

For his ceaseless efforts and his never-ending fight for the "Brotherhood of Man," the Class of 1952 is honored to pay him tribute.






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


Students nominated and accepted will be listed in the annual directory of distinguished students from colleges and universities throughout America. This annual will give a biographical sketch and write-up of each student selected.

The Tuskegee Institute Student-Faculty Council has enjoyed one of its most productive years, despite the fact that all issues considered this year were of a highly controversial nature. Some issues considered were: Extending the library hours to accommodate Five Year Plan Students and extending dance hours.

The Council sponsored the three big dances of the year, namely, Freshman Acquaintance Dance, Christmas Dance and "Miss Tuskegee's" Coronation Ball. In addition, the Council sponsored a bonfire which preceded the homecoming activities and took full responsibility for arranging for Homecoming. The Council has supervised the publication of the Campus Digest, which is the school paper.

In the area of fostering better Student-Faculty relations the Council has met with President Patterson to advise him of the students' views on matters of common concern. At the request of the Chairman of the Council, J. H. Smith, Jr., the President of the Institute met informally with the student body, when it was deemed necessary by the Council.

The Council finished its program for the year by supervising the election of "Miss Tuskegee," appointing new members to the various committees of the Institute, sponsoring the "Leadership Institute," which meets once each quarter bringing together all officers of campus organizations, and preparing for a revision of the student hand-


ARNOLD AIR SOCIETY



Voluntary student Christian groups have been a part of the campus life of Tuskegee Institute since the founding of the Institution.


The YMCA originated in London in 1844 when George Williams, a young clerk in a drygoods store, and eleven fellow clerks associated themselves together "for the spiritual and mental improvement of young men in the drapery and other trades." The idea of young men uniting to express their Christian convictions in their places of work spread rapidly throughout Britain and the continent. The first YMCA in the United States was formed in Boston in 1851.

The first students to adapt the YMCA to the needs of their place of work, were at the University of Virginia where a YMCA was formed in 1858.

By 1877 there were YMCAs in forty colleges but still there was no intercollegiate organization. A Princeton student urged campus YMCAs to send delegates to an International Convention of the YMCA where the Intercollegiate YMCA was formed in 1877. Three of the twenty-one chartered Associations were in Negro colleges. The new movement grew and in ten years enrolled 12,000 members in 258 colleges.

Since the establishment of the YMCA at Tus-kegee Institute, it has become a member of the National Student YMCA. The YMCA of Tuskegee Institute is unequivocally striving to promote the standards of Christian fellowship and help students gain clearer concepts of the true meaning and values of wholesome Christian living.


ASSOCIATED WOMEN STUDENTS

CLASS HISTORY

Lest we forget, we will always remember the endearing years that have gone to make up this class history. Even now, it all seems like a dream which just began a short while ago. As we pause now, we find the curtains of time slowly going up to allow the "Parade In Review" of our past.

In September of 1948, hundreds of new students arrived on the campus of Tuskegee Institute eager to join others in the search for education. None knew exactly what would face them, but all were anxious to find out. These new members of the campus community, the freshmen, assumed the familiar roles of "Crabs" and "Crabettes." With these roles went all the glory that belongs to the freshmen.

The first year was filled with many exciting and profitable experiences. Carl Hill was elected president. He, with the help of Mrs. Elizabeth Payton Wright, served efficiently. Under his leadership the Freshman Class began making the campus community aware of its potentialities. Myrtle Poole was elected "Miss Freshman" and reigned with all the pomp and dignity befitting true royalty. The Freshman Float won third prize in the Homecoming Parade and it was selected on the basis of its merits and niqueness. Through the year the class showed promise and contributed heavily with its many talents. The class as a whole made outstanding contributions in out-of-class activities, and held many key positions in campus organizations and activities which previously barred Preshmen.

Alas! the former Freshmen were together again as Sophomores. Seemingly the students became more active this time. The Sophomore year found Robert Ferris at the helm, and Myrtle Poole as its Secretary. Ethel Huntley was elected "Miss Sophomore," and no more gracious and lovely lady could have been chosen. The Sophomore women had the honor of being selected as the most refined and the most womanly students on the campus, and were recipients of many awards. This was the year that sororities and fraternities were to accept a few members of the class for membership. How proud we were of them as we knew they represented the finer qualities of the student body at large. Many members of the class excelled in various forms of activities. The basketball and football teams, the Campus Digest newspaper, the Tuskeana yearbook, Student Council and many other important committees were dominated by our class. The boys' basketball team had such outstanding players as LeRoy "Radio Red" Porter, Norman "Shot" Jackson, Jesse Davis, and a few others. The football team gained many of its outstanding players from our class-Carl Allen, William M. Lewis, LeRoy Porter, and William Campfield.

The Junior year arrived and the class had dwindled considerably. Many of the students felt unequal to the task and did not return. Despite its decreased numbers the class continued to contribute to the non-academic life of the Institute. Lafayette Alexander was elected president; Myrtle Poole was elected "Miss Junior"; Robert "Buzz" Thurman was elected president of the Student Council of Mechanical Industries; and various other members served on the Student Council and acted as representatives to conferences and conventions. The Junior-Senior Prom was a thing of heauty. Those who attended said it was an evening well spent, one that they would not soon forget.

Perhaps the greatest single achievement of our Junior year was that of the selection of "Miss Tuskegee." The candidates, being all Seniors, were hard to choose from. However, this noble position became that of Miss Clemmie Morrison. She was considered to be the fairest of them all and certainly the most beautiful "Miss Tuskegee" ever to set enthroned. She reigned with all the color and splendor and dignity that was to be hers. She selected as her attendants, Miss Omega McKinney and Miss Selvey Westley. The three of them quickly won the respect and admiration of all the students and the campus community.

After three years of hard labor, we the Seniors of 1952 are beginning to plan our places in life. Very little effort need be spent on making a name for our class as we have given to this, our school, the best that we have. As we prepare to leave you it will prove interesting for those not of this class to note the many fine achievements that we have gained. At present we are primarily interested in what we as a group will face in the coming years. These coming years will be, perhaps, the hardest and most bitter ones for us to face, but with the same spirit that we have here it will prove that we are able to take our place along with all others. These years for many will mean continued study for higher degrees, and for many others they will mean competition with those who are now striving to convert this "Iron Age" into what is soon to be an "Atomic Age."

Each year that we have spent here has held something different for each of us. To some of us these four years have meant successful striving, to others they have meant sadness, grief and failure. This, too, is a part of our class and must be remembered as those who came but failed to conguer.
