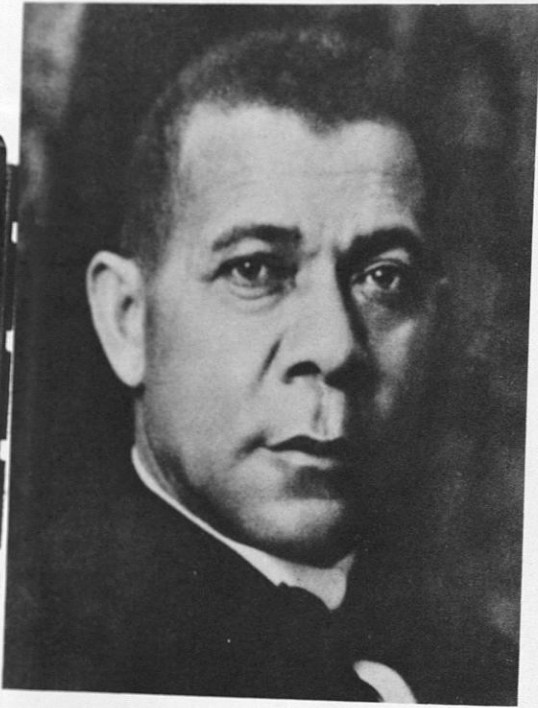

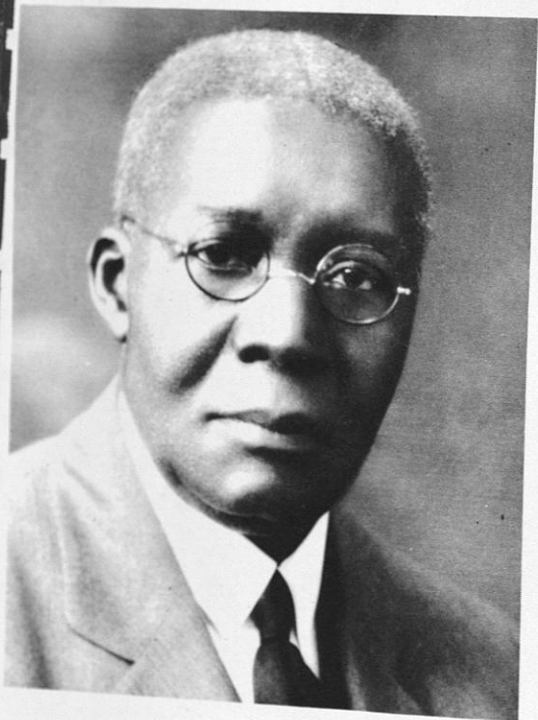

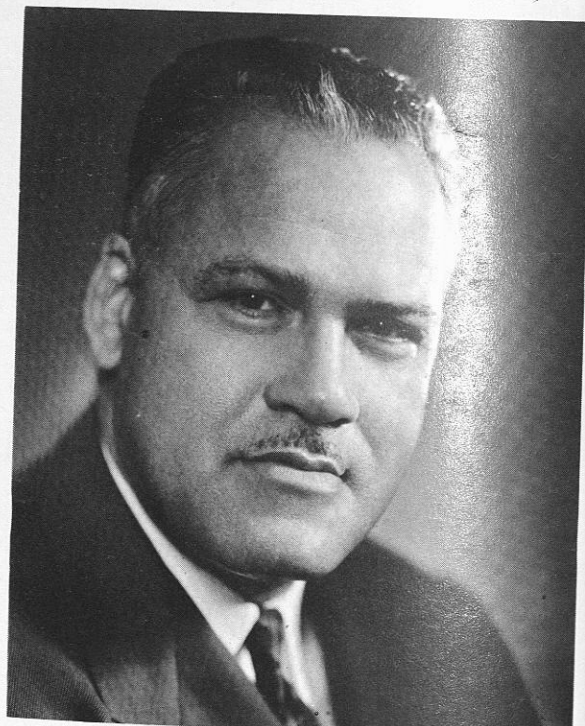


BOOKER TALIAFERRO WASHINGTON, the founder and the first principal of Tuskegee Institute, was born near Hale's Ford in Franklin County, Virginia, in 1856, and died at Tuskegee Institute on November 14, 1915. Dr. Washington's work in the fields of education and race relations rank among the great contributions to the advancement of the Negro, the South, and nation. It has been 75 years since he began what was called "The Tuskegee Experiment." It has long since passed the experimental stage and has been accepted as a noble venture in practical education. On April 5, 1956, we observed the 100th anniversary of the birth of the Founder. He has been honored in many ways. In 1945 he was elected to New York University's Hall of Fame.

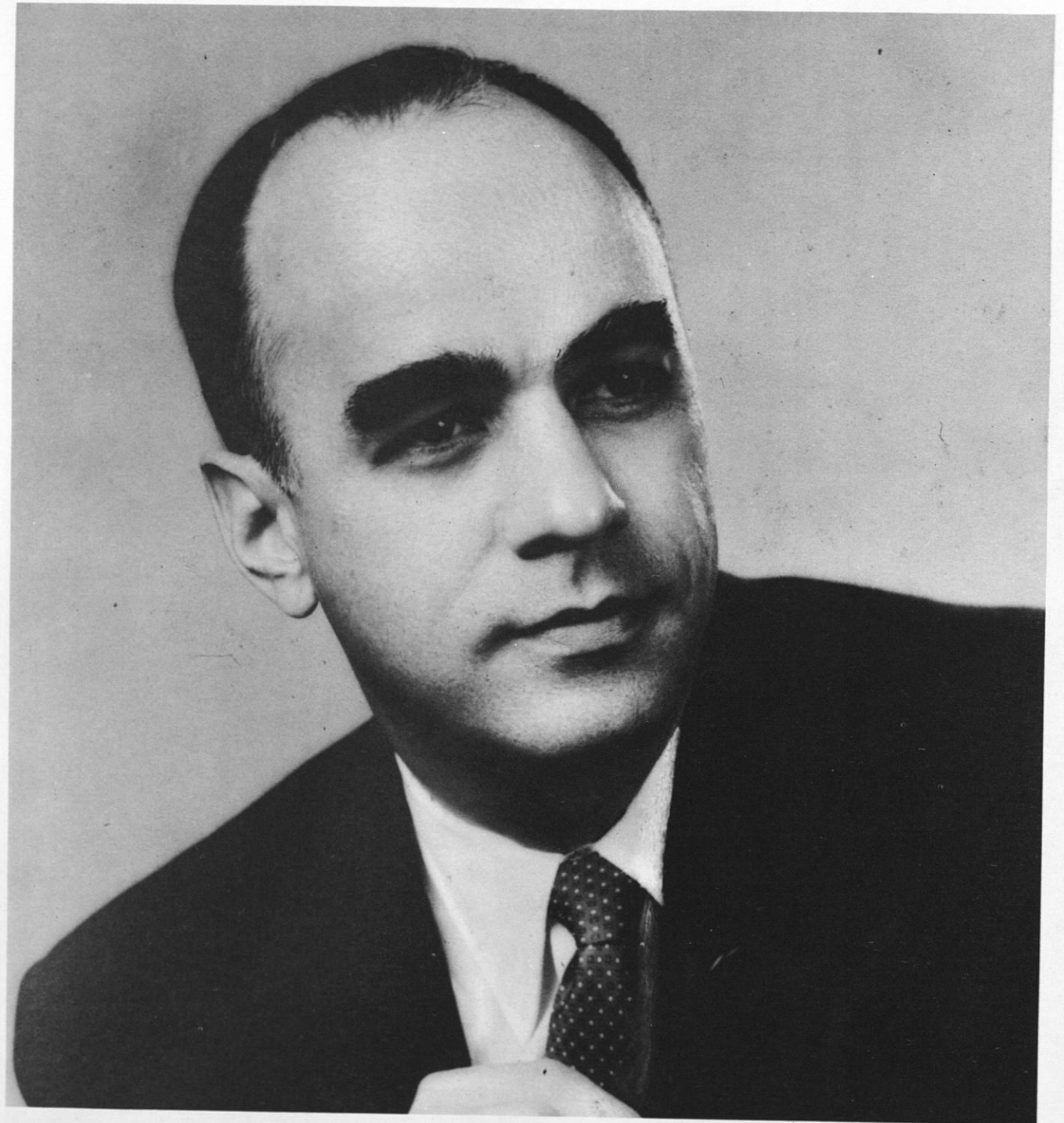


ROBERT RUSSA MOTON, successor to Booker T. Washington and second principal of Tuskegee Institute, was born in Amelia County, Virginia, on August 26, 1867, and died at his home in Capahosie, Virginia, on May 31, 1940. He succeeded Dr. Washington in October 1916. He has been characterized as "The Builder." He expanded the physical plant and built up the endowment fund. He added to the curriculum the four-year college.

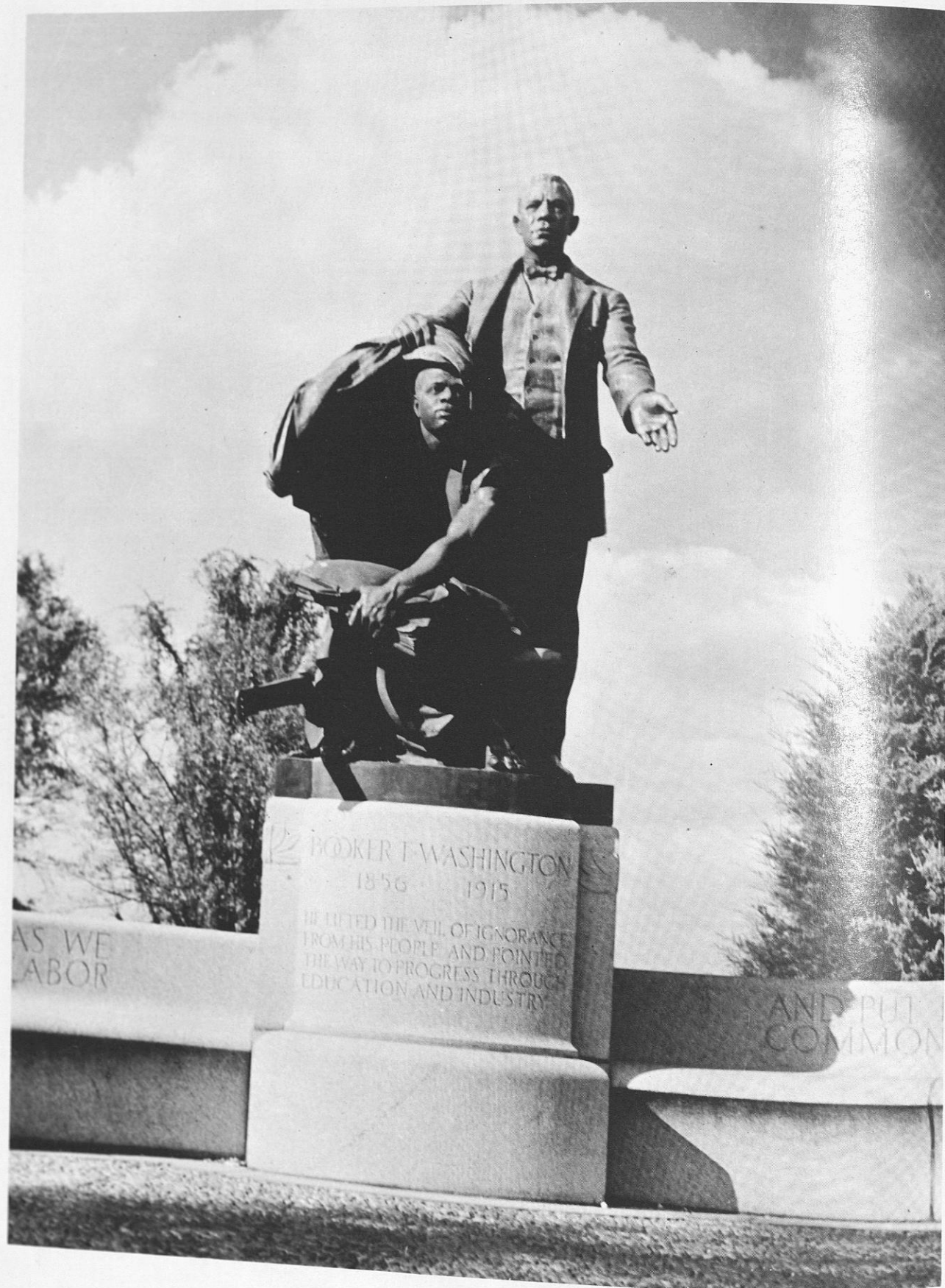
FREDERICK DOUGLAS PATTERSON, the successor of Robert Russa Moton, and third president to Tuskegee Institute, was born in Washington, D. C. in 1901. He succeeded Dr. Moton in October 1935. He expanded the curricula both horizontally and vertically, adding Commercial Dietetics and Institution Management, and the Schools of Veterinary Medicine and Engineering. Graduate courses were added in 1940. He pioneered in a new venture of college financing—The United Negro College Fund. He resigned his post to accept the directorship of the Phelps-Stokes Fund in 1953.



Dr. Luther H. Foster, fourth president of Tuskegee Institute, succeeded Dr. Patterson, June 1, 1953 and was inaugurated November of the same year. In a statement made early in his administration he said, "Education must look forward; it must catch the vision of a better future and it must harness its efforts of the present to that achievement."

Dr. Foster has consistently explored avenues through which Tuskegee Institute's instruction, research and service programs might specifically meet the test of quality in a society which is giving fuller consideration to the dignity of the individual and to full citizenship opportunities for all. Tuskegee Institute is presently engaged in a self-study program aimed toward fitting it to best serve the changing pattern of society.

It was almost morning. The star of freedom had just begun its climb from behind the eastern horizon, and already its light had started scattering before it the darkness of despair, suffering, and ignorance. A race, just emerging from the wicked grips of slavery stood eastward, facing it, leaderless, but hopeful. The time was 1856. In that same year in Franklin County, Virginia, a leader, Booker T. Washington, who was to answer the cry of his people, was born. He grew up in a poor family, but unlike many who bore the yoke of the haunting past and who crumbled beneath their burdens, he pressed onward.

Booker T. Washington wanted an education. Upon hearing of Hampton Institute which provided a very good opportunity for Negroes to be educated, he made preparations to enter the school. He left home for Hampton with only fifteen dollars which he borrowed from his brother, John.

At the same time in this country, farther south Lewis Adams, a former slave had risen to the position of leadership in the Negro community of Tuskegee, Alabama. Mr. Adams felt that the Negroes in this community needed an education. Believing that he could get help from a white friend, he contacted Mr. George W. Campbell, a former slave owner, who had become a champion of education, and these two men engineered the passage of a state act which appropriated \$2,000 annually for the payment of teachers' salaries for the school. This was nine years after Booker T. Washington had entered Hampton Institute. They asked General Armstrong, the principal of Hampton, to send them a principal. General Armstrong sent them

Dr. Washington.

On his first day of school at Tuskegee, July 4, 1881 he had thirty students whom he had contacted in Macon and nearby counties to attend.

In 1882 Booker T. Washington contracted to buy a one-hundred acre abandoned plantation, which became the core of Tuskegee Institute's present campus. He began the program of self-help which permitted students to live on the campus and earn all or part of their expenses. Learning by doing was the pioneering light which enabled Tuskegee to stand the years of its infancy.

Through the help and co-operation of faithful friends, north and south, Tuskegee Institute grew to be a useful educational institution. At the close of Washington's administration, the foundation was well laid for the institution's subsequent growth. Its student body numbered fifteen hundred, although two-thirds of this number were below high school level, and none were above it. There were fifteen distinct departments where students were prepared for a total of thirty-eight trades and professions. Most of the buildings were completed.

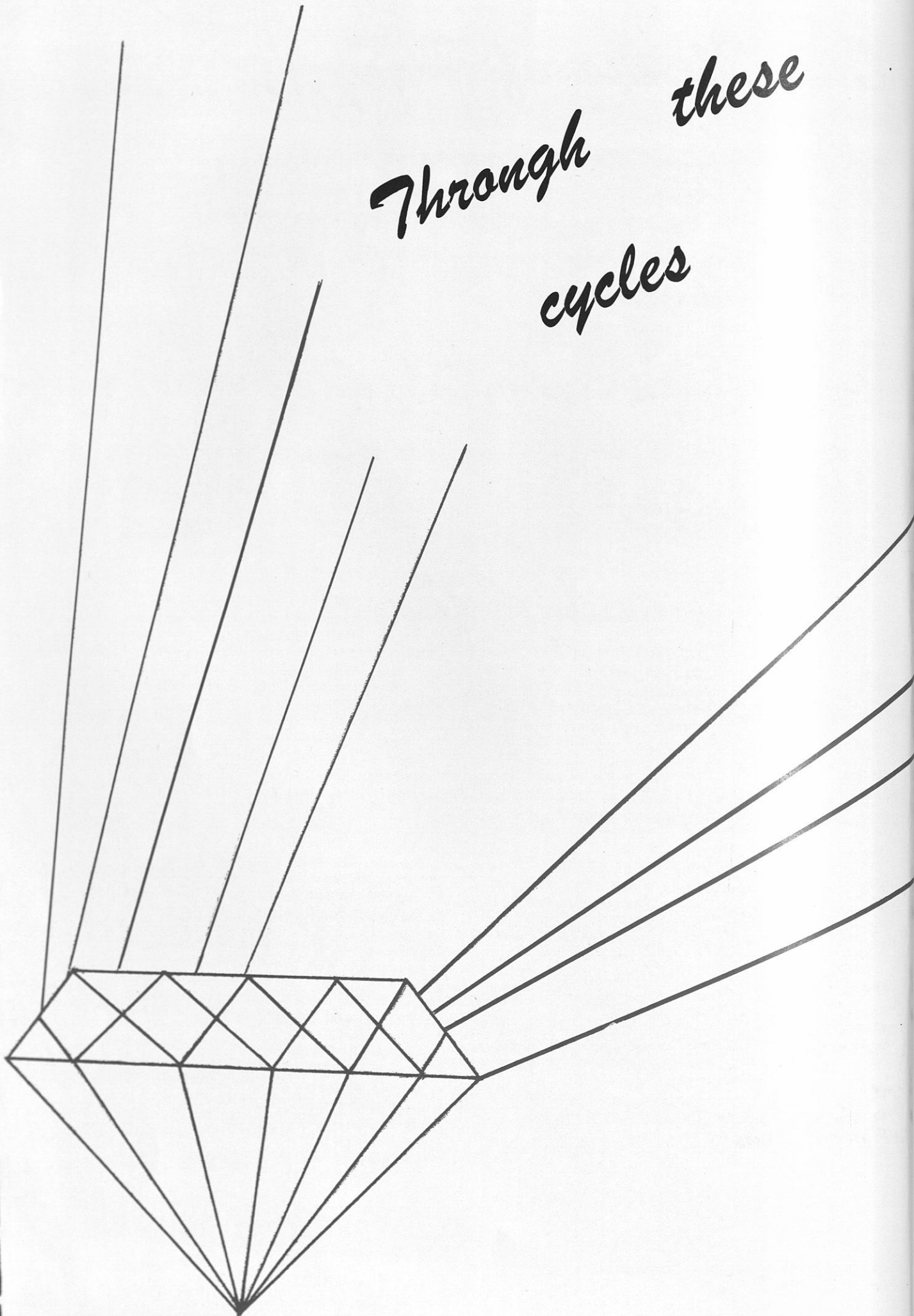
Booker T. Washington died at Tuskegee Institute November 14, 1915, and was buried near the chapel.

Today the physical facilities, including 4,925 acres of land (362 campus acres) and 157 buildings, are valued at \$13,720,254. Tuskegee Institute's present endowment amounts to \$9,600,000, and its annual budget exceeds three million dollars.

The enrollment consists of nearly two thousand students.

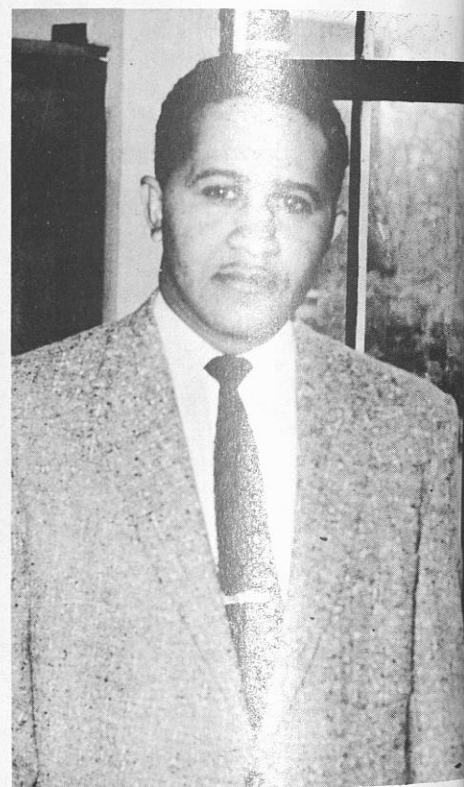

This building was dedicated at the turn of the century, 1902.

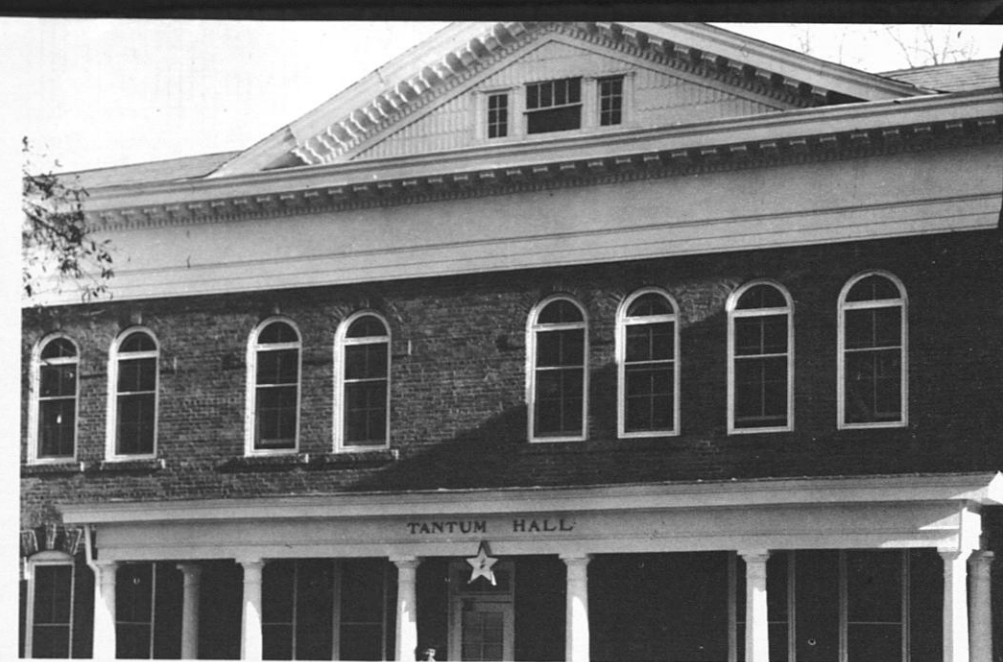


DOUGLAS HALL
