It was quickly restored and again is a target for world-wide sight-seers.





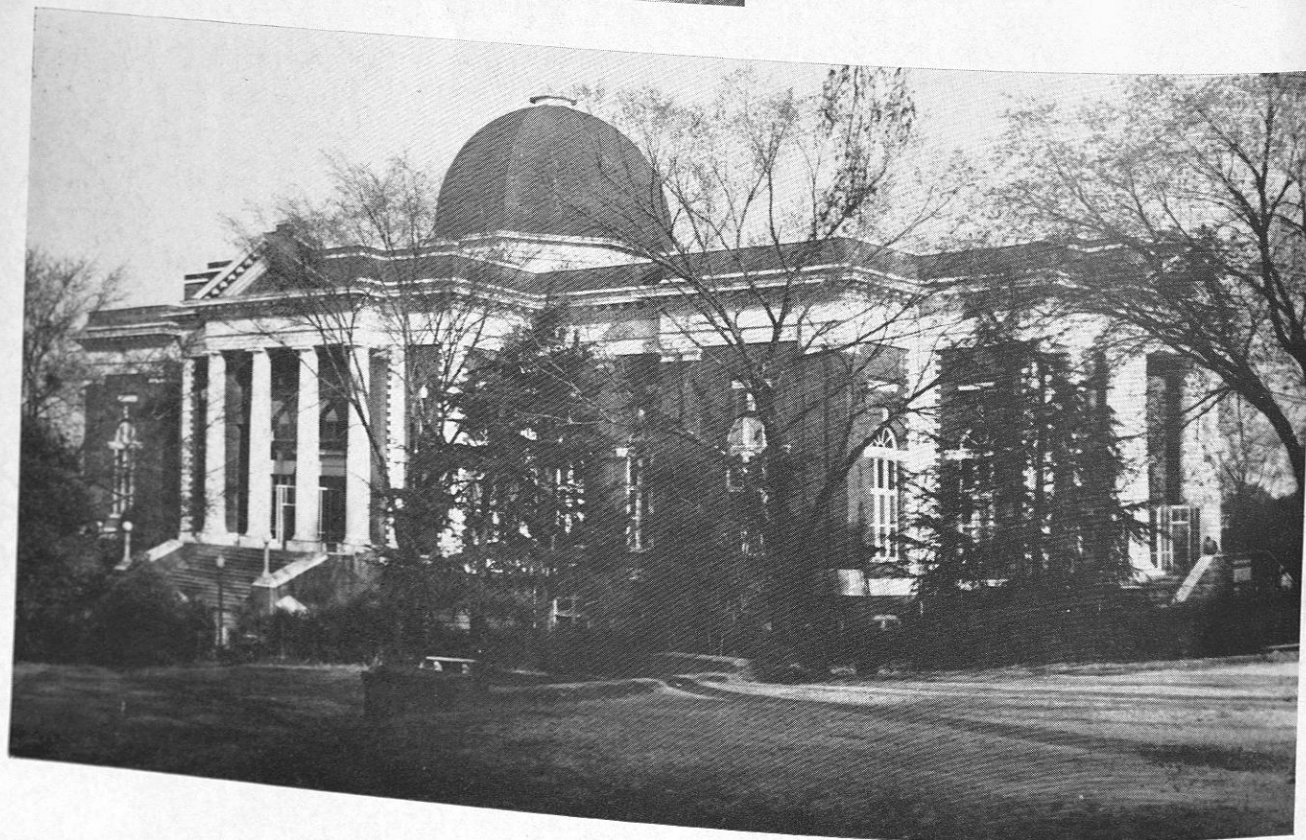

3. To enrich and broaden the cultural and intellectual life among the women students at Tuskegee Institute.
4. To foster better living standards and better relationships among the students in the Residence Halls.

Each year the A. W. S. honors the senior women with a Banquet. The group has been entertained with such outstanding speakers as: Mrs. Mary McLead Bethune, accompanied by Mrs. Eleanor Roosevelt, Attorney Mahalia Dixson and numerous other outstanding speakers.

The most estimable Senior is selected by the student body and presented at the annual Associated Women Student's Banquet. In its efforts to make campus life more enjoyable, the Associated Women Student Organization has provided for wholesome recreation through the purchase of a bicycle and skates which the women students may rent for a small fee.

Miss Minnie Long has served as president of the organization for the past two years. Under her leadership, the Associated Women Students' organization has grown stronger.

Our founders, being aware of the increasing complexity of women's problems, especially those of Negro women, and realizing the necessity of forming an organization for the purpose of studying and solving such problems, organized on January 6, 1908 at Howard University, Alpha Kappa Alpha Sorority in order to cultivate and encourage high scholastic and ethical standards, improve the social status of the race, promote unity and friendship among college women, and keep alive within

the alumnae an interest in college life and the progressive movements emanating therefrom.

Gamma Kappa Chapter of Alpha Kappa Alpha Sorority was organized April 17, 1948 on Tuskegee Institute Campus. This chapter endeavors to uphold the ideals of the founders by selecting to its membership those young women of the highest intellectual, ethical, and moral calibre in order to continuously improve the performance and achievement which characterize Alpha Kappa Alpha women everywhere.

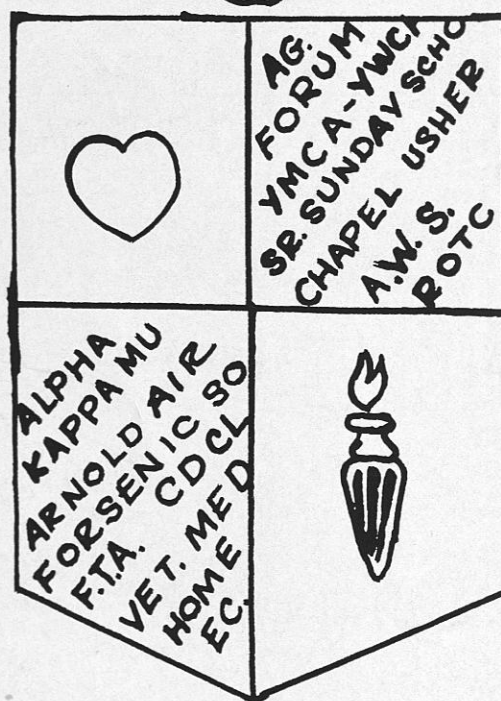

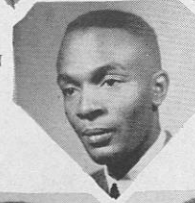

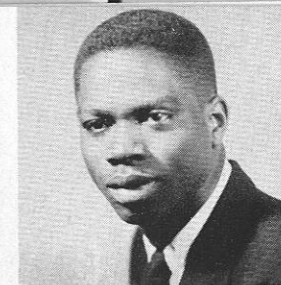
The Young Women's Christian Association is a voluntary campus unit of the National Student YWCA. Members of a student YWCA become a part of a vital worldwide Christian fellowship.

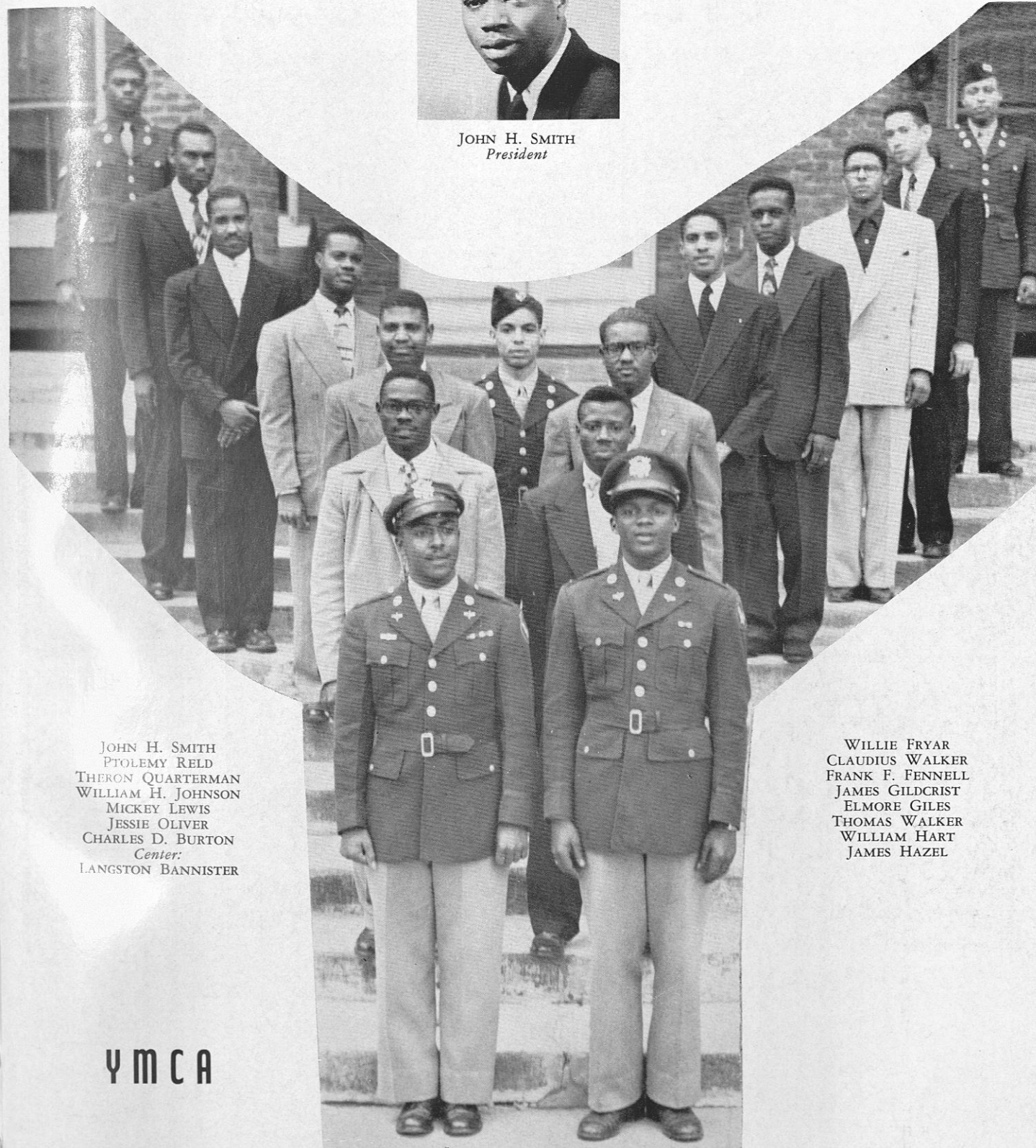
During the past four years, two of which Miss Lottie Broadnax was president, the YWCA has

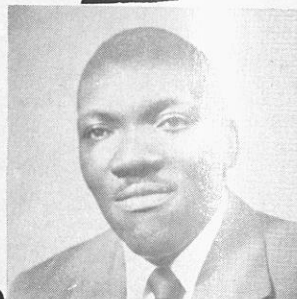
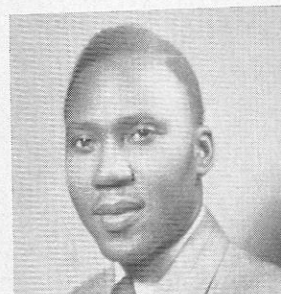
The purposes of the society are as follows:

Nursing

The Tuskegee Institute School of Nursing was established in 1891. Nursing students obtained their basic nursing experience at the John A. Andrew Memorial Hospital. The school of nursing is accredited by the State Board of Nurses' Examiners. Graduates from the course are eligible to take the Alabama State Board Examination for registration as professional nurses.

The objectives of the school of nursing are: to assist, and direct students showing ability and aptitudes for professional nursing and to provide educational opportunities and experiences in the

field; to stimulate and guide learning so that the student emerges an efficient, useful, and progressive member of society as well as a professional nurse; to provide a professional foundation which will enable the student to build further for effective service in public health, institutional, industrial and other branches of professional nursing.

There are two programs—one leading to a B.S. in Nursing which is 4 years in length, the other is a three year program leading to a R.N. The students in both programs affiliate with other large urban hospitals.

The year 1949-50 arrived to find the, now, junior class still in active existence—although somewhat smaller in number. The officers for the year were: Jeff Long, president; Herbert Blanks, vice-president; Mary Harper, secretary; Elextine Clay, treasurer, and George Haynes, Adviser.
