
Some Results of the Tuskegee Negro Conference

1. Better methods of preparing the soil, producing, harvesting and marketing farm products.
2. Farmers are realizing more and more that home ownership is the basis of a permanent rural community life.
3. An increasingly better relationship is existing between the landlord and tenant. Tenants are being encouraged to become landowners.
4. Farmers are desirous of a better community life that will enable their children to secure the same benefits that come to children in urban communities.
5. A larger number of better prepared teachers are finding employment in the Rosenwald and county training schools.
6. Negro religious denominations are taking an increasing interest in the economic and social welfare of the rural Negro community.
7. Health and sanitation have become recognized as the foundation stones of building a more satisfying country life. In every county where there are Negro workers, special health programs are carried on throughout the year.

The complexity of the rural problem demands the hearty cooperation of all agencies interested in rural betterment. The annual Tuskegee Negro Conference has always championed the cause of the rural Negro. We are, therefore, desirous of the presence and counsel of all persons interested in the improvement of rural life.

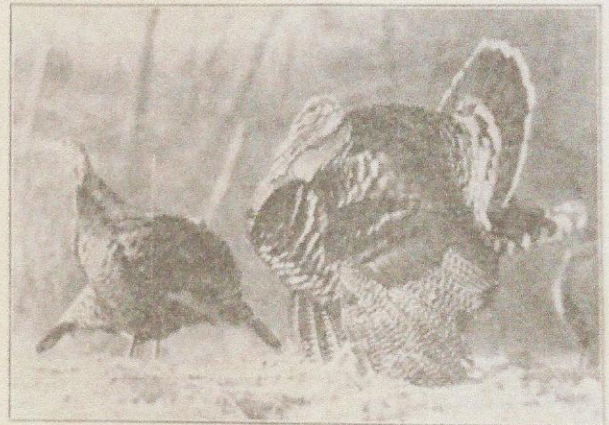




