the alumnae an interest in college life and the progressive movements emanating therefrom.



# School of Mursino

The Tuskegee Institute School of Nursing was established in 1891. Nursing students obtained their basic nursing experience at the John A. Andrew Memorial Hospital. The school of nursing is acredited by the State Board of Nurses' Examiners. Graduates from the course are eligible to take the Alabama State Board Examination for registration as professional nurses.

The objectives of the school of nursing are: to assist, and direct students showing ability and aptitudes for professiona lnursing and to provide educational opportunities and experiences in the field; to stimulate and guide learning so that the student emerges an efficient, useful, and progressive member of society as well as a professional nurse; to provide a professional foundation which will enable the student to build further for effective service in public health, institutional, industrial and other branches of professional nursing.

There are two programs—one leading to a B.S. in Nursing which is 4 years in length, the other is a three year program leading to a R.N. The students in both programs affiliate with other large urban hospitals.

forth into the future determined to live as useful citizens in whatever community in which we find ourselves, exemplifying at all times the real spirit of our Alma Mater.




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
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
