CLASS HISTORY

In the past years, happenings have been recorded, and many events have remained indelible in our minds. There have been so many ways of travel through the ages that it is not surprising to say that this class of '48 has had speed like that of the rocket.

The rocket in the year 1943 was more or less an experiment and had not yet reached its fullest development. Perhaps it would not be wrong to say that the Freshman Class of 1944-45 was also an experiment, for were we not just beginning our college career, and did we not have three years ahead of us before we would reach our fullest development? As with all experiments, there were times of bitter disappointments. We, like the rocket, which has a pilot, also had guidance. Mr. J. J. Flood was our adviser and our capable officers were Grover Bullock, president, and Elnita T. Mayberry, secretary.

It's rather nice to remember that we were dubbed the "Almighty Freshmen" and that we lived up to it, for we made a grand showing in everything we undertook. We made noteworthy contributions to the Red Cross and the United Negro College Fund, and we worked exceedingly well in other drives that help the human race.

Having tried the first experiment of college, many tried again for the second year of "bumps and slidings" (as must have been the case in developing the rocket). The year 1945-46 had, of course, a few changes. Transfer students were added, and many veterans returned; these additions increased our enrollment considerably. The adviser for the year was the Reverend Raymond T. Harvey, and the officers were Grover Bullock, president; Isaac Porter, vice president; Harriet Hutchinson, secretary; Pauline Weathersby, assistant secretary; Sheldon Phillips, treasurer; and Perry Rosh, sergeant-at-arms. Larleitta Crockett and Emma Arnold represented the class on the Institute Council.

During this year the class really displayed its extra-curricular abilities. We entered every school activity that was made available to us. We were represented on the Campus Digest staff and in the Little Theatre, Institute Choir, Rifle Team, social and religious clubs and many other organizations. Bobbie Goodson was crowned "Miss Sophomore."

It was in 1946-47 that we united to work toward the end of the experiment—graduation. Perhaps the junior year was the most difficult, but nevertheless we conquered it. We now had Dr. J. E. Fuller as adviser, and offi-

cers on this experimental tour were John W. Young, president; Tyree Felder, vice-president; Harriet Hutchinson, secretary; Larleitta Crockett, assistant secretary; William Surcey, business maqnager; and Pernell Wilder, sergeant-at-arms. Institute Council representatives were Emma Arnold and Russell Kirkpatrick.

It seemed no time at all before the Junior-Senior Prom was just around the corner, and we were in a dither making preparations for the long-prayed-for prom, where the young women could show off their most fanciful evening dresses and the men could look their handsomest in their formal attire. On April 29, 1947, the prom was held in full swing, everyone looking his best and having a good time. The scheme of decoration was extremely exotic. Above the dance floor hung a canopy of spring color streamers, which were blended into a unique spiral pattern. In the center of the floor was a fountain that sent a stream of water several inches high. The improvision of trees and foliage completed the scenery of the uniquely decorated hall. Music for the affair was furnished by the Fisk University Swing Band directed by Robert N. Felder, brother of the President of the Junior Class, Booker T. Felder.

During this year, the Little Theatre sponsored a play, "The Show-off," in which Phillip Raymond, Victor Morris and Hazel Scruggs had important roles.

It should not be forgotten that thirty-five of the students who made the Dean's list were from this class. The requirements for the honor were a "B" average or more and good standing with the school. Seven of the thirty-five are members of the Alpha Kappa Mu Honor Society of which Phillip Raymond is president; Rosie Lockett, secretary-treasurer; and Georgiana Evans, assistant secretary-treasurer. This year Mis Sereeta Hymes was chosen "Miss Junior."

The probabilities are that passengers will not travel in rockets until the projectiles have been fully developed for carrying mail and express. Some daring adventurer may then undertake to ride, with such precaution for his comfort and safety as he may be able to manage. Just as passengers prepared themselves for the ride in the rocket, we also prepared ourselves for the undertaking of the last "go round" in college. The minimum requirements were to maintain a level head and to keep our noses to the grindstone.

the extra fuel their passage required. Dr. J. E. assuring the passengers as they began to earn Fuller still had the responsibility of nursing the last yard of the distance out of the glide to bring the seniors as gently as an angel to its birth at the waiting port of graduation.

Wilder, vice president; Harriet Hutchinson, secretary; Louise Yelverton, corresponding secretary; Richard Cobb, treasurer; Claude George, financial secretary; Essie Summers, reporter; Russell Kirkpatrick, business manager; and John Dickerson, parliamentarian. To represent us on the Institute Council were Claude George, Clement Bronson, and Quentin Gallaird. Miss Johnnye Valien was chosen "Miss Senior."

We now had other responsibilities to accept, for as seniors the faculty felt that we were capable of performing certain duties not handled by students before. Our first assignment was the publication of the Homecoming Souvenir Programs. On this occasion Florida A. & M. College was our guest. The Tuskeana Staff worked diligently to turn out the best book in years, with the helpful advice and patient laboring of its adviser, Mr. A. L. Holsey, and its class adviser, Dr. J. E. Fuller.

The Senior Welfare Committee, of which William Surcey was chairman, sponsored several discussions beneficial to seniors, one on "Manners Today," led by Miss Queen E. Shootes and another, "Parenthood," led by Miss Mary Langford of the Planned Parenthood Association.

In our senior year we found that we were most victorious in playing football because of the splendid work of Whitney Van Cleve, All-American of 1946, Claude George, Allison Figaro, Jesse Bolden, George Davis, Charles Mayes and Charles Gray.

In basketball, we had such stars as Calvin Jones, Claude George and Whitney Van Cleve.

This was the year when "Miss Tuskegee '48" was to be chosen from our class. Bobbie L. Goodson won the contest by a very small margin over Ruthie Bolden. Other candidates were Grace Watson and Geraldine Clausell. Miss Goodson was also crowned Queen of the May.

The senior young women honored the senior men and faculty with a dance, "The White Ball," on April 16, 1948, in Logan Hall. This occasion was one that will always be remembered. All young women wore white evening gowns, and young men were dressed in black and white formal attire. The music was sweet and was enjoyed by all.

We had a great representation of queens during the Home Coming Celebration. They were as follows: Miss Physical Education, Elaine Bradford; Miss Nyx, Ruthie Bolden; Miss Rho Delta Sigma, Wenona Collins; Miss Semper Fidelis, Sereetta Hymes; Miss KiYi, Johnnie Jordan; Miss C. D., Mildred McGowan; Miss Home Economics, Future Trammell.

We, already like the fast-moving plane, the rocket, will increase our velocity and zoom forth to the final destination—graduation.

ENITORIAL

ONE WORLD AT TUSKEGEE INSTITUTE

Those who today are striving to build a "One World" for tomorrow may learn much from the Tuskegee Institute community. Those of us here at Tuskegee who have traveled extensively have undoubtedly observed that in no other community or institution do people of so many different races and countries mingle as do visitors and friends at Tuskegee Institute. Considering this fact, the question arises: Why is this so? If asked this question, the romantic poet would probably have answered, "Nature always presents her pattern prior to any worthy accomplishment." Her pattern of a "One World" is the Tuskegee Institute community. The predestinarian or fatalist of yesteryear would probably have answered, "This was in the plan; it was predestined," or "This is an act of fate." And he would have been perfectly right. But those of us who would have this Tuskegee spirit to inject into a one-world, those of us who would dare analyze this invaluable and commutable quality of Tuskegee Institute in terms of what man has done to help bring it about, and, of what man and especially Tuskegeans can do to perpetuate a "One World," would answer: "This quality is the fruit from a seed planted a generation ago by a great man, a firm believer in the good found in all people, a lover of people." His fruit shall grow as long as Tuskegee Institute shall live.

Yes, we know that nature always presents her pattern. Long before a piece of mechanism was invented, the animal organism was functioning; before the electric light was conceived the sun, moon and stars were shining; and before the invention of explosives there were erupting volcanoes. The fact that congeniality is a part of Tuskegee Institute assures one that it was meant to be. In order to appreciate this congeniality let us study three of Doctor Washington's quotations, each one of which reveals his unselfish concern for all human beings, and his fervent desire to have all live in a "One World." They are as follows:

"I will let no man drag me down so low as to make me hate him."

"There is no defense or security for any of us except in the highest intelligence and development of all."

"Let down your buckets where you

The first quotation implies a fact of which we are all aware, that if there is to be a "One World" there must exist in it little or no hate between individuals, between states, between nations and between races; because hatred corrupts the states, the nations, the races, and the whole world.

We have a living example of quotation number two in the struggle of true Americans and other citizens of the world to elevate Europe and other war-torn sections to the level of the more fortunate areas. Let us hope that on completing this task, the American citizens will concentrate just as much effort in effecting social equality and justice. But let it not be said that this elevation is being entirely neglected at the present time. We need only to observe the growth of Tuskegee Institute and the increasing prestige of its faculty and graduates to realize that the day is near when there will be only a minimum of oppressed people.

Quotation three tells us that we, you and I, the builders of a "One World" for tomorrow, should follow the method of the constructor, who excavates his land, lays a solid foundation, and then builds toward the sky, or the method of the aviator, who courses along his own field to acquire force, and then flies to heaven knows where.

Yes, in order for any of us to realize the fruits of a "One World," all of us must move with a determined effort to stamp out hatred, to promote high intelligence in others. In doing this every individual must do the part nearest him first and then branch out in the more distant areas. These things, in a great part, we have accomplished at Tuskegee Institute; and the results are noticeable to all who linger here for any extended period of time. Those of us entering other communities must now aim at communicating this spirit of Tuskegee Institute to all with whom we come in contact.
