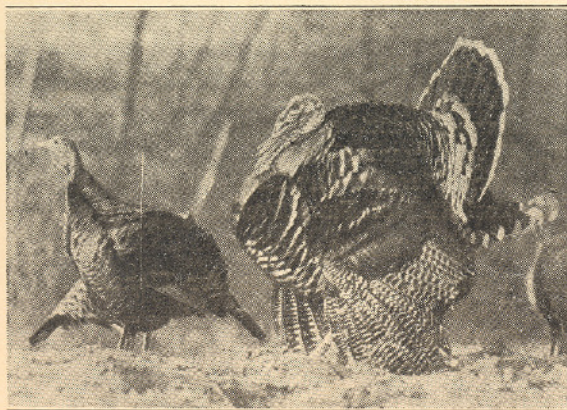

THE FORTY-SECOND ANNUAL TUSKEGEE NEGRO CONFERENCE
