The Tuskegee Negro Conference has in the past forty-two years, contributed greatly towards creating progressive leadership for the rural South. How to adjust ourselves as individuals or groups so as to intelligently and successfully meet the present economic situation must concern economists, educators, and spiritual leaders. It is hoped that in the Forty-third Annual Tuskegee Negro Conference, there will be more than the usual success in helping to work out plans which will result in still further improving conditions in the South.
