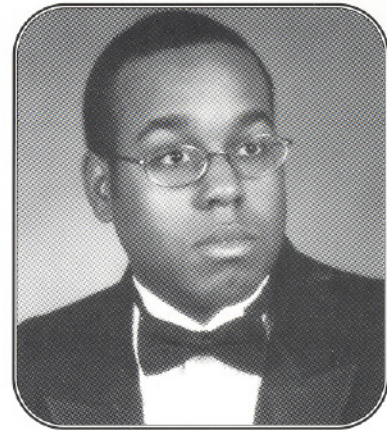

The Bailey Story



The Travis Bailey Family of Sumter County, Alabama has been selected as the Tuskegee University Merit Farm Family for 2002. Reared on a diversified 360-acre family farm in Winona, MS, that produced cotton, corn, hay and cattle. Travis is the ninth of ten children born to Claude and Ola Mae Bailey. All ten Bailey children are college graduates of either Alcorn State University, Tuskegee University, Jackson State University or Mississippi Valley State University. As the siblings matured, they have joined forces and purchased an additional 400 acres of heir property, thereby increasing the total family farm acreage to 760 acres. The 400 additional acres are devoted to intensified timber production.

Currently employed as an Agri-Science instructor in the Sumter County Public School System, Travis received his B.S. in Agriculture Education from Alcorn State University and later a Master of Agriculture Education, A.A. in Agriscience, and Certification of Principalship from Alabama A&M University. Mr. Bailey is a member of the American Federation of Teaching, County Chairperson of the American Vocational Association, and former district Vice President of the Agribusiness Teachers in the State of Alabama. Travis is also the President of the Pickens County, AL Board of Education. His election marks the first time an African-American has held this position. Mr. Bailey has a variety of work experiences having been employed as a United States Grain and Weight Inspector, County Supervisor with Farmers Home Administration (FmHA), and Agriculture Specialist with The Federation of Southern Cooperatives.

The Bailey family currently manages and resides on a 788-acre family farm. This 788-acre estate includes the 6-acre home site, 96 acres of family owned timberland, 500 acres leased for soybean and wheat production, 60 acres of hay, and over 126 acres of farmland devoted to various enterprises. The Bailey family also manages a 41 head herd of Charlois and Angus beef cattle. Cattle pastures on the Bailey farm are known to be highly productive and are always over seeded with winter wheat and rye grass combinations. The Baileys own all of the equipment used in this operation, including a new computerized hay baler used to support a custom hay business. Travis, the Bailey children when available, and one hired farm attendant supply farm labor. In addition to the farm enterprise, Travis owns Bailey Electric, Inc., an independent service-contracting firm that specializes in heating, plumbing, air conditioning and a multitude of electrical services.

Mr. Bailey also utilizes the Cooperative Extension Service to secure information and resources to enhance his farm businesses. Travis has been a 4-H leader of the Tuskegee University Cooperative Extension Program for twenty years. He's presently serving on the Local Advisory Council, as well as the State Advisory Council for the Tuskegee University Cooperative Extension Program. Mr. Bailey has also served as Hunter Education Teacher for the Hunter Safety class in Sumter County. Travis also uses the educational resources of the Tuskegee University Cooperative Extension Program to encourage his students to become better students and student leaders. It is Travis' hope that other students will become interested in Agriculture, later choosing careers in a field that has brought him so many challenging rewards and enjoyment.

Mr. Bailey is being recognized for his outstanding leadership, community involvement, responsible stewardship, and commitment to the future of Agriculture and the efforts of the Tuskegee University Cooperative Extension Program.

Mr. Bailey is married to the former Judy Randle, a family and consumer sciences instructor in the public school system. The Bailey's five children, Sirbyron Nichole, Travisha, Franchesha, and Travis Jr, are very supportive of the family farm and its enterprises. The oldest son, Sirbyron, is currently a senior at Mississippi State University, majoring in Agribusiness, Nichole is a sophomore pre-med major at the University of Alabama in Tuscaloosa, and the youngest three students, Travisha, Franchesha, and Travis Jr. are all on the A - B Honor Roll in the public school system.

TYRONE R. BAINES

Tyrone R. Baines is a program director at the W.K. Kellogg Foundation of Battle Creek, Michigan. He develops and reviews Foundation programming priorities, evaluates and recommends proposals for funding, and administers active projects. Dr. Baines is director of the Kellogg Youth Initiative Partnerships and works primarily in the areas of education leadership and youth programming. While at North Carolina Central University in Durham, Dr. Baines held a variety of senior level positions including his most notable appointment as the Executive Assistant to the Chancellor. Other positions Dr. Baines held included: child welfare social worker in Philadelphia, owner of an advertising agency and a management consultant firm, personnel relations specialist and assistant director of summer interns with the Office of Economic Opportunity in Washington, D.C., and a senior faculty member for the Federal Executive Institute in Charlottesville, Virginia.

Dr. Baines earned his B. S. Degree at Morgan State University, Master's Degree from the University of Pennsylvania, a second Master's Degree and doctorate degree from the University of Maryland in College Park.



CURTILAND DEVILLE

Curtiland Deville is currently the Director of the Equal Opportunity for the U. S. Department of Agriculture Cooperative State Research, Education, and Extension Service in Washington, D.C. Mr. Deville is responsible for the development of policies, practices and procedures to strengthen employment practices and educational programs, with special emphasis on equal access to employment opportunity and educational programs. Prior to being named Director of the Equal Opportunity Staff, he served as an Agricultural Extension Specialist, and Program Compliance Review Leader. He also served as an International Trade Specialist for the Latin American Regional Marketing Division at the Office of International Marketing, U.S. Department of Commerce. Mr. Deville held a variety of positions with the Peace Corps: Peace Corps Representative, State Peace Corps Director and Peace Corps Associate Director in Brazil.

Mr. Deville, a native of Louisiana currently residing in Chevy Chase, Maryland, is married to the former Vera Monteiro and they have two children.

ABOUT THE SPEAKERS

CONGRESSMAN SANFORD BISHOP, JR.

Congressman Sanford Bishop, Jr. is serving his fifth two-year term in the U.S. House of Representatives from Georgia's Second Congressional District. He was first elected to Congress in 1992 after serving in the Georgia House of Representatives from 1977 to 1990 and the Georgia Senate from 1991 - 1992.

Congressman Bishop is a member of the Agriculture Committee, the Permanent Select Committee on Intelligence and a permanent member of the House Veterans Affairs Committee. This year, he Congressman Bishop has been selected as the Ranking Democrat on the Intelligence Committee's Subcommittee on Technical and Tactical Intelligence. On the Agriculture Committee, he serves on two subcommittees. One is the Risk Management, Speciality Crops and Research Subcommittee. and the other is the General Farm Commodities, Resource Conservation and Credit Subcommittee.

Among Congressman Bishop's many leadership positions, he is Democratic Whip-at-large, co-chairman of the Forestry 2000 Task Force, co-chairman of the House Peanut Caucus, member of the "Blue Dog" Coalition (an organization of fiscally-conservative House Democrats), and a member of the Congressional Black Caucus, Rural Health Care Coalition, and Congressional Rural Caucus.

A resident of Albany, Georgia, Congressman Bishop was born in Mobile, Alabama. He is the son the the late Sanford D. Bishop, Sr., the first president of Bishop State Community College, and Mrs. Minnie S. Bishop, a librarian. He received his B.S. Degree from Morehouse College and Doctor of Law Degree from Emory University, and later served in the United States Army.



JUAN P. CASIMIRO

Juan P. Casimiro's area of program interest is in teaching entrepreneurial excellence to elementary, middle and high school educators, community based organizations and community colleges. His workshops emphasize strategies, lessons and advice for running dynamic youth entrepreneurship classes.

Previously, Mr. Casimiro held the position of New York Metro Program Director for the National Foundation for Teaching Entrepreneurship, and Entrepreneurship Director for New York City Board of Education. In 1993, he partnered with the founder of EDGE, Inc., later merging with KidsWay, Inc., where he held the position of Executive Vice President. In 2002, KidsWay acquired YoungBiz.com to expand its programs and services through the Internet. EDGE, Inc., sponsors many youth entrepreneurial conferences and magazines teaching their business education curriculum with supplemental materials.

Juan Casimiro is an alumnus of Rutgers University's Leadership Management for Urban Executive Institute and Columbia University's Business School's Fast Trac Program.

JAMES E. HOUSE

James E. House currently serves as the director, Office of Small and Disadvantaged Business Utilization at the U. S. Department of Agriculture. Prior to this position, he served as president of the Eckenberge Group, a professional services firm which provided primarily marketing assistance services to small businesses, large federal prime contractors, state governments and historically black colleges and universities. He also served as president of the National Association of African American Business owners. House began his career as an engineer in the aerospace industry where he worked on the design, development and testing of military fighters and commercial airplanes.

House, a native of Goldsboro, North Carolina, earned a B. S. degree in mechanical engineering from Howard University in Washington, DC.



REPRESENTATIVE RICHARD LINDSEY

Representative Richard Lindsey was elected to the Alabama House of Representatives in 1983 representing District 39, which is comprised of the the north Alabama counties of Cleburne, Cherokee and Southern Dekalb. Representative Lindsay serves as chairman of the Ways and Means Education Fund Committee and is also appointed to the Appropriations subcommittee. Interim committee assignments include: Children First Trust Fund Legislative Oversight Committee, Contract Review Committee, Internet Sales and Use Tax Committee, Joint Budget Committee, Tax Structure, Agriculture and International Trade Committee of the NCSL, and the Agriculture and Rural Development Committee of the SLC.

Representative Lindsey and his wife Johna have two children. He is employed by his family's farm and agribusiness. Representative Lindsey is active in many community and civic affairs and also serves on the Board of Directors of Farmers and Merchants Bank in Centre.

A Tribute to Thomas Monroe Campbell

At Tuskegee University, the name Thomas Monroe Campbell, or T.M. Campbell as he was more commonly called, is synonymous with extension. In recognition of the fact he was the first Cooperative Extension Agent in the United States. These facts were the product of cooperation by (1) The United States Government, represent by Seaman A. Knapp; (2) The State of Alabama, represented by Auburn University; (3) private enterprise, represented by the General Education Board; and (4) Tuskegee University, represented by Booker T. Washington on November 12, 1906.

On January 11, 1946, a bust of T.M. Campbell was unveiled and presented to Tuskegee University in honor of his forty years of service in Extension Agriculture. The statement on this occasion about Mr. Campbell and his work follows:

Mr. T.M. Campbell, Field Agent, U.S. Department of Agriculture, was appointed Farm Demonstration Agent in Macon County, Alabama, 1906. Mr. Campbell is the oldest extension worker in years of service in the United States. He advanced from County Agent to State Agent in Alabama and from State Agent to Field Agent for seven southern states: Alabama, Georgia, Florida, Mississippi, Louisiana, Texas, and Oklahoma. As a result of the effectiveness of his work, there are now nearly 600 county and home demonstration agents working in these states.

Among his other accomplishments is an extension building on the campus of Tuskegee Institute, which is headquarters for Negro extension work in Alabama.

Mr. Campbell is author of the book, "The Movable School Goes to the Negro Farmer," and also a number of articles appearing in some of the leading journals of the nation. He received the "Harmon Award" in 1930 for his distinguished service in the field of farming and rural life.

In September 1944, he was selected as one of a committee of three to make a survey of West Africa.

In short, Mr. Campbell is a pioneer in extension work. He is a nationally known and respected citizen -- a public servant of the first rank. This is his 40th year of service with Extension Agriculture.

He is honored with a Master's Degree from Tuskegee Institute, his Alma Mater.

A bust of Thomas Monroe Campbell is prominently displayed in the George Washington Carver Museum at Tuskegee University.
