The Farmers Conference at Tuskegee University is often cited as being the oldest conference of its type in the nation. The first Farmers Conference was held at Tuskegee University on February 23, 1892. The purpose was to convene farmers in an educationally stimulating environment to arouse public sentiment among the farmers and create a real interest in the common, mundane and practical affairs of life. The morning was spent identifying problems, while the afternoon portion of the conference focused on solutions.

Today, this conference has evolved into a two day event that provides intense course instruction, interactive demonstrations and discussions as well as an opportunity for producers to network with colleagues and university educators. The main focus of the conference is still on the problems and solutions for small-scale farmers, landowners, and their families in managing change in agriculture and lifestyles.

The objectives of this conference are to: (1) share up-to-date information relevant to small-scale farmers and landowners involved in production of traditional and alternative agricultural products; (2) create awareness about family health, nutritional challenges, and existing resources for rural families; (3) provide research-based information in a consumer adaptable format; and (4) strengthen networks and partnerships that address problems of small-scale agriculture and rural communities with respect to local, national and global markets.

## 2013 MERIT FARM FAMILY AWARDI



Mr. John Brown, Jr. is a fourth generation Black Belt farmer from Selma, Dallas County, Alabama. Brown's great grandfather and grandfather farmed as sharecroppers. Brown's father, John Brown, Sr. purchased the farm John currently farms while serving two tours of duty in World War II. He sent money home every month to pay for the farm. After his tour of duty ended, John Brown, Sr. returned home and farmed full-time on his 40 acres of land. This farm provided all the necessary resources for the entire family. John Brown, Sr. grew cotton, peanuts, peas, watermelon, butter beans and greens.

Upon the death of John Brown, Sr. the farm passed to John, Jr. where he continues his father's legacy. John Brown followed in his father's footsteps not only with the farm but by serving in the Operation: Desert Storm War. After coming home from the war Brown continued to maintain the farm and grow the same crops that his father grew except cotton. According to Brown "he has doubled the production of the farm with technology, irrigation, modern equipment and chemicals." Brown is a year-round farmer growing peas, watermelon, corn, okra, sweet potatoes and greens.

Brown has always shared his knowledge and love of farming with other farmers. His farm serves as a demonstration site for Tuskegee University. Brown even

> opened up his farm to a delegation from Turkmenistan (Russia). This delegation was interested in learning about underground and above irrigation systems. Brown has been assisted by Tuskegee University to build a greenhouse. Other area farmers will use the greenhouse as well.

University to discuss this issue and now Tuskegee University is supplying the potato slips to the farmers in the area.

As president of the Dallas County Farmers Association, Brown assists farmers not only in Dallas County but across the Black Belt. He purchases seeds and collard plants for local farmers throughout the Black Belt. When other sources stopped supplying the "Puerto Rican sweet potato slips" John met with small farm staff at Tuskegee





Brown, with assistance from Tuskegee University, and land donated by the Selma-Dallas County Farmers Association, has worked tirelessly to establish a farmers market research center in the Alabama Black Belt. These efforts came to fruition on December 4, 2011, when ground was broken to begin construction of the Black Belt Fruit and Vegetable Market and Innovation Center, on Highway 80 just outside of Selma.

Brown served on a panel discussion at Tuskegee University entitled "Cultivating organic marketing opportunities for small farmers." According to Brown "you can take 40 acres and with plastic, irrigation and chemicals you can double your production." Brown believes that farmers must hold their crop as long as possible in


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order to keep the middle man out increasing their profitability. He further states that he would like to do research on seeds that the farmer can use from year to year instead of buying seeds for each planting cycle. Brown was assisted in obtaining a two-year SARE Grant to provide research on marketing and sustainable vegetable production on his farm.

Brown believes in giving back to his community. He shares his produce with adult day care centers and allows the participants of the centers and other non-profit organizations to gather produce. He provides

fresh vegetables to senior citizens that can't afford to pay for them, and currently serves as president of the New Small Farmers Agricultural Cooperative..

John Brown and his wife of 28 years, Delphine, have two children, son John E. Brown, III and daughter Lashannana, who represent the next generation of Browns on the land in the Alabama Black Belt.

**Kimble Forrister**, a native of Nashville, Tennessee, joined ARISE in 1991 as state coordinator. He worked in urban ministry in the Northeast in the 1970s, completed a Master of Divinity at Princeton Theological Seminary, and served as Southeast Regional Organizer at Bread for the World for nine years in the 1980s.

Arise Citizens' Policy Project (ACPP), founded in 1994, is a statewide nonprofit, nonpartisan coalition of 150 congregations and community groups and some 1,400 individuals united in their belief that low-income people are suffering because of state policy decisions. Through ACPP, groups and individuals join together to promote state policies that improve the lives of low-income Alabamians. In a state that by many measures is the worst place for poor people to live in the United States, ACPP believes acts of charity are vital, but they are not enough; we must work to improve harmful state policies. ACPP provides a structure in which Alabamians can engage in public debates with the goal of improving the welfare of all Alabamians.

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


