

The Farmers Conference at Tuskegee University is often cited as being the oldest conference of its type in the nation. The first Farmers Conference was held at Tuskegee University on February 23, 1892. The purpose was to convene farmers in an educationally stimulating environment to arouse public sentiment among the farmers and create a real interest in the common, mundane and practical affairs of life. The morning was spent identifying problems, while the afternoon portion of the conference focused on solutions. Today, this conference has evolved into a two day event that provides intense course instruction, interactive demonstrations and discussions and an opportunity for producers to network with colleagues and university educators. The main focus of the conference is still on the problems and solutions for small-scale farmers, landowners, and their communities in managing change in agriculture.

The objectives of this conference are: (1) to share up-to-date information relevant to small-scale farmers and landowners involved in production of traditional and alternative agricultural products; (2) to create awareness about family health, nutritional challenges, and existing resources for rural families; (3) to provide research-based information in a consumer adaptable format; and (4) to strengthen networks and partnerships that address problems of small-scale agriculture and rural communities with respect to local, national and global markets.

### 2015 MERIT FARM FAMILY AWARD

Sandra and Cal Jones, currently reside in Georgiana, Alabama where they own and operate Jones Produce, a uniquely diversified farming venture. A farm family with four children, Sandra and Cal Jones were married in 1995. Their four children, Rusty, Paige, Hope and Melissa Anne – and their two grandsons, Parks, and Bryson, possess a deep appreciation for the joys and rich rewards of life offered on the farm.

Farming has always been a major part of both Sandra and Cal's lives. Growing up in South Alabama, in Butler County, Alabama, Cal worked alongside his father in farming his entire life. He not only learned how to grow produce, but how to run a variety of heavy-duty equipment. This heavy equipment experience was instrumental in assisting Cal to construct efficient waterways on their farm properties. Sandra, also a native of South Alabama helped her father in gardening and vegetable processing by running various bean shellers since the age of 11. Through the years, in one capacity or another, both have been working with produce and successfully marketing their crops to the public.

Through the years, Sandra and Cal managed to maintain their small farm family farm though they spent multiple hours employed at different jobs off the farm. Throughout their lives, one consistent goal has been quality - QUALITY of produce, QUALITY of tobacco and QUALITY of logs.

Developing their family home was a major priority for the Jones family. Once all of the children were

out of the house they abandoned their plans of building a new home on the farm, choosing to purchase and renovate Sandra's dream home that had finally become available for sale.

The new home was in desperate need of repair but the couple was able to make the dream a reality. While landscaping the new yard, Cal was injured and was taken out of action for several months. Sandra became the sole provider and caretaker for the family home and farm. Cal still has limited abilities but he returned as a driving force in this operation. "All of these trials and tribulations have made each stronger and

thankful for each other. I wouldn't trade a single moment for anything else in this world."

Sandra and Cal Jones are thankful to Tuskegee University and the Small Farmers Agricultural Cooperative for having helped them to extend what was once a very small family business of five acres to one that has grown to over 100 acres.



In addition to working with his father, Cal worked in the tobacco industry for most of his early years. Once he and Sandra were married, Sandra joined the tobacco industry, working in assembly, inspecting and shipping. After working with the tobacco industry, seeking new opportunities, Cal used his knowledge and skill of heavy duty equipment and began working for a logging company.

















Farmers, farm families and folks living in rural, black belt areas of the country are usually not close to hospitals or health centers where health emergencies or life-threatening accidents can be rushed to for medical assistance. However, like any other family, farmers and their families are prone to health emergencies such as chokes, cuts, body abrasions, insect stings, venomous snake bites and other bodily injuries. Farmers also need and they do buy and stock essential farm chemicals such as weed killers, poisonous animal baits, rodenticides, cancer causing Pharmacological products, toxins, live-attenuated vaccines and other life-threatening products. Some of these may be ingested accidentally through food, drinking water or body contacts resulting in medical emergencies that need immediate medical attentions. This breakout session will teach farmers (in the absence of a medical center) how to handle some of these emergencies. Farmers will learn "the essentials to keep in their first-aid kits". They will learn by hand-on-practice how to perform CPR (Cardio-Pulmonary- Resuscitation) and treat chokes. The knowledge of some "at risks" products that farmers and their families should know about will also be discussed. Disaster preparedness and some preventable farm emergencies will be discussed. The needs for farmers and their farm families to adopt healthy life-styles in order to avoid certain types of cancers will also be discussed.
