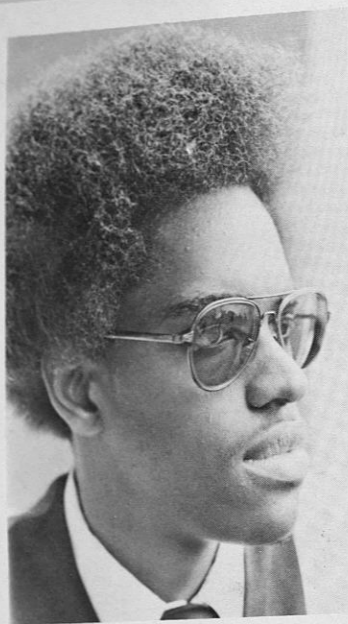
ARCHIVE OF THE BLUE CREW

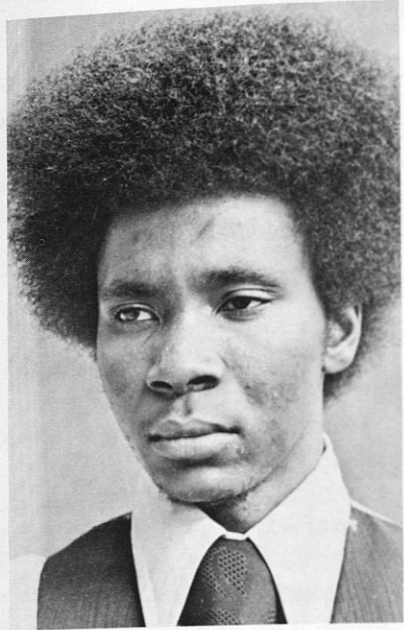

Beta Kappa Chapter of Phi Beta Sigma Fraternity, Inc., was chartered at Tuskegee in 1948.

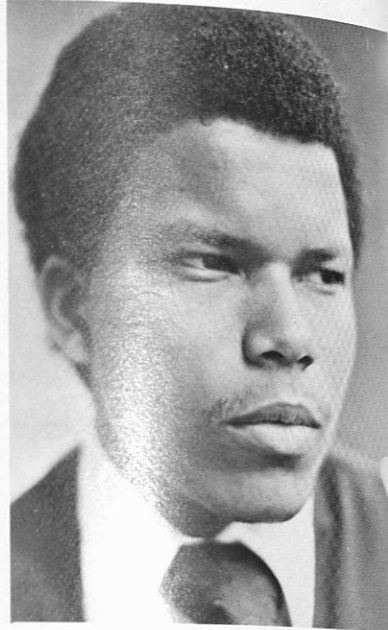




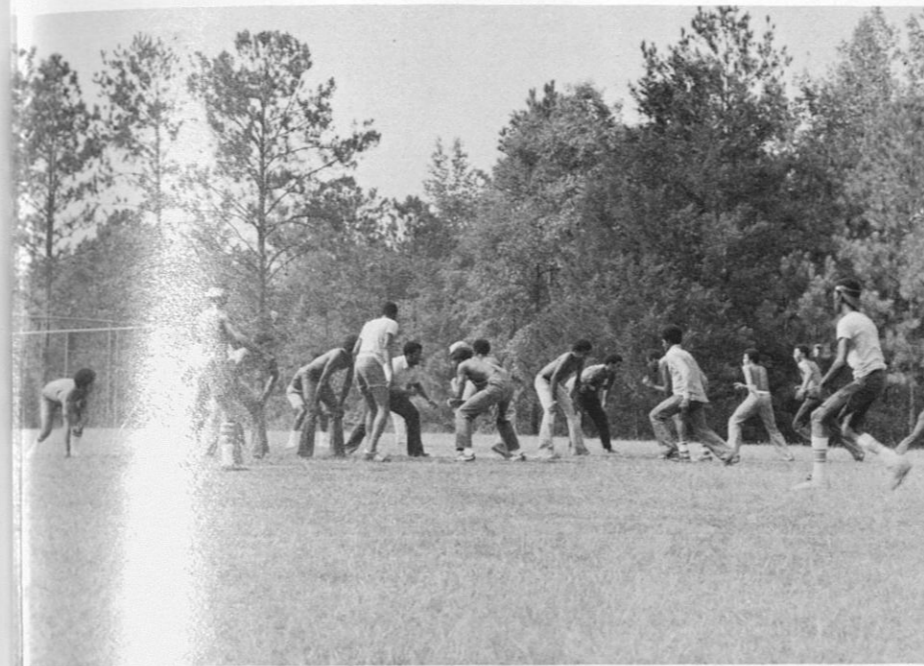

## THE SCHOOL OF EDUCATION AT TUSKEGEE INSTITUTE

The School of Education is the academic unit of Tuskegee Institute responsible for preparing professional school personnel. Historically, the education of teachers and school personnel has been a major responsibility of Tuskegee Institute since its founding in 1881 by Booker T. Washington. Teacher training programs at Tuskegee Institute have, over the years, produced a substantial number of teachers and educational administrators who have led and served the education profession well in every region of the United States and countries abroad.

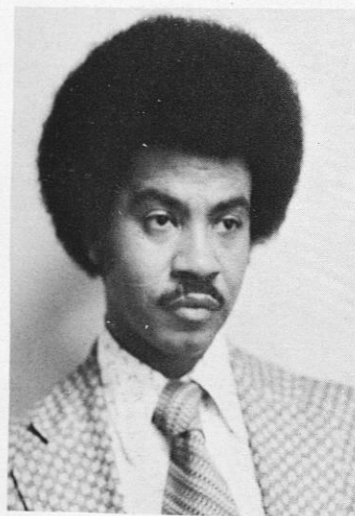

### LABORATORY SCHOOLS AND CAMPUS DEMONSTRATION CLASSES

The School of Education, in cooperation with various county school boards and local teachers in these schools, operates several laboratory schools for training pre-service teachers.

On-campus demonstration classes are operated by the School of Education for (1) kindergarten, (2) Montessori, (3) Head Start, and (4) nursery school. The geographical proximity of these programs creates a comprehensive laboratory for demonstration work, observation and clinical study of teaching techniques in early childhood, elementary, and home economics education.

The Montessori Class is recognized and accredited by the Association Montessori Internationale (AMI). The accreditation of schools is based on having an AMI trained teacher who has met AMI standards for graduation. It also focuses on association standards in class size, scheduling, classroom environment and equipment — all of which must meet AMI standards.



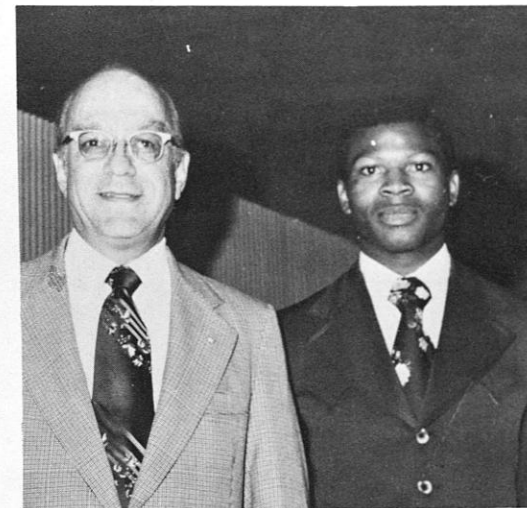

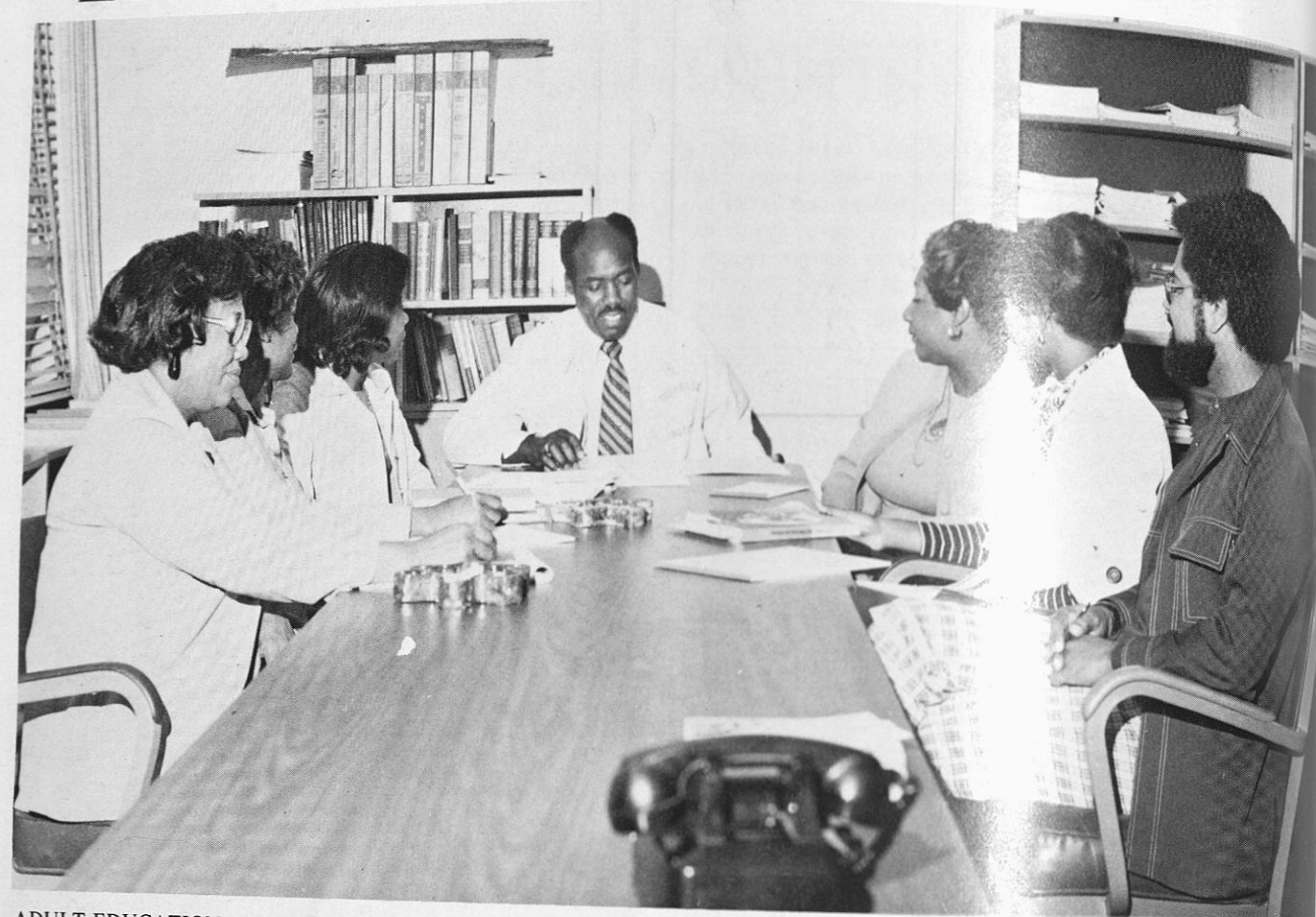
## FOUNDATIONS, ADMINISTRATION AND DEVELOPMENT

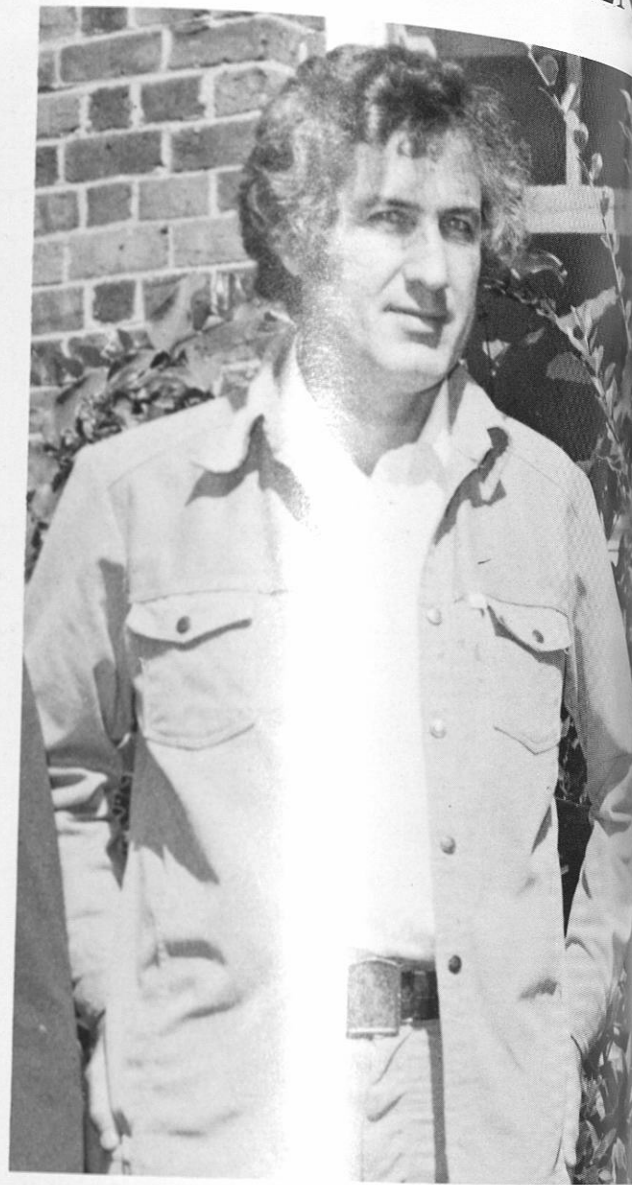


THE SOCIOLOGY DEPARTMENT AND THE SOCIOLOGY MAJORS

# READING CLINIC



Dr. A.M.S. Rao, Director



The Reading Clinic is one of several units of the College of Arts & Sciences and serves as a laboratory to the Graduate Reading Program in the School of Education. Presently the instructional staff includes a professional educational psychologist as director, two full-time instructors and one graduate assistant.

The primary service function consists of a semester-long, one-credit course designed for students having difficulties in reading and learning skills necessary for a successful college level performance. These skills are related to communication listening, comprehension, study, note-taking, test-taking, vocabulary development, spelling, and the like.

Each freshman student who does not make the optimal level in the Placement Test is required to enroll in a reading improvement course 101/102 during the first semester of admission to Tuskegee Institute. Those placed in the remedial category and upper class students will profit from a semester study at the Clinic to the extent that they understand improved methods of reading and learning.

All students receive a thorough diagnosis of the reading and learning problems, and individual aid is provided through intensive counseling and instruction. An extensive collection of films, filmstrips, and programmed learning materials are maintained. A complete learning center including a 48-position reading laboratory is used during the instructional stage.

The Reading Clinic serves as a training ground for graduate students in Reading and offers them laboratory facilities and opportunities for supervised practical experience in psychological analysis and treatment of reading deficiencies.

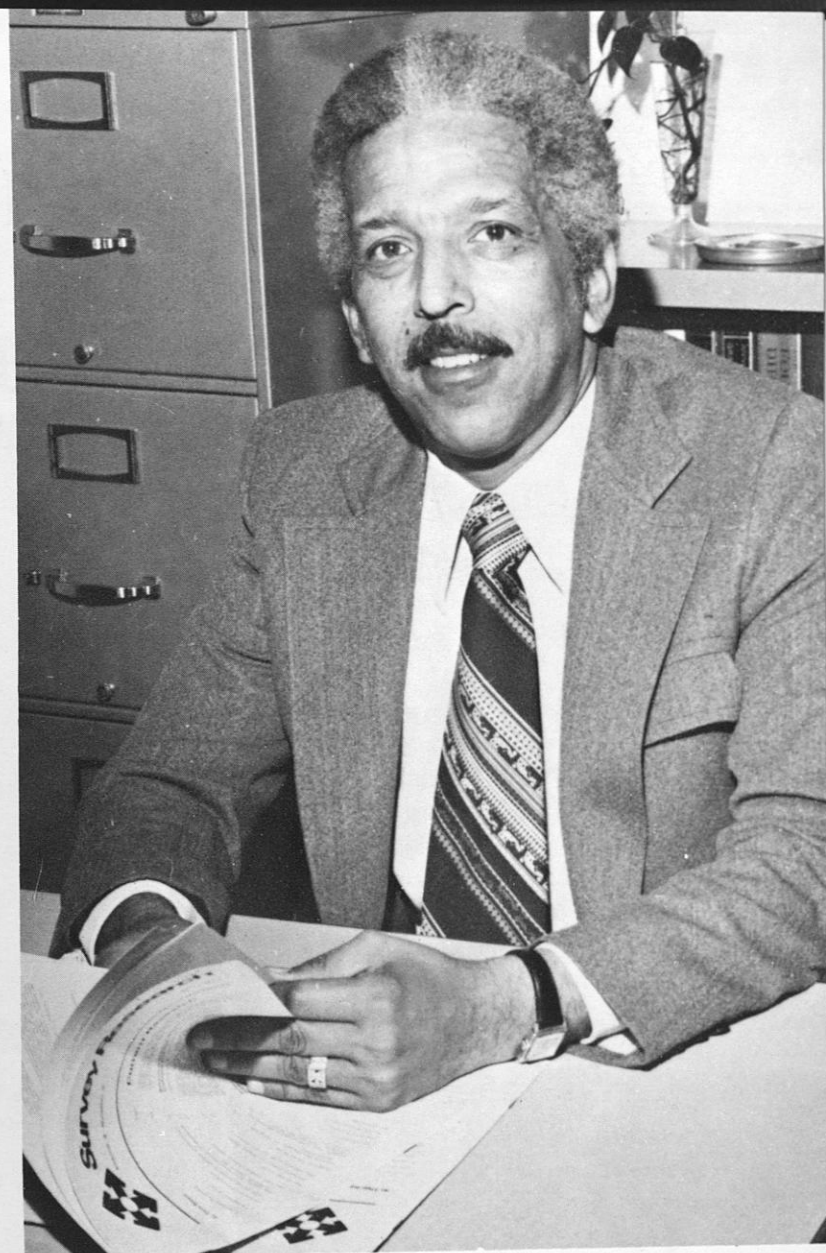


## DIVISION OF BEHAVIORAL SCIENCE RESEARCH

ran the 100 and 200 yard dashes at the renowned Border Conference Track Meet held in Auburn during his senior year of high school.

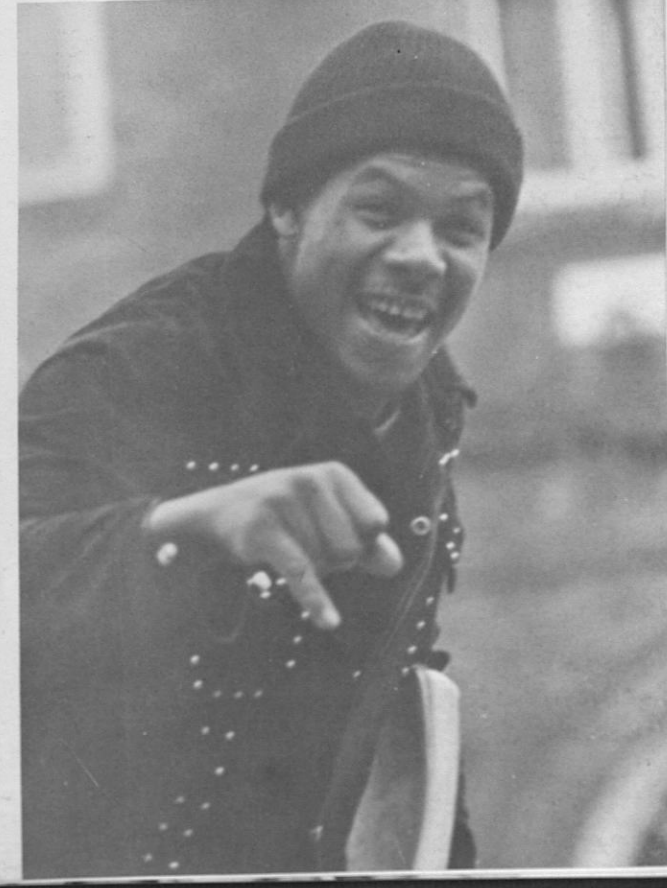
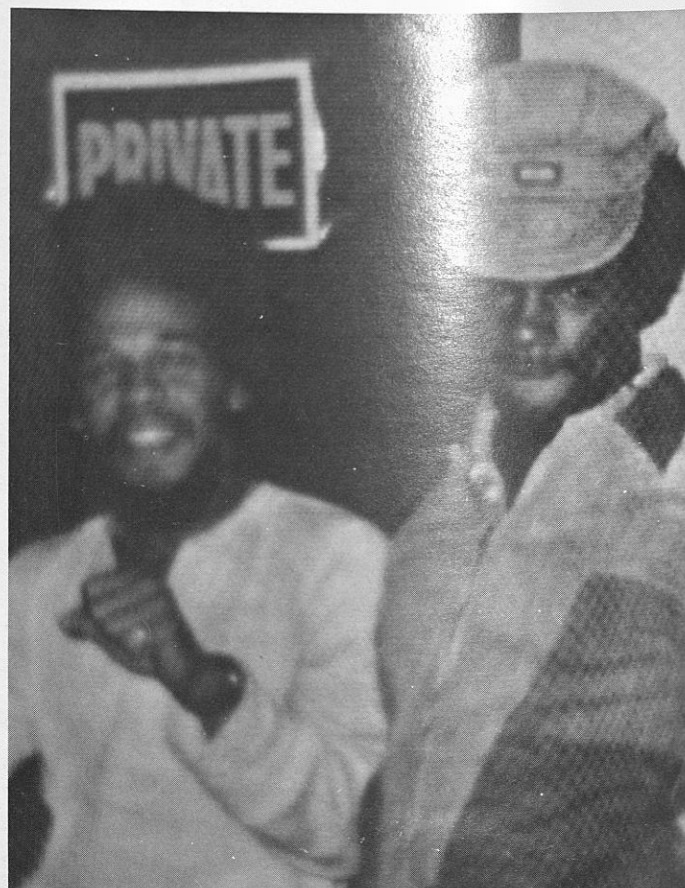
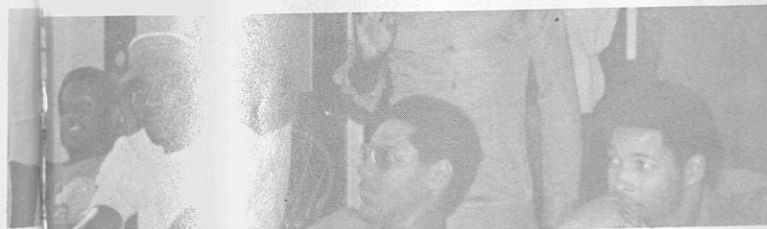
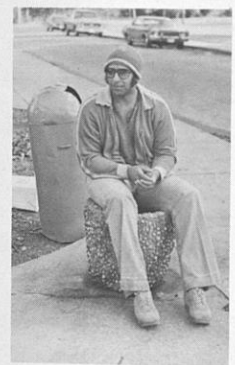
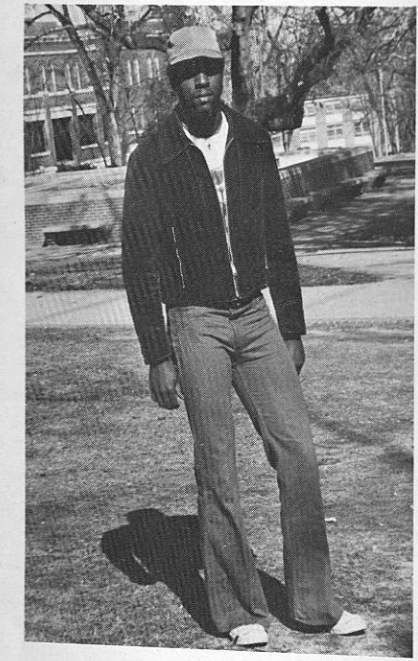
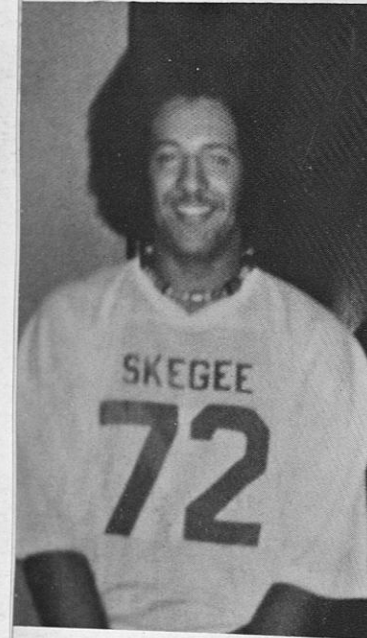
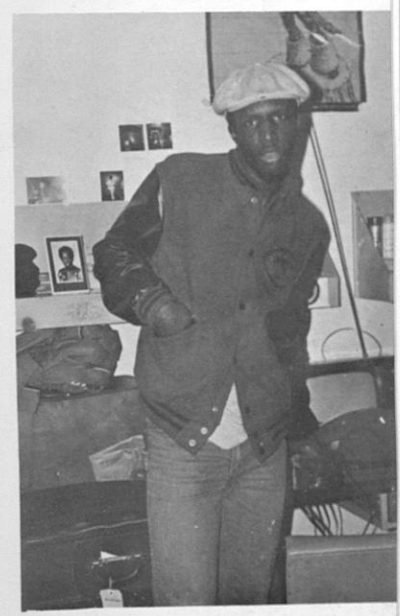
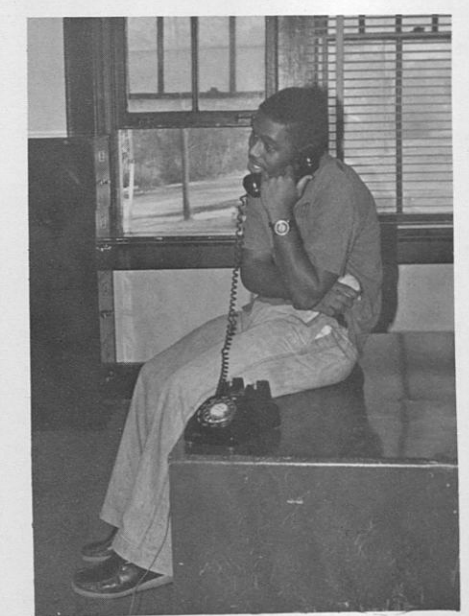

In the doubles, Holloway and Charlton were victorious over Wilson and Washington from Spellman and Bellamy and Jones won

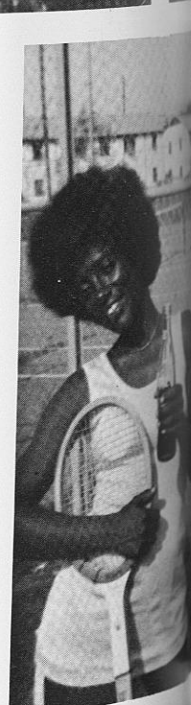
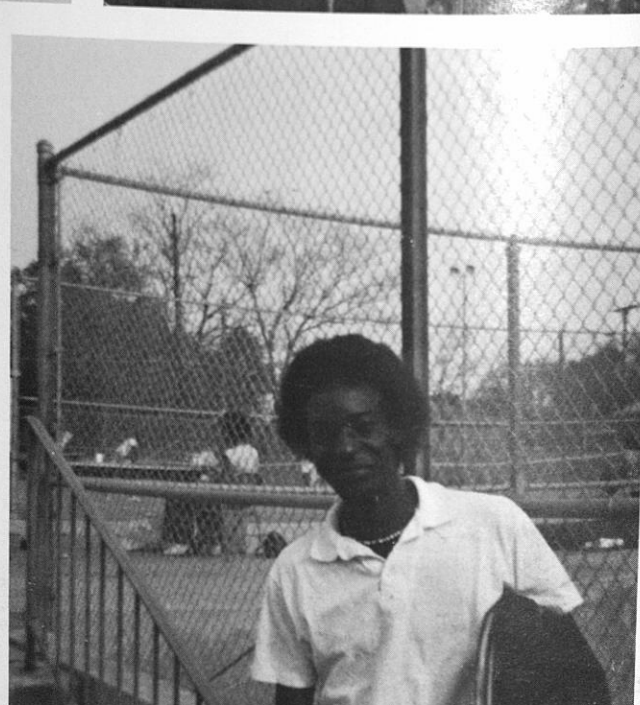
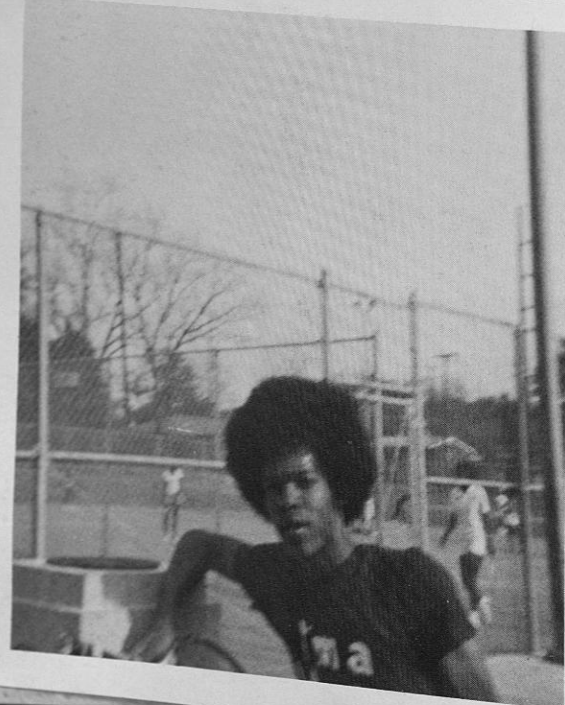
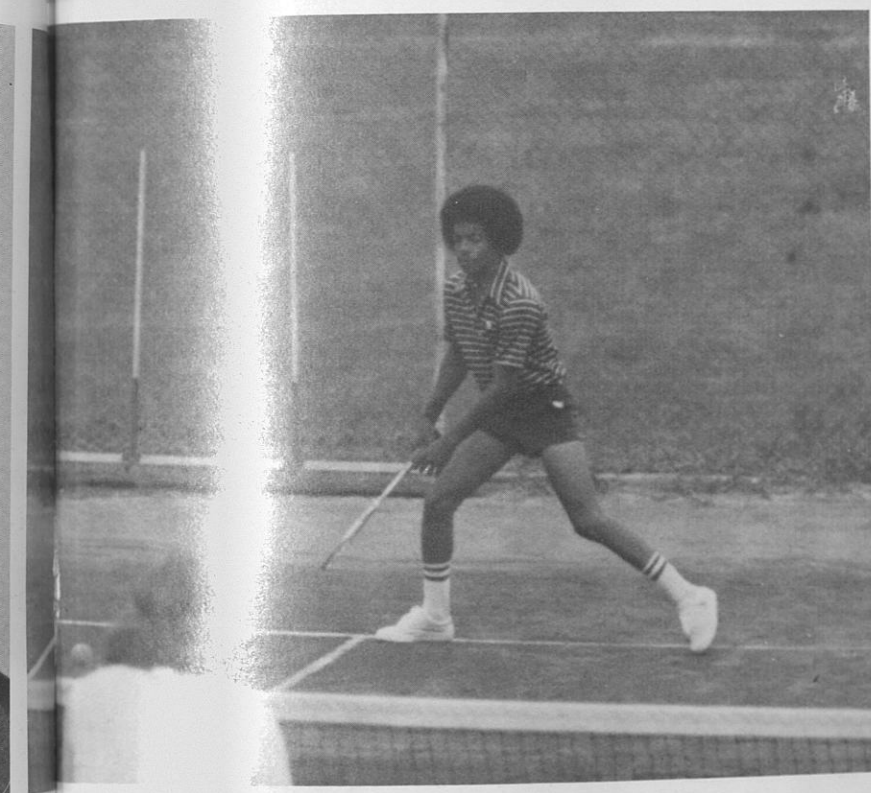
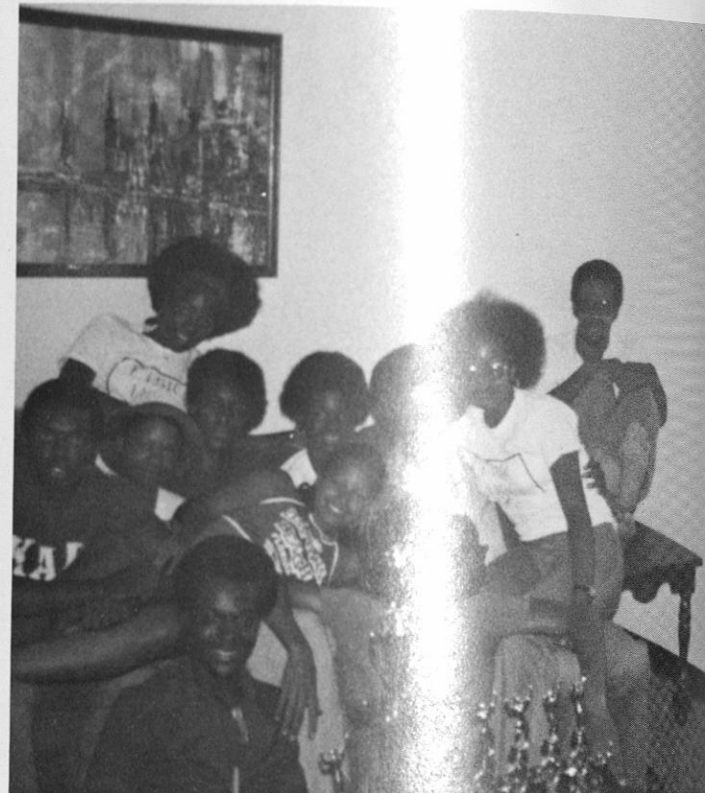
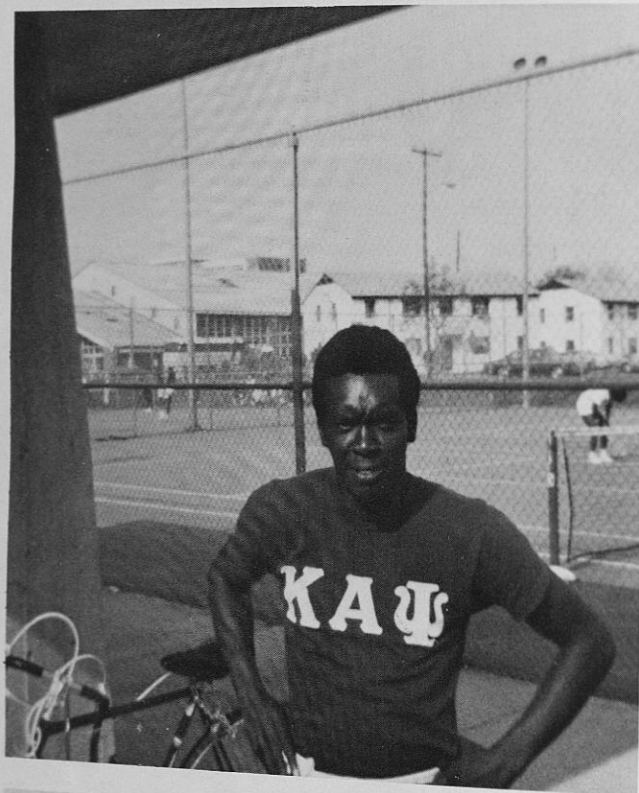
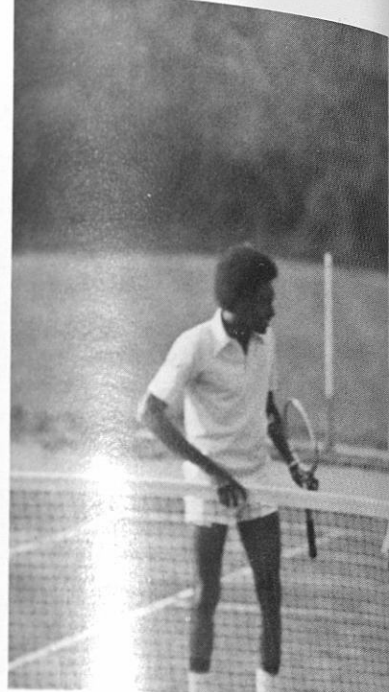
their doubles match over Grathum and Stephens of FAMU.

We are confident that you will--as have thousands of Tuskegees before you--serve your professions and the society in a splendid manner, always upholding the fine traditions of your Alma Mater.

As you leave Tuskegee Institute, there are many opportunities ahead. Some of you will choose to continue your studies; others will go immediately into the employment market. In whatever you do, you have received a solid base at Tuskegee upon which to build further. But more than that, you will be sensitive to the needs of people because that is one of Tuskegee's finest commitments.

It might be helpful to have a personal inventory to guide you in the years ahead. The following is a useful check list which additions can be made as the need arises: (1) know what will be required of you in the career you have chosen; (2) know what success means; (3) know what defeat means; (4) tabulate your powers; (5) tabulate your weaknesses; (6) outline a course of starting and proceeding; (7) make yourself acquainted with the benefits attending various choices of how to go about it.
