
ABOUT THE COVER . . .


Tuskegee...

Tuskegee Institute, the pride of the swift growing South, evolved through the patient process of trying to render the most service to the most people. 

common occupations of life." The beginning curriculum consisted of teacher training, agriculture, and industrial education. With the gradual introduction of new fields as the needs arose, Tuskegee Institute became the focal point of economic, social, and political activities of Negroes in the North and South.






The massive structure of Tompkins Dining Hall is a haven for more than the hungered, for it houses comfortable quarters for recreational activities.

Tuskegee Institute is recognized today as an educational and social force active in the solution of minority group problems, in the nation and in the world. Rated as an "A" grade college by the Southern Association of Colleges and Secondary Schools and the State of Alabama, it is composed of 159 buildings valued at \$11,246,898.00 and 4,925 acres of land. The complete physical plant, including buildings and land is valued at \$13,720,254.00.

Tuskegee is an active member of the United Negro College Fund, which conducts an annual campaign for current operating expenses for 31 private Negro colleges; and is affiliated with the National Foundation for Infantile Paralysis and the Southern Regional Education Board. The John A. Andrew Memorial Hospital has a residency training program which it jointly sponsors with the Veterans Administration; and the School of Education operates model laboratory schools in the community.

Because of present and future demands for trained leadership, Tuskegee Institute is moving into the area of professional and technical training.


... Tomorrow

The School of Education has long since been one of the primary areas of learning in the Tuskegee Institute curriculum. Today, the undergraduate program consists of an integrated curriculum for prospective teachers of elementary schools and of specialized curricula for those who anticipate employment in secondary schools. The integrated and the specialized curricula provide all the basic requirements in both general and professional education for teacher certification in Alabama and other states.

The School of Education is so planned that the personality traits, the interests, and the aptitudes of each



In cooperation with the County School Board, the supervisor of Negro Schools in Macon County, and the local teachers in these schools; the School of Education is operating several laboratory schools. 

The John A. Andrew Memorial Hospital was erected in 1912 as a memorial gift by Mrs. Charles E. Mason in honor of her grandfather, John Albion Andrew, Governor of Massachusetts, 1831-1866. Dr. John A. Kenney, the first medical director of Tuskegee Institute, fostered the plan and through his untiring diligence started the original hospital unit, which is today one of the outstanding hospital centers of the entire South.





