, the fellows slowly drifted away: they had received greetings from their Uncle Sam, who said, "You gotta work or you gotta fight."

Early in April came the mighty division of the Army Air Corps—the C.T.D. We all marched along with them, singing their theme song, "The Army Air Corps." Now that the army activity program was integrated with that of the Institute, many social affairs were planned, at the Air Base, the U.S.O., and the Cadet Recreation Center.

Among other events were: the presentation of the plaque for dormitory cleanliness and general conduct and attitudes . . . James Hall Open House, The Reverse Chivalry Dance and the Military (R.O.T.C.) Ball . . . the opening of the U.S.O.

Came September, 1943, we no longer had to wear the green cap, indicating that we were going through the "green" stage. It was now time to prove to the "crabs" that we know everything—at least, we thought we did. Most of us became active in all of the organizations, both social and non-social. We went everywhere and tried to do everything. Those who did not had gone home because they were disillusioned, lacked funds, were too far from home to get back, or had not proved that they were capable of being promoted from the "green" stage. This year was not too eventful for us. Our sponsor was Dr. J. Max Bond and our leader this year, Wilbert Galleaud. The Sophomore girls were the first tto have a Senior young lady, Irene Parish, as House Advisor. We will always remember Miss Parish for her strength, loving kindness, and humanity.

Among the campus visitors were: Joe Louis, "Rochester," Lena Horne, and movie star Phillip Dorn.

September, 1944—Juniors. Looking forward to becoming Seniors the following year!

This year there was really a man shortage; by this time most of our boys had answered their "Uncle's" call, either working or fighting. Everything seemed a "Girl-only Affair." From the campus, even the C.T.D. had vanished—but the Cadets and Officers were here; nevertheless, we knew that it was our duty to carry on and that is just what we did. Mr. Trammel, our chosen sponsor, stuck by us through thick and thin.

Although there were only a few men in the class, one, Ulysses Washington, who came to us in '42, from the fair city of Tuscaloosa, Alabama, emerged as class president.

The most gala event of the year was the "PROM." We "had a ball if there ever was one!" said to be the best in the history of "Skegee." Under the able assistance of Pfc. Otto McClarrin, the Juniors were able to sponsor a "PROM" that was undescribably lovely. With multi-colored streamers making a roof over the heads of more than a thousand persons and a huge light (centering the floor), which gave a very soft glow, there was created in Logan Hall an atmosphere which put everybody in the mood for "tripping the light fantastic." Oh, what a night!

Our President of the United States, Franklin Delano Roosevelt, passes during this year and the campus joined the nation in mourning a great man.

Then came the invitation from C.B.S. The Institute Choir sang in lieu of the Wings Over Jordan Ensemble which was on an overseas tour.

September, 1945! The fourth and last year! We anxiously looked forward to May. Mr. Trammel, along with "Major" Cleve Abbot and Mr. Luther Foster, was again elected class sponsor. Eleanor J. David, who hails from Trenton, New Jersey, was elected president of the class. An able group assisted her: Charles Campbell, vice-president; Julia Pitts, secretary; Julia Martin, assistant secretary; Alice Dunnigan, treasurer; Agnes Woodard, business manager; and Helen Brown, editor-in-chief of the Tuskeana.

This year proved to be one of the most significant and eventful years of our stay at "Skegee." It seemed like old times; most of our boys had been discharged from the services and the Veterans program, introduced in our Junior year, was well under way.

Came the erection of the beautiful and magnificent Nurses Home! The boys were fortunate in reclaiming another of their dorms, Sage Hall, after the Cadets vacated in November.

In the Institute Chapel were held services which proved both beneficial and inspirational—namely, Dr. Patterson's Tenth Anniversary and a service honoring Mr. T. M. Campbell's forty years of service in Agricultural Extension. Our own Mr. Isaac Hathaway, Head of the Department of Ceramics, made of Mr. Campbell a bust which was presented to him. The bust may be seen by all friends and visitors who enter the Extension Building.

Campus-wide enthusiasm reached its zenith when our founder, Booker T. Washington, was elected to the Hall of Fame. That the world-famous Tuskegee Choir made a hit on its first radio appearance was evidenced by a second invitation extended to it for a repeat performance on "Wings Over Jordan" hour of C.B.S.

Well! Well! What is this? Grand Opening of the Propeller Club! Whom do we see? The Seniors, of course. Yes, the Seniors christened the new club and enjoyed the beautiful strains of that well-known recorder of radio and screen, Nat King Cole, and his trio. Thrills! Thrills! and more thrills!

January 5, 1946 marked the observance of the first National Carver Day.

The happy go-luckies of four years ago witnessed many significant events, and before Tuskeana '46 is off to press, there will be many more. We as individuals now hope to take our place in the world of tomorrow and become assets to the Negro race. Many of our prominent members and leaders we have seen pass from our midst, but though they are gone their influences are still felt. We feel, however, that our four, well-spent years have been enlightening.

To you whom we leave behind, the class of '46 of Tuskegee Institute, bids farewell.

To the Faculty, and President of Tuskegee Institute, we leave our gratitude for your patient and understanding guidance, and the helpful spirit which you have shown toward us.

To the Freshmen, we leave the endurance, fortitude, and tenacity needed to struggle through four years of college.

To the Sophomores, we leave the glory and honor of becoming "true upper-classmen."

To the Juniors, we bequeath the rights and privileges which bear the heading: "For Seniors Only."

We have heard him on records and over the radio, but here at Tuskegee Institute at the Propeller Club, Mr. Jordan's "Buzz Me" reached a new height.




DOROTHY MAYNOR

#### DR. GEORGE WASHINGTON CARVER

We, the students of Tuskegee Institute observed George Washington Carver Day, which was on January 7 by replacing the regular Vesper Services with a program of reminiscences and tributes.





#### T. M. CAMPBELL


#### BOOKER T. WASHINGTON

#### MISS "T" CLUB


Miss Alice Coachman, an attractive lassie hailing from Albany, Georgia. She participates wholeheartedly in all sports, especially basketball and track.




DR. MONROE N. WORK

#### Athletics



CLEVE L. ABBOTT

Mr. Cleve L. Abbott, Director of Athletics and head of the Department of Physical Education, is better known to the student body and faculty of Tuskegee Institute as "Major." He has served in this capacity for 25 years. He became connected with this faculty in 1916 shortly after his graduation from South Dakota State College. He voluntarily left the service of the school in 1917 and entered the Officers Training Camp at Fort Des Moines, Iowa, where upon the successful completion of the course was commissioned and served with the American Expeditionary Forces in France during World War I.

He rejoined the faculty in 1923 and has served continuously since then as Director of Physical Education and athletics.

He is assisted by Edward Adams, Tuskegee, '34; Ross C. Owen, South Dakota State College, '25; Guy R. Trammell, Tuskegee, '36; Ernest T. Bailey, Tuskegee, '27; Henry C. Harrison, Tuskegee, '28.

Mr. Abbott is a genial and understanding adviser to a host of students while here and after graduation. He has done much toward guiding Tuskegee's sons and daughters in helping them to find their rightful place in the world.




